Roadside Park In State Contest

Eugene Munselle, maintenance foreman in Lynn County for the Texas Highway Department, has been nominated to receive the Lady Bird Johnson \$1,500 award this year in Texas for outstanding work in highway beautification.

The nomination has been made by District Engineer Oscar L. Crain of Lubbock in a brochure prepared by him with assistance from Mayor Meldon Leslie and Frank P. Hill, both of Tahoka. One nominee is entered in the contest from each of the 25 highway districts in Texas.

Major beautification project carried out by Mr. Munselle has been the roadside park five miles north of town which was started in 1939 and which the maintenance foreman started improving in 1942.

Recently he has started improvement on a second roadside park nearby on the east side of US 87, landscaping the premises of the new Department warehouse grounds just

north of the Tahoka city limits, and planting flower seed along the highway rights-of-way.

The older roadside park has drawn frequent comments from passing motorists from many states because of its beauty, especially in the summer, when its flowers are in full bloom.

Over the years, travelers have stopped by or written the News and Tahoka Chamber of Commerce complimenting the area on the beauty of the park. Many have said this is the most beautiful roadside park in the Southwest.

Mr. Munselle and his helpers have taken unusual interest in the highway beautification program and he frequently works "on his own time" on the project.

Lynn County Week Proposed

Governor Preston Smith has proposed a "Lynn County Week" be designated this year during which the county's history would be emphasized.

He has made the proposal in a letter to Mrs. Ben Moore, O'Donnell, chairman of the Lynn County Historical Survey Committee, and Mrs. Moore is proposing that the week of June 21-27 be so designated. This

is the week during which the annual Lynn County Pioneer Reunion is held each year.

John Ed Redwine, president of the Reunion Association this year, says the reunion probably will be on Saturday, June 27, pending approval by officers of the board.

If this date is set, the Lynn County historical marker will probably be dedicated at that time. Final approval of the marker and its wording has been made by the Lynn County Commissioners Court and the Texas State Historical Survey Committee, according to Frank Hill, Lynn county marker chairman.

More Vocational Education In THS

The Board of Education of Tahoka Independent School District has given approval for a new unit of Cooperative Distributive Education and for the re-direction of a portion of a Vocational Agriculture unit. This portion of a Vocational Agriculture unit will also be a cooperative unit. The term cooperative unit as used here means that the student will attend school a portion of the day and will work a portion of the day in a local business place. The business will cooperate with the school in training the student in the particular skills involved in the business where the student works.

The cooperative agriculture unit will utilize work stations where agricultural skills are involved. V.P. Carter and Lester Adams, Vocational Agricultural teachers will teach the classroom portion of the cooperative agriculture, work with employers to formulate training plans and supervise the students in their work stations. Students enrolled in cooperative agriculture are not required to have a project program while a project program is a must for production agriculture. Through this year, production agriculture and home economics have been the only vocational programs offered in Tahoka Schools. The Distributive Education

Program will utilize work stations where distributive skills are involved. A full time teacher will be employed for Distributive Education. This teacher will teach Distributive Education classes in the early part of the day and spend the latter part of the day in supervising students on their work stations. He will also work with employers in formulating training plans for students. This program is a bonus unit which means that the teacher will be provided under the minimum foundation program.

These two programs will enable approximately thirty Junior and Senior students to secure some valuable training toward a vocation. Students will be paid by employers but may be paid at a rate less than the prevailing wage as this is a training program.

Local businesses will be contacted in the near future with an explanation of the proposed programs and to solicit their participation.

Farmers Urged To Check On Cotton Seed Treatment

Cotton producers are urged to take a careful look at the information tag on their cotton seed for the coming season.

The reason for this is to become acquainted with the type of fungicide being used in treating the seed and to check if it is one of those suggested for use, explains Dr. Robert W. Berry of Lubbock, area plant pathologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Volatile mercurial fungicides have been used in the past and have given effective seed protection, Berry points out. However due to recent developments, these chemicals have been banned from interstate shipment by the Federal Drug Administration and will probably not be used after this season. Existing supplies can still be used.

"Two non-mercurial fungicides that have performed well in tests and that are suggested for use are Captan and Terra-coat," says the plant pathologist. "These have compared favorably to the mercurial chemicals. However, more care must be taken to assure proper seed coverage when using the non-mercurial compounds."

Mercurial fungicides that were suggested for use and that have been used widely include Ceresan L and M, Ortho LM, De Pester MMH, Panogen 15, PCNB plus Ceresan L or M and PCNB plus Panogen 15. These have now been deleted from the list of suggested fungicides.

"Seed treatment is important," explains Berry, "in that it protects the seed from seed and soil borne disease organisms until germination. Seed treatment, however, does not

protect the seedling from diseases, such as post-emergence damping off. It protects only the immediate area around the seed."

The plant pathologist adds that if the soil has a history of seedling disease, in-covering soil fungicides should be applied at planting time. A number of materials are suggested for this use, and information on this is available from county agricultural agents.

Berry emphasizes the need for planting high quality seed, even with proper fungicide treatment. "Usually untreated high quality seed will perform better than poor quality seed that has been treated."

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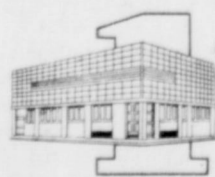

Bill Griffin, County Agent, Says.....

An all-out effort to increase agricultural income in Texas by \$1 billion by the end of the 1976 crop year has been announced by Dr. John E. Hutchison, director, Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The program objective is to further develop the tremendous potential for agricultural income in Lynn County and for all other counties of the state.

The slogan for the program, "3.76 in '76" is significant for it marks the centennial year of Texas A&M University, the state's land grant university. Too, the agricultural income of Texas is now approximately \$2.76 billion and the \$1 billion increase would achieve the 3.76 figure.

The program is specifically planned to close the gap between average and potential yields of all economically important agricultural commodities produced in Lynn County and will utilize improved marketing practices. The program is designed to increase both the gross and net income of producers.

Linda Huffaker, CHD Agent, Says.....

Food packages are big business these days; millions of dollars are spent each year on package design alone.

New packages continually are coming on the market. Some of these packaging trends are a boon to the consumer. They mean more convenience, better quality and lower price.

But, there are times when the package does none of these. There's the gimmick package that adds little but cost to the product. It seems that the package rather than its contents is for sale. So today's shopper must be constantly alert.

Be sure that what you're buying is what you need and want. Most foods come in a variety of package sizes too.

Remember to select the most economical size for your particular use. Let packaging help you; don't let it be a hindrance to wise, economical purchasing.

Refrigerated unbaked breads, biscuits, pizzas, etc. need special care. The directions on the package state that these products need to be kept under refrigeration. At warm or room temperatures the leavening agent (soda or yeast) will react and the dough may expand and burst the package; if the dough is put into the freezer it will not rise when put into the oven. Read all the instructions on the package for more success with all modern convenience foods. When they say to keep the dough refrigerated the best place is on the second shelf rather than the door shelf.

Britt Robinson Led 1969 Men's Team In T&F All-Round Average

Youth reigned supreme among the 10 shooters selected to earn Trap & Field's All-Around Average Awards for 1969. Six of the 10 winners are age 22 or under, and nine of the 10 are under 35. Ken Jones set a new record in the industry category, and Eddie Long, Garth Henley, Nancy Krebs and Laura Mote joined the winners' list for the first time.

Britt Robinson, former junior star, heads the men's division in the race to determine who performed the best on singles,

handicap and doubles targets during the target-year. It marks the third time Britt has won an All-Around Average Award, having qualified for junior honors in 1961 and 1962.

Robinson placed 14th in the 1968 All-Around Average standings with .9499. In 1961 he averaged .9178 to lead the juniors, and the following year he topped that category with .9219.

Four Accident In Lynn County

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated four accidents on rural highways in Lynn County during the month of March, according to Sergeant Pirtle, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in two persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$1,300.00.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first three months of 1970 shows a total of 20 accidents resulting in one person killed, nine persons, injured, and an estimated property damage of \$22,920.00.

The final entry in the 1969 Texas traffic records has been entered and closed. An all-time record of 3,551 persons killed, an estimated 223,000 suffered injuries, and an estimated property loss of \$955 million was sustained.

Since the death count of 2,254 in 1960, Texas has gained steadily each year. The Sergeant stated, "If the number of deaths continue to increase as they have since 1960 by 1978 they will have increased 100 per cent."

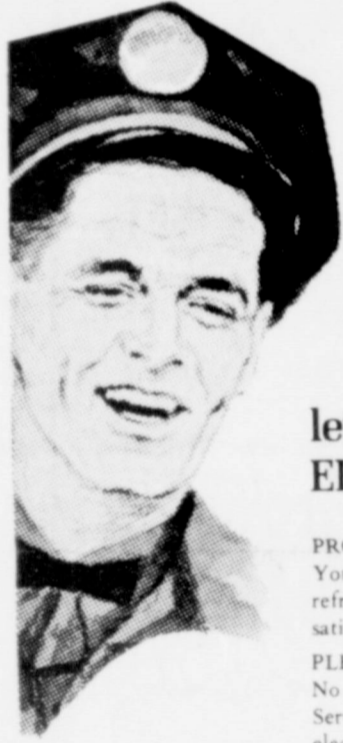
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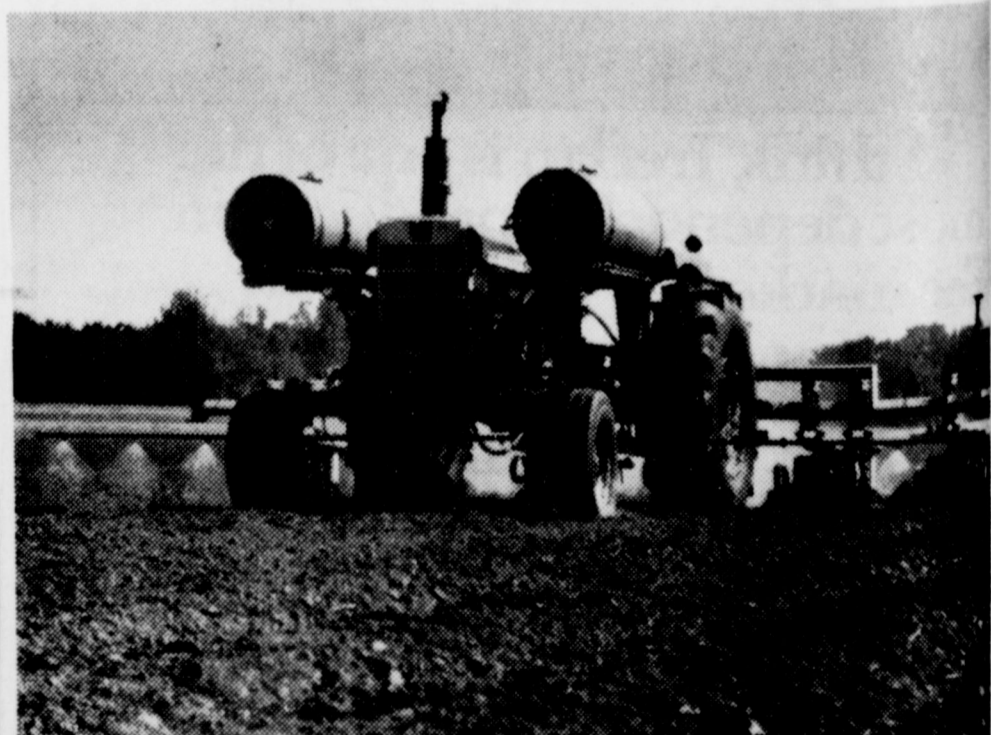

 "My asparagus tips are larger than they were last year because I divided the one big cluster and transplanted it this spring into a bed which provided more room for growth," says Mrs. G.B. Sherrrod, co-operator in the Dixie Home Demonstration Club.
 "I keep the tips cut back and this prolongs the production periods. If they are allowed to become green before I serve them, I use the dish as a green vegetable; if they are cut before they are through the ground, I serve it in the other vegetable group," she added. Mrs. Sherrrod has sufficient vegetables to serve balanced meals now from her asparagus bed, cold frame, and garden. She plans to can the surplus.
