Registration of **Voters Exceeds Early Estimates**

Vote registration in Motley County has exceeded early estinates. At closing time yesterday the office of Sheriff, Tax Assessor and Collector J. D. Spray had registered 1,407 but 31 had registered twice, which leaves a total of 1,376.

Yesterday 35 registered by closing time of the office and it was estimated that others might come through the mail. An application postmarked yesterday would qualify if the office receives it within 5 days.

Previously it was estimated that the voting strength of the county might be 900 to 1,100. County Agent Bill Pallmeyer said the latest census of the county is about 2800, which indicates the motions of a moving autoqualified voters.

The late F. M. Conover, Mrs. Stanley's father took the instrument on a debt about 1919 and it had been in the family since that time. Mrs. Stanley acquired the piano about a year ago after the death of her mother. Jody McBrayer of McBrayer Piano Co., took the instrument to Lubbock and completely reconditioned and refinished it. It has a metal plate casting with crossover stringing by which the lower strings cross the others diagonally. Total tension on the plate is 30 tons. The bass strings are over 70 inches in length. It has a pure maple soundboard. The cabinet is rosewood and the legs are gum.



mists are saying and inding out about pasture profits in the Midwest and South: ALABAMA—Six cattlemen recently took part in pasture fertilizer demonstrations in co-operation with Auburn University and were amazed by the results. The six cooperators ex-perienced an average \$2.00 return in value for every \$1.00 they invested in lime and fertilizer for pastures. Under normal weather conditions their county agent figured Alabama farmers could expect \$4 to \$6 net return per dollar invested

in this way.



Repeat this application in May or June to extend grazing well into the summer when supplemental crops like sudan grass may help carry the herd. Adequate nitogen on improved grass can make one acre do the job of two.


