Winter Storm Cuts Path Across Texas

AT THE DAWN of spring another winter storm, approaching the blizzard classification, cut its way across Texas late Sunday. The front presented blowing dust, rain, hail, sleet and snow, with a "no damage" tornado on the Plains.

Following high winds Saturday, rain was falling Sunday morning and continued to increase during the afternoon. Colder air struck Sunday night, with snow and sleet Monday. The mercury drop-

ped to below the freezing point as the snow continued to fall, driven by a stiff north wind.

The warm earth melted much of the snow as it fell but accumulations of two or three inches were received in this area. More snow was reported south of here. Post reported as much as seven inches.

Roads were closed in the north Panhandle and many schools were closed as drifts made it impossible for busses to operate. Roads in this area were "slushy" and travel hazardous, but travel continued.

Despite the return of warmer temperatures and clear skies, some snow was still on the ground yesterday.

Bob Stanley's rain gauge caught about .35-inch of moisture to bring the total moisture this year to 5.46 inches as compared to only .27-inch for the same period last year.

Available Workers Major Influence to Industry Location

Most industries seeking new locations are interested in the available labor supply in the area. A group of business men in the county are attempting to secure as much information as possible regarding this area's available labor.

At present the group has no definite organization other than the title, "Motley County Development Committee." As progress is made on the project, a definite organization will be announced.

Last week the Tribune published an advertisement urging those available for work to fill out a form and mail it to Post Office Box 173, here in Matador. The same advertisement appears in this issue and will appear again next week.

The movement is started from information gained from other counties which have secured industries. Also the Texas Employment Commission has offered to set up an office and make a more complete survey, if enough interest is shown.

It is pointed out that an industry anywhere in the county would aid the economic image of the entire county, and it is hoped the businessmen in all communities will enlist their services to the labor supply survey. All persons over 16 years of age are eligible to sign up.

Lakes Trail to Surprise Most Texans With Inland Waters 2nd to Alaska

AUSTIN—In a recent nationwide survey, people who take vacations regularly were asked what they would not expect to find in Texas. Most frequently they listed lakes.

This surprises most Texans, especially when the state is second only to Alaska in volume of inland water. It was only natural then that the Texas Lakes Trail be included as one of the 10 Travel Trails announced by Gov. John Connally here January 17 at the third annual Governor's Tourist Development Conference.

At least six of the state's major bodies of water are included on the estimated 697-mile trip, including sprawling Lake Texoma on the Texas-Oklahoma border. One of the world's largest artificial reservoirs, it covers 144,100 acres with a shoreline of over 1,000 miles. Other major bodies of water along the route are Lake Whitney, Lake Tawakoni, Garza Little-Elm Reservoir, Cedar Creek Reservoir, Lake Worth, Navarro Mills Reservoir, Cleburne Reservoir, Lake Weatherford, Benbrook Reservoir, Lavon Reservoir, Grapevine Reservoir, Mountain Creek Reservoir and Bardwell Reservoir.

There are more than 200 lakes in Texas with at least 5,000 surface acres. Naturally all lakes could not be included on one tour, but Travel Trail committee members believe the ones chosen clearly emphasize the magnitude of Texas water resources for power and recreation. Two mammoth reservoirs are still under construction—Amistad, on the Rio Grande River near Del Rio and Toledo Bend, on the Sabine River.

Counties on the Lakes Trail are Bosque, Cooke, Dallas, Denton, Fannin, Grayson, Henderson, Hill, Hood, Hunt, Johnson, Lamar, Navarro, Rains, Somerville, Tarrant, Van Zandt and Wise.

The northern rim of the Lakes Trail follows State Highway 69 through Sherman, Denison and into Bonham, location of the Sam Rayburn Library. This library was established to preserve the books, documents and other his-

torical papers of the man who served as speaker of the U. S. House of Representatives longer than any other.

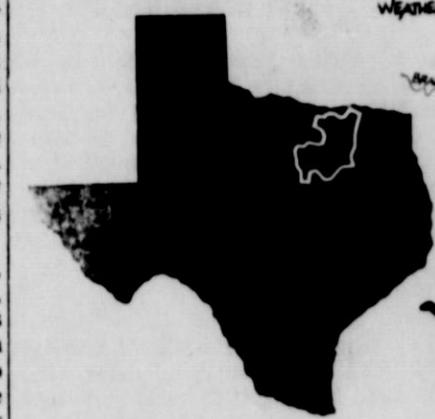
Continuing east as far as Paris, the trail turns southward to Commerce, home of East Texas State College and on to Greenville and Canton, site of a most unusual event. The first Monday of every month is "trades day" in Canton and people arrive from throughout East Texas to buy and swap their wares including everything from fine china to hound dogs.

The trail circles Cedar Creek Reservoir near Malakoff and continues to Corsicana, hometown of the fruit cake baked by Collin Street Bakery since 1896. Navarro Junior College is here and the Navarro County Historical Society has constructed a pioneer village in the city park. The trail leads south to Hubbard and north again to Hillsboro, gateway to Lake Whitney where there is no closed fishing season. Architecture of the Hill County courthouse in Hillsboro has been the subject of many stories.

Swinging up to Covington, Blum and back down to Whitney, the trail circles the lake and goes as far south as Clifton. From here it travels north again to Meridian and Meridian State Park. Located off State Highway 22 southwest of town, the park offers facilities for camping, picnicking, fishing, boating and swimming.

Next comes Glen Rose via State Highway 144. Discovery of dinosaur tracks in the Paluxy River creekbed has made this Somervell County community the meeting place for geologists and paleontologists from across the world.

Granbury and Weatherford are the next stops. Acton State Park in Granbury is the grave site of Elizabeth Crockett, second wife of Davy Crockett. Weatherford is noted for its beautiful Chandor Gardens, inspired and built by English portrait painter Douglas Chandor. In spring and early summer, countless shrubs, flowers and vines are in full bloom. Dore's Doll Museum and a rock hound museum are other inter-



esting places to visit.

The trail loops above Fort Worth and Dallas, as each traveler must decide how much time he wishes to spend seeing the many attractions these twin cities have to offer. Just off the trail is Arlington's popular "Six Flags Over Texas" theme park.

After a tour around Garza Little-Elm Reservoir, the next stop on the Lakes Trail is Denton, home of two universities, an excellent museum featuring Civil War relics and Pilot Knob Hill

where outlaw Sam Bass hid from pursuing lawmen. Northward again, the trail passes Gainesville, site of Cooke County Junior College.

COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:

Zinc is another micronutrient that is needed by plants, but in large amounts, can be quite toxic. Only 300 parts are required, while 2,000 of iron are needed. Deficiency symptoms are indicated by stunted growth; resetting; failure of seed to form; mottled discoloration of leaves that are thickened and have cupped edges; and the entire leaf becoming bleached, including the veins.

Corrections may be made by spray applications of 2 lbs. per 100 gallons of water, or applied in the soil at the rate of 10 lbs. per acre. Availability of zinc decreases with the increase in pH, and high levels of phosphorus. Crops that have shown zinc deficiency signs are pecans, grain sorghum, cotton, peanuts, grass crops and tomatoes. As for iron deficiency, one way to determine if zinc is needed is to treat a small area of the deficient plants, and see if the plants respond. Tests for zinc are available, but if you do your testing by application, then you know exactly what your plants need.

As spring planting time rolls around, remember that no crop can be better than the seed planted.

There are many varieties of each crop, and they vary in yielding ability and other characteristics important to production, so be sure the variety selected is adapted to this area.

All seed offered for sale must have a Texas Tested Seed Label attached, except when one farmer sells to another and when the selling farmer does not advertise outside his home county, or ship by a common carrier. The percentage of pure seed, inert material, or other crop and weed

seed, must be shown on the label and should add up to 100%.

Buying certified seed is the best guarantee of variety purity. Certified seed must meet certain standards of perfection and should be the best seed of a particular variety available.

It's good business to buy seed from a reliable retailer or seed producer who stands behind the product he sells. Watch out for "miracle varieties" that often appear on the scene. I have information on the best adapted varieties for this county which is based on research of more than one year. Much of this will be included in Result Demonstration Handbooks, which will be distributed soon. If you don't receive a copy, and would like one, let me know.

Finally, don't overlook the germination. The lower the germination, the more seed you will have to plant for a satisfactory stand, and often low germination seed are the highest priced you can plant.

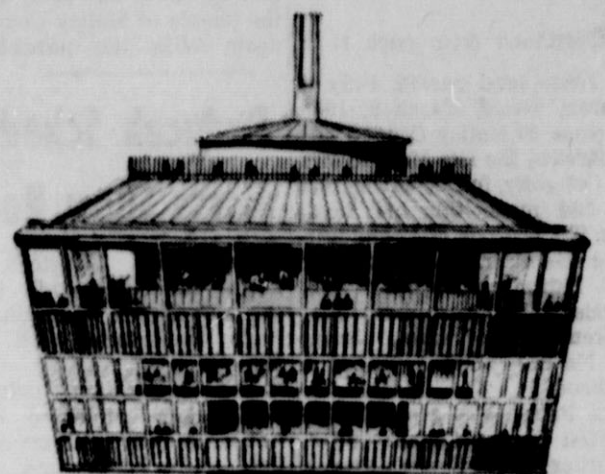
Are grubs costing you money? Several steers were sifted at the State Fair of Texas in 1967 because of an overabundance of grubs, and by viewing the carcasses of those animals and others in the coolers of Texas Meat at Dallas, approximately 60% had some grub damage.

In a large number of steers, the damage entailed trimming of all the covering over the loin down to lean. This is a tremendous loss in money to the packing industry unless they dock the seller enough to cover this loss. What do you think they do to offset this loss? The loss would amount to about \$6.00 per head.

Effective grub control can be easily accomplished through treatments with a systemic grubicide at a cost of less than 50c per animal. Systemic grubicides can be administered as sprays, pour-ons or as feed additives, with directions given in MP-691, Texas Guide for Controlling External Parasites of Livestock & Poultry. This publication is free at my office, and you will note that for best results and to minimize possible adverse reactions, animals should be treated after May 1, but not later than Sept. 1. Treatment thus administered will control the grubs that would reach the back the following fall and winter.

Yes, packers are aware of the loss associated with grubs, so to protect yourself from this loss, steps should be taken to keep grubs under control.

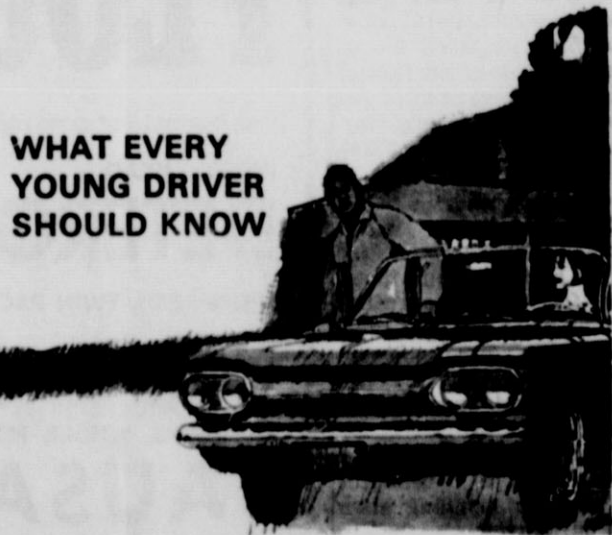

Swine Classes Unchanged
Swine classes will be the same as in 1967, it was announced. Sears gilts, open gilts, bred gilts, sows, light market hogs (190-210 lbs), medium market hogs (211-230 lbs) and heavy market hogs (231-250).

Heifer classes will also remain the same. Light and heavy heifers, 9 to 18 months of age which will be divided into two equal classes, determined by weight.

Steer classes will be the same in the past, but instead of setting weight of classes before the show, all animals will be weighed and divided into three equal classes. Steers must weigh 700 lbs. or more to be eligible for show.

After placing is complete, a maximum of 15 steers and 15 market hogs will be sold at auction. These will be the top 5 animals in each class, and bidders may keep the animal purchased by paying the floor bid price plus the sale premium, or not keep the animal purchased by paying only the sale premium bid.
