lowed by a number of growers. The steel toothed garden rake is one of the best hand tools for cultiating the soil about young plants. A crop of cornstalks cut well out into fine pieces and well worked into the soil is worth as much as a coat-

The early potato patch can be turned into a plat for turnips, late sweet corn or buckwheat as soon as the tubers are removed.

Very fine fruit and large yields can be secured from tomatoes by setting posts and running horizontal wires similar to the grape trellis.







Potatoes Baked Therein Will Be More Satisfactory Than Where Oven is Very Hot.

Baked potatoes are a staple article of diet in most families. They are inexpensive and easy to prepare. Yet constantly as they are used it is rare to find one well baked-the skin is either burned or the contents are not

Do not have the oven too hot for baked potatoes. If they are done in a moderate heat for a longer time they will be more evenly cooked.

Pricking the small end of a potato with a fork before putting in the oven will keep the skin from bursting. A German cook noted for her de-

To Clean and Polish Old Furniture. Take one quart of vinegar, a handful of common salt and a tablespoonful of muriatic acid. Boil for 15 minutes and pour into a bottle. This may be warmed when used. First, wash the furniture with warm water, then go over it carefully with the above mixture. Then polish with the following furniture polish: Four ounces of shellac, 2 pints of alcohol, 2 pints of linseed oil, 1 pint of turpentine; when mixed add 4 ounces of sulphuric ether and 4 ounces of ammonia water. Shake when used and apply with sponge lightly.





The First Fourth of July.

A Letter Written by John Adams to a Friend the Day After the Declaration of Independence, Reproduced from a Newspaper in the Possession of W. S. McCrea of Chicago.

Philadelphia, July 5, 1776.

"Yesterday the greatest question was decided which was ever decided among men. A resolution was passed unanimously, 'That these United States are, and of right ought to be, free and independent States."

"The day is passed. The 4th of July, 1776, will be a memorable epoch in the history of America. I am apt to believe it will be celebrated by succeeding generations, as the GREAT ANNIVERSARY FESTIVAL! It ought to be commemorated as the day of deliverance, by solemn acts of devotion to the Almighty God. It ought to be solemnized with pomps, shows, games, sports, guns, bells, bonfires, and illuminations - from one end of the continent to the other, from this time foreber! You will think me transported with enthusiasm; but I am not. I am well aware of the toil, and blood, and treasure, it will cost to maintain this declaration, and support and defend these States; yet, thro' all the gloom, I can see a ray of light and glory. I can see that the end is worth more than all the means; and that posterity will triumph, although you and I may rue - which I hope we shall not.




