DEMOCRATS FINISH CONVENTION WORK

DAVIS OF SAN ANTONIO ELECT-ED CHAIRMAN BY ACCLA-MATION.

VERY HARMONIOUS MEETING

Platform Committee Declines to Insert West Texas A. & M. College Plank.

Fort Worth.-When the democratic convention convened Wednesday morning, A. D. Rogers of San Antonio, placed in nomination Frank C. Davis of the same city for chairman of the state democratic committee. The nomination was duly seconded. after which it was moved and seconded that the nominations be closed, thereupon Mr. Davis was elected by acclamation.

The convention raised \$56,000 for the national democratic campaign fund; accepted a platform; defeated a minority platform committee report which proposed a plank declaring for the establishment of a west Texas A. & M. college at some indefinite time in the future when the condition of the state treasury might permit such an expenditure; sent congratulatory or encouraging telegrams to President Wilson, to the aged mother of Mr. Neff, to Cox and Roosevelt, to Thomas B. Love, Texas national committeeman, now in the east working in the the national campaign; heard talks from Governor Hobby and Gubernatorial Nominee Neff.

The platform indorses and praises the Wilson and Hobby administration, the national platfrom and nominees and the actions of the Texas delegation at San Francisco. It extends congratulations on the accomplishment of federal woman's suffrage. It commends the conduct of the war under the Wilson administration. It congratulates Texas democrats on the outcome of the recent campaign.

The platform declares against profiteering, condemns present "outrageous prices" and calls upon officers to investigate and punish those who are guilty of prefiteering. It declares for a public utilities commission and the regulation of public service corporations. The profiteering and utilities planks were not in the committee platform, but were adopted separately by the convention, after being approved by the committee.

The platform declares for: Submis sion of a constitutional amendment that only American citizens may vote; for perfecting amendments to the minimum wage law; for a more effective workmen's compensation act; for good roads and federal aid therefor; for redistricting by the next legislature, in congressional, senatorial and representative dist icts; for conservation and the development of our natural resources; for adequate support of the state health department; for adequate educational and eleemoynary appropriations; for a legislative inquiry intended to lead to tax reforms; for the avoidance of duplication of departmental work and for the combining of departments or agencies where possible: for the placing of all executive functions of the state's agricultural work under the commise sioner of agriculture and the placing of all educational agricultural work under the Texas A. & M. college; for a more efficient warehouse and mar. keting system; for judicial reform; for the encouragement of the establishment of factories and industries; for neighborhood centers; for collective bargaining and for the protection of all persons in all rights to which the law entitles them; for home ownership.

No mention was made of the Neff land plank.

Lee Satterwhite presented the minority report, seeking a west Texas A. & M. college plank. The west Texas delegation made a determined and spirited floor fight for that plank, but it was defeated by a convention vote of 378 to 522.

FARMERS ARE HOLDING MOST OF WHEAT CROP

Reports Insist Price to Soon Go to \$3 a Bushel.

Washington.-Farmers are now withholding from market approximately 500,000,000 bushels of wheat long since harvested, according to the best estimate obtainable here from government

"They want to be in a position to take advantage of any increase in price that may occur,' said Grain Expert Beasley of the bureau of markets. Wheat now is selling around \$2.50 per bushel. Reports have long per sisted that it may go to \$3.

According to unofficial estimates here, this is the record of the 1920 wheat crop, spring and winter, to date: Wheat harvested 740,940,000 bushels, or about 93.2 per cent of the esti-

MAKING NO EFFORT TO

GOVERNMENT REMAINS SILENT ON RADICAL WORKERS IN FACTORIES.

Loadon.-One peculiar phase of the Italian situation which is more or less puzzling the French and British statesmen is the attitude of "neutrality" which the Italian government is pursuing towards the industrial war now being waged throughout the metal working cities of that country.

The government has made no effort to drive out the radical workers who are in possession of some of the factories. Nor has it made any serious attempt to bring employers and the euddenly established "soviets" together, although it has advanced one or two proposals, more in the light of suggestions than anything else, to relieve the situation.

But the government refuses to deal with the situation as a menace to its own safety, and is apparently unconcerned over the radical turn of affairs, which might easily develop into industrial revolution, if not political, The strikers maintain their positions

in the factory with little trouble. Few riots or outbreaks have occurred since they ensconsed themselves securely behind the factory walls, and no attempt has been made to force them to relinquish the seized prop-Recently, when an alarm was sound-

ed in Milan, leading the strikers to believe that an attack was to be made, there was a general rush to the factories by wives and children of the men on guard. It was evident that the strikers had planned to use their relatives as a "means of defense," believing that the government would not fr.e upon women and children.

France, because it has already fought down and beaten a revolutionary movement which, however, did not get to the stage of the present revolt in Italy, is keenly interested in the situation because the establishment of a soviet system so close to absolute menace.

England, facing industrial trouble continually, and with an Irish crisis on her hands, is also watching the turn of events with some concern.

CAR MEN SUBMIT TO ARBITRATION

Effort of Communists to Stir Up Trouble in Brooklyn Fails.

New York.-The Brooklyn rapid transit strike and all questions at is: sue between the company and the men will be submitted to an arbitrator for settlement, 3,500 strikers decided at a mass meeting in Brooklyn.

The action was taken on the recommendation of William D. Mahon. international president of the Street Car Men's Union.

The meeting came to the decision to arbitrate in spite of the attempts of radical elements to stir up trouble in the meeting. An anarchistic circular, purporting to be issued by "the communist party of America" was the chief means used by the radicals to

stir up the feeling among the strikers. The circular was a violent attack on officials of the union, on city and government authorities and officials of the Brooklyn Rapid Transit company.

I. A Father's Wise Counsel (vv.19-

1. What it is (v. 20). "Be not among winebibbers; among riotous eaters of flesh." This means persons who meet together for the express purpose of drinking intoxicating liquors and eating purely for the gratification of their appetites. Wine bibbing and gluttony usually go together.

2. Reason given (v. 21). drunkard and the glutton shall come to poverty." Intemperance in drinking and eating leads to ruin. Poverty inevitably follows in their wake. II. Woes of Those Who Indulge in

Wine (vv. 29, 30). The miseries attached to the drunkard's life:

1. The awful pain which causes one to cry out "Oh!" Many, indeed, are the pains which men suffer because of strong drink.

2. Sorrow-the remorse which causes one to cry out "Alas!" Many are the expressions of bitter regret which daily come from the lips of the drunkard. Sometimes it is the sorrow of poverty of himself and family -clothed in rags and half starved; sometimes it is the sorrow of following a broken-hearted wife to the grave and seeing his children scattered among strangers.

3. Contention-strife and quarreling. Much of the fighting among men is directly caused by their passions being inflamed by strong drink. The drunken man is always ready to take offense, as well as to give it.

4. Babblings and complainings. The winebibber complains of everything; ill luck, broken fortune, ruined health, loss of friends, of fate and of God.

5. Wounds without a cause. These are wounds which might have been avoided-from fightings in which a sober man would not have engaged, and from accidents which are purely the result of intoxication.

6. Redness of eyes. This has reference to the bloodshot eye of the tippler which renders dim his vision.

All these woes come upon those who tarry long at wine (v. 30). Those who frequent the places of drinking soon are tarrying long at wine. III. The Attitude Enjoined (v. 31)

Look not at it. Do not put yourself in the way of temptation. The only safe attitude toward strong drink is total abstinence, and the only sure way of total abstinence is not to even look at it.

IV. The Drunkard's Bitter End (vv. 32-35).

4. He is insensible to pain (v. 35) The drunkard is utterly ignorant of what happens to him while under the influence of strong drink. Many bruises and wounds the drunkard has which he cannot account for. 5. His abject bondage (v. 35). After

all his suffering, sorrow, and disappointments, he goes on as a bond slave to follow the ways of sin. 6. Hell at last, for no drunkara shall inherit the kingdom of heaver

A SYMPOSIUM OF SALADS.

There is never a sameness in the art of salad making, for one has an



infinite variety from which to choose raw materials. Cooked food, odds and ends of leftovers which would otherwise be wasted, may go into the salad bowl and become an attractive dish, with a wellprepared and an appro priate dressing.

Fisherman's Salad.

Take two pounds of cooked fish, one pound of boiled potatoes, a quarter of a head of white cabbage; season with salt and pepper. After flaking the fish and shredding the cabbage add cayenne pepper to season well, one cucumbers. Mix all together and serve with any good salad dressing.

Potato Salad.

The best potato salad is made with potatoes cooked especially for the salad and seasoned before they become cold. Boil small-sized potatoes with their skins on, peel and cut in cubes, add seasonings of salt and pepper and marinate with a thin dressing-either a cooked dressing thinned with cream or a well seasoned French dressing. Dressing them while warm sends the seasoning through them and makes a much more palatable salad. Minced onion, fresh mustard finely minced, a handful of blanched and shredded almonds and a cucumber or two will make the finest kind of a salad, providing the salad dressing is a good well seasoned one. Just before serving add the thick salad dressing and the cucumber unless kept very cold will lose its crispness.

Simple Tomato Salad.

Scald and peel perfectly ripe tomatoes of uniform size. Place in a dish and cover with ice and salt for half an hour to chill thoroughly. Rub a salad bowl with the cut side of a clove of garlic and arrange the crisp, tender leaves of the heart of head lettuce as a lining to the salad bowl. Arrange the tomatoes cut in quarters or if small cut in quarters without separating the pieces and pour over a good mayonnaise dressing which has been seasoned with minced onion.

Veal Salad.

Cook a small piece of veal in a broth made of chicken bones and water, or cook the veal with the chicken. Let the meat cool in the broth, then cut it in small cubes; mix with celery and salad dressing and it will be hard to tell from a chicken salad.

Chicken which will not cook tender may be made so by the addition of a teaspoonful of alcohol in the water. Vinegar will also soften the fiber of meat, a tablespoonful to the kettle of

To make mint extract, pick the fresh leaves of mint, wash and dry and pack into a bottle as full as possible; cover with alcohol and let stand two weeks, then strain and bottle for future use. This is the real stuff and one need not fear to use it.

Buckles, beads and buttons of pelished steel may be beautifully cleaned by covering with unslaked lime and leaving for a short time.

Suede shoes or slippers may be rubbed with emery paper and they will look like new.

Dry bran is very valuable for cleaning purposes, as is cornmeal. Reb it into fur, where the solled spots are, rub harder, then brush off. Ermine and delicate furs are cleaned well in this way.

Velvet coat collars and collars of mens' coats may be cleaned eastly with cornmeal wet with gasoline and rubbed well into the pile of the velvet or collar and then brushed out. Care should be taken to keep away from all

Gasoline Consumption.
