District Court.

District Court convened Monday June 3, with Judge J. M. Morgan, of the 50th. District, presiding.

The grand jury was impaneled and court adjourned until Tuesday morning.

The first case, was that of, Jack Alley and B. G. Sweet vs. Isadora Millhouse et al.—Suit to perfect title, to Sect. 487, Blk. 1, or the Tahoka town site.—Decision for the plaintiffs, and title perfected.

J. T. Lofton vs. J. T. Miller et al.—Continued by agreement.

T. L. Spratt vs. John Green.—Tried before Judge Morgan, and a verdict rendered for the defendant R. A. Henderson.

June 5th. M. E. Gilmore vs. A. L. Lockwood.—Continued by the plaintiff.

State of Texas vs. C. C. Crisswell, No. 87.—Verdict of acquittal.

State of Texas vs. C. C. Crisswell, No. 82; Taylor Callison, Nos. 86 and 92, and Houston Bostick, Nos. 88 and 93: All dismissed.

June 6th. The Grand Jury returned one indictment, and were discharged.

W. N. Copeland vs. W. L. Ellwood et al.—Continued to perfect service.

June 7. State of Texas vs. Frank Scott Greenwood.—Jury failed to agree, and the case was continued for trial at the next term of court.

R. M. Ellerd vs. R. M. Cox et al.—Change of venue to Hale county granted.

W. B. Preston Jr. had his disabilities removed.

In the Crisswell case, L. C. Penry the district attorney, represented the state, while W. R. Spencer, of Brownfield, and W. D. Benson, of Lubbock, were attorneys for the defendant.

G. W. Perryman, of Tahoka, and W. D. Benson-defended Greenwood, and L. C. Penry represented the state.

The attorneys in the Spratt-Henderson case were: Benson, Beal and McDougale for the plaintiff and Perryman, Dalton and Furgerson for the defendant.

Judge Woodruff, of Sweetwater, was attending court here last week.

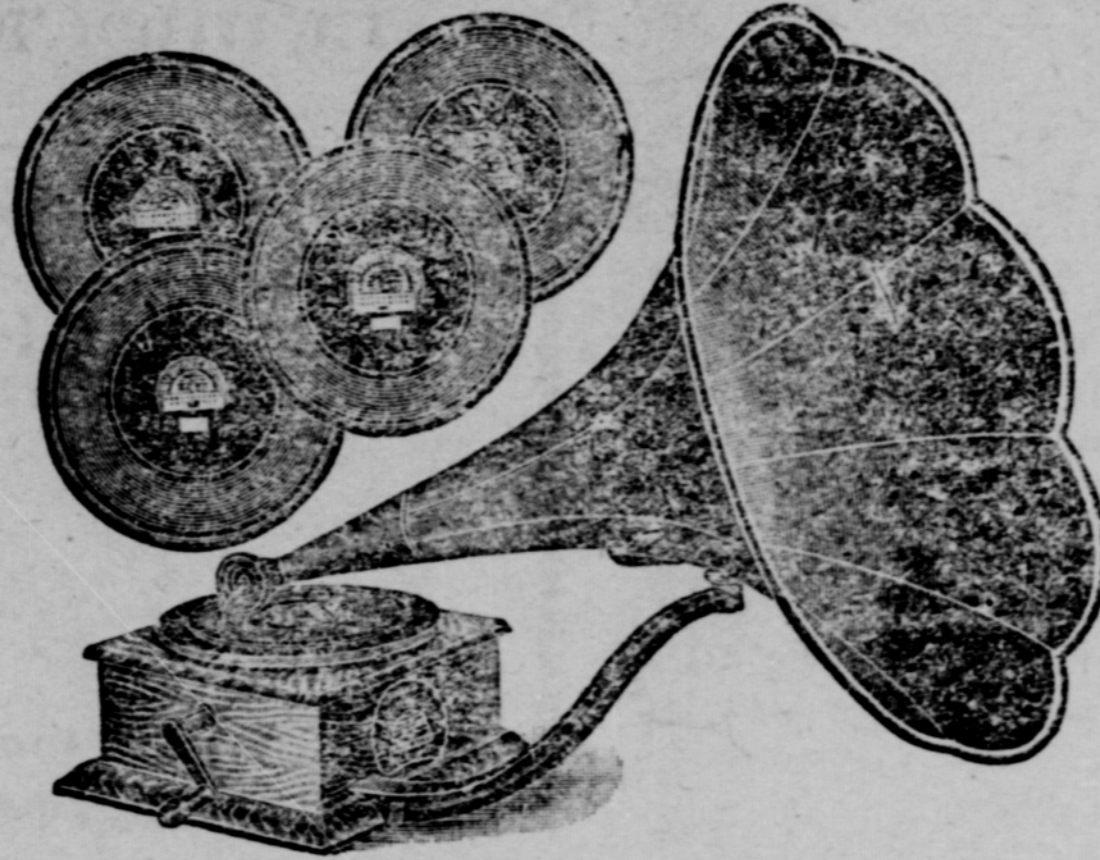


A Fish Fry
