MARCH 23, 1951 House Okay's Bill Boosting Cotton Quotos

"Washington, March 16 -- The House passed a bill Thursday adding about 1,250,000 acres to cotton which can be planted under government controls. Texas will get almost half the increase. The same bill, a compromise measure - added 100,000 acres to peanut allotments - about 48,000 acres for Texas."

MARCH 30, 1950 Black Dusters Cast Gloom On Crop Prospects Prairie Fires and Car Accidents In Sandstorm's Wake

"Rolling 'Black Dusters' and months without rainfall have suspended a shadow of gloom on 1950 crop prospects. Immediate rain could not produce more than 50% average crop.

Over the weekend more prairie fires broke out in the ranch country north of Amarillo to be followed by a series of automobile accidents by blinding dust in the areas of both Lubbock and Amarillo.

MARCH 30,1950 Premeasurement of Cotton Is-Offered

"Cotton growers of Motley County can arrange for official measurement of their 1950 cotton acreage allotment prior to planting.

The rates for this service was established at \$6.00 per farm plus \$1.25 per plot to be planted plus 3 cents per acre in the allotment."


Fire Department receives equipment

Matador Volunteer Fire Department took advantage of equipment aid available from the Texas Forest Service. The department acquired a free flatbed truck, courtesy of the Federal Excess Personal Property (FEPP) equipment program administered by the agency. Under the FEPP program, equipment acquired through the military is transferred to qualifying fire departments at no

The passage of legislation minimizing liability to industrial companies that donate used firefighting equipment for volunteer fire department use has made additional equipment available, and more donations

are likely. Companies interested in donating industrial fire equipment should contact the TFS Rural Fire Defense Section at 409-639-8130 for information on the Industrial Helping Hands program. The value of equipment received to date now exceeds \$4 million.

Volunteer fire departments can also purchase firefighter clothing, hand tools and water handling accessories at discount prices through the Fire Safe program. Fire Safe sales to date exceed \$4.5 million, according to the state forestry agency.







Ruling made on Matador couple's shooting deaths


The deaths of Matador couple, Eugene and Rose Saldana, have been ruled a murder/suicide, according to Motley County Sheriff, Jim Meador. Autopsies were performed in Lubbock last week. Rose Saldana, 43, died of a gunshot wound to the head, and Eugene Saldana, 46, died of a self-inflicted gunshot wound to the head.

Graveside services were held for the couple at the Roaring Springs Cemetery on Saturday.



1. Speak well of that person, not a word of criticism; 2. Think only positive thoughts


about the person;



They are the parents of Lance Jameson of Vernon and Shannon Jameson of Santa Fe, New Mexico. Jameson and the former Lou Earlyne Jameson were married March 24, 1949 in Matador. They have two granddaughters.

A Special Time

March 24, 1949 was the date. A girl, who graduated from high school at the age of 16, enrolled in Harden Simmons University and majored in music, transferred to Texas Tech a year later to become a nurse and was from the big city of Matador, Texas whose population was 1319 at the time.

This was the girl that would sleep until lunch and only got up then because Daddy would make her. Our mother could sleep that late too. She would clean the house only after several threats and a few spankings (I really mean whippings - she was hard headed), and practiced her piano for three or four hours each day and spent most of her younger life tending to me, when she wasn't aggravating me! Believe me, when she was awake she was something else.

Yet this little gal got married to a farm boy from Whiteflat, population 89, who graduated from the same high school, served in Germany during World War II. He had just returned from the service and bought a brand new 4-door '48 Ford. This is a man who couldn't sleep past 6 AM with an overdose of morphine! Now you would have thought he had been through enough in his young life, but this was a man who liked a challenge. Yes, you guessed it. He married into a family who could have a knock down drag out four times a day and

kiss and make up five times a day. I remember thinking when I was lighting the candles at their wedding (do you believe they would let me handle fire in those days) that I'd give this marriage about three to six months. How could these people really be in love? They are as different as night and day. But that shows you what a 14 year old kid knows. LOVE can conquer the universe. It heals all wounds and illnesses. It makes the difference when there are differences. Even when I wrecked your new '48 Ford your love for each other helped you to forgive me. I thought I was a goner at the time, but I survived to wreck again!

This marriage has suffered a loss of a daughter, Connie Lou, and some close calls from a bad accident and serious health problem but there was never a time we had any doubts this marriage was the example that God intended for us to follow. A stronger love would be

Our marriages, Sis, have produced two wonderful families. I know Mom and Dad would be proud of our four boys even though Mom wanted a granddaughter too. Our boys may not have followed in the footsteps we had planned for them, but we did rear them to follow their convictions. Regardless, God is in their hearts and we are very





Abednego Groves was in Maryland when the first Census was taken in 1790. His son, Allison, was born in 1810, in Charles County, Maryland, and died in October, 1880, in Union County, Arkansas. Allison's son Noble William Groves, was born in 1835 in Maryland. He and his wife

Bass, was born in Madisonville, Madison 1932, and Dick in 1933. County, Texas in 1874, and married in 1897 in Mexia, Limestone County, Texas, Minnie Gertrude Hancock. They became the parents of nine children: Velma married William Malbury Fulfer; Bernie married Arvil Kingery; Ruth married Claude Wilson; Fannie Kate married Isaac Clifton Hinson; Johnnie married Clarence Elbert Seigler, Lillard Bernard Groves drowned in Lake Kemp in May, 1929 at age 15, and Donald Allison Groves married Hazel

Frances Ann and Noble William went back "home," from Madisonville, Texas, to Hope, Arkansas for the births of their twins, Algie Alexander and Elbert Bass (AB). The five brothers came to Motley County through Limestone, Haskell, Jones, and Stonewall

Judging from the dates of the births of their children in Motley County, John and Minnie came to Motley County first. Alma Winifred who married Elbert Seigler, was born February 2, 1911 in Motley County: Lillie Mae, daughter of Robert and Susie, was born February 11, 1912. She married Willie Owens. Delbert Groves, who married Minnie Anon Stanley, was born to Noble and Maggie in Motley County, April 15, 1915. Dick Groves was born in the Darden Canyon area to AB and Myrtle, January 31, 1917. Robert Lee and Susie were the first to leave Motley County, going to Sulphur Springs in Hopkins County. Their daughter Lillie Mae Owens came back to Matador School Homecoming as long as she was able. 




New agricultural spending totaling as much as \$6 billion dollars over four years has been announced as part of the House Budget Committee's \$1.74 trillion spending proposal.

The \$6 billion in additional spending authority for agriculture could mean as much as \$1.5 billion a year in additional funding for the crop insurance program. House Agriculture Committee Chairman Larry Combest (R-Lubbock), who has been outspoken in his desire to strengthen the economic safety net for producers, called the money a triumph for America's farmers.

The Senate Budget Committee is expected to pass a similar budget resolution today. The budget resolutions will act as a blueprint for discussion and helps layout priorities for future legislative discussions.

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

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
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
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
