told Mrs. Jackson. The pancake mix, butter, and syrup will be donated by Billy Wason, local grocer as his donation to the scouting effort in Motley County.

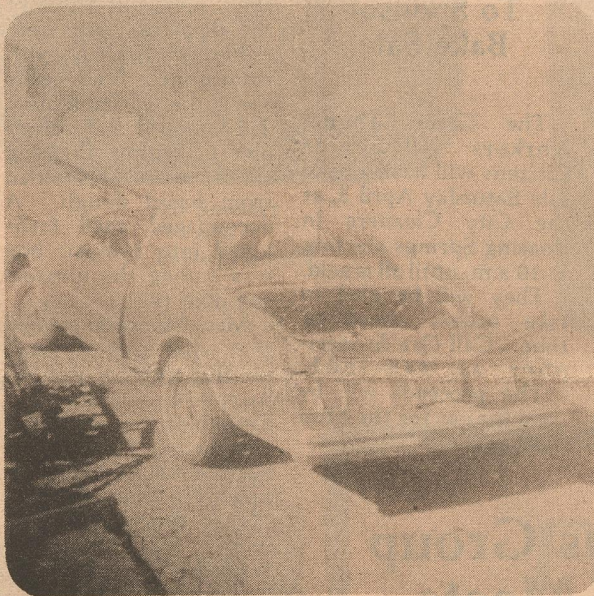
The boys are trying to raise \$500 which will be their share of dues paid this year to the South Plains Council of Scouting.

The mile relay team placed 2nd with a 3:38.8, which was also the best time of the year. David Walker, Charlie Campbell, Harvey Lee and Bezell Moore are on the mile relay team.

Charlie Campbell placed 4th in the 100 dash with a time of 10.6; Bezell Moore was 1st in the 220 with 22.9; Harvey Lee placed 4th in the 440 with

54.6; Mark Guerrero, 3rd in the 880 with 2.15 and Dennis Gwinn was 3rd in the Mile Run with 5.14.

Glen Calvert won the shot put with a throw of 50' 1 1/2", and Harvey Lee placed 6th with 37' 9". Calvert was 3rd in the discus with a throw of 134' 5".

Bezell Moore won 1st in the Long Jump with 20' 8" and 5th in the High Jump with 5' 6".

In the girls meet the 400 meter relay team placed 1st with a time of 52.3. Running on the team were Cindy Johnson, Pamela Pitts, Gwen

Calvert and Sharlene Smith.

The 800 meter relay team placed 4th with a time of 1:56.9. Girls on that team were Derinda Cruse, Miss Pitts, Miss Johnson and Miss Calvert.

Sharlene Smith won 1st in the 220 dash with a time of 25.7 and Cindy Johnson placed 4th with 27.7.

Sharlene won first in the 100 dash with 12.5, and first in the long jump with 17' 2". Gwen Calvert placed 6th in the 100 with a time of 13.8.

Egg Art Described For Club Members

Faberge eggs might be more bedecked with genuine jewels, but those displayed Thursday (March 27) by Mrs. O.R. Moore of Iowa Park, at regular meeting of the El Progreso Club were just as dazzling.

Mrs. Moore was guest speaker at the meeting in the Methodist Church Fellowship hall, and brought an exhibit of some 50 eggs which she had decorated during the two years she has been engaged in this art form. One of her creations has received honorable mention at a National Egg Show.

"Eggersy is one of the oldest of arts," Mrs. Moore explained. "It originated in Russia about two thousand years ago." The famous Faberge egg is perhaps the best known, she said. "I work on any type of egg, but the easiest, or least likely to break is the ostrich egg." The hen egg, she said, breaks the easiest and is used the least of all. Goose, quail and pheasant eggs are popular for use when available.

Jewel boxes, from ostrich eggs, complete with hinged lids, made from the top side of the egg, a bird cage with a miniature bird, and hinged butterfly ornaments cut from the egg shell, were but a few of the displays. All were richly decorated with rhinestones, braid, beads and other ornaments. Tiny dolls and other objects within the egg shells were fashioned from bread dough. A decouped shell fashioned into a music box was among the unusual egg objects.

Mrs. Moore explained that she used a small electric tool for cut-out purposes, then re-assembled the eggs into the various forms. Her subject was "Art and The Egg" for the program, "Eggsperiment," and the whole was aptly described as "Eggs-quisite."

Mrs. Moore was introduced by Mrs. C.D. Garrison, program leader. Mrs. Robert Darsey presided in the absence of the president, Mrs. Franklin Price, and a report on the Santa Rosa District Convention, March 14-15 in Burkburnett was given by Mrs. Harold Campbell. Attending the convention were Mesdames Harold Campbell, L.B. Campbell, Robert Darsey and Franklin Price.

Mrs. Darsey received first place in evening gown competition in the Fashions For Fun Style show, and the club received three awards. A second place award was received in each of the three program categories, on FREE (Federation's Role in our Enterprise Economy), on

a Pioneer Personalities program, and on a program on Energy, which was a field trip to Crosbyton, to visit a solar energy plant and a solar energy home. The club's yearbook received a grade of 95 out of a possible 100 points.

Mrs. Phil Green, Department Chairman of FREE gave an interesting report, and concluding the program was the Inspirational Thought by Mrs. A.B. Simpson, who also shared with the club, some historical information about Texas.

Following the program, Mrs. Joe Campbell and Mrs. Harold Campbell served refreshments of punch and coffee, finger sandwiches and cookies.

Southwestern Public Service Company today filed a request with the 66 cities it serves in Texas for an increase in its retail rates. The request, if approved, would increase Southwestern's revenues by 14.78 percent.

Information outlining SPS's needs was presented to city officials on January 28.
