





# COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:

This week I will cover the use and needs of potash, the third major element in crop production. We are lucky in this aspect, as most of the soils in Motley County have sufficient potash available, but if your soil test shows a need for potash, I think you will be well pleased with the results obtained by supplying this element in the needed amounts.

Potash is the regulating element, and aids in the formation of carbohydrates such as sugar and starches. It also aids in the protein production in the plant and promotes cell formation. It improves the quality in plants and frequently increases weight of grain, improves flavor, color and markability of the crop. Straw and stalk parts are strengthened, thus reducing lodging. Root development is aided, and it increases resistance of plants to disease and unfavorable weather conditions, especially increasing winter hardiness.

"Hunger signs" in plants that indicate a need of potash are the

older leaves; slow growth, and weak plants that lodge easily. Seed or fruit that is small and shriveled also indicate the need of potash, and even though soil tests show a high level of potash present, the addition of small amounts has been profitable in many cases. This may be due to the difference in the type of phosphorus supplied in fertilizers, or it may be that the small amount makes more of the potash in the soils available. We hope to try to find the answer to this question by tests to be conducted the next few years. Farmers who are using 20-20-5 to supply the fertilizer needed for a 30-30-0 recommendation in place of using 21-20-0 can help us with this problem.

Unlike phosphorus, potash can be lost by leaching, as it moves in the soil, but not as rapidly as nitrogen. Crops also remove potash from the soil, taking up amounts in excess of plant needs. This "luxury consumption" does not contribute to increased yields however.

The next group of elements are the "secondary plant nutrients". These are calcium, magnesium and sulfur, and will be cov er later. I might ask at this time, are you getting anything from this presentation? or are these facts confusing you? I am only trying to cover the highlights, and not go into detail. If you have a particular question, stop by and let's see if I have some information that will be of value

Don't let evergreen plants dry out during the winter months. Many will lose their evergreens this winter unless they continue to water them through the winter, as you know our normal rainfall during this period is very limited. Don't stop watering because the grass has turned brown, but continue to water periodically.


