Wilburn Burr Barton, 87, resident of the county since 1886, died in his sleep early Friday morning at his home near Flomot, where he had lived for almost 60 years. He had been in failing health for the past several years.

Funeral services were held at 3 p.m. Saturday, at the First Baptist Church, with Rev. Gene Hawkins of Seminole, former pastor of the church, and Rev. Larry Heard, present pastor, officiating. Burial was in East Mound Cemetery under the direction of Seigler Funeral Home. Grandsons served as pallbearers.

Mr. Barton was born June 24, 1880 in Cimarron, Kansas and was six years of age when he came to this area with his father, the late Al Barton, a widower. He was married at Flomot, May 2, 1902 to Miss Ella Orr and they continued to make their home in that community until their respective deaths. Mr. Barton acquired extensive property and engaged in farming and ranching on a wide scale. His wife preceded him in death, December 4, 1959. He passed away November 17, 1967 at the age of 87 years, 4 months and 23 days. He was a member of the Matador I. O. O. F. Lodge.

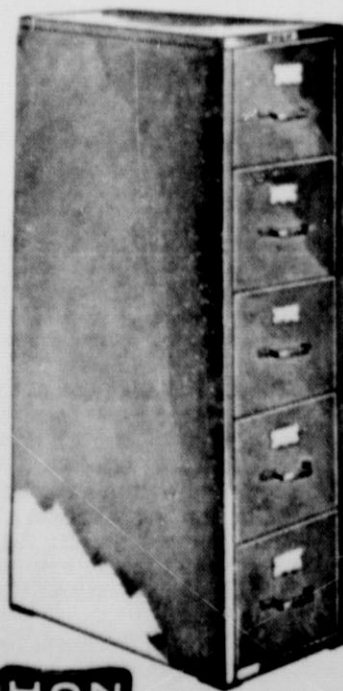

First plan ahead of time what you want to buy, have a weekly menu in mind. Compare values, it takes time, but may save you money.

Avoid frequent trips to the grocery store. The more often you shop the more you spend for food. Studies show the average consumer spends \$7.74 each time he shops in the supermarket. Keeping a list of items you need will help avoid frequent trips and can eliminate much impulse-buying.

Did you know the average American family throws away 1/2 pound of food per person per day. Waste increases the total

PREPARING TURKEY FOR THANKSGIVING

It's time again to think of your Thanksgiving dinner. If you are like most American homemakers, you will buy the traditional turkey within the next few days. Do you know what to look for in the turkey you will buy? Do you know how much to buy? Here are a few suggestions that may help you.

Size of the ready-to-cook bird may range from 4 to 24 pounds and larger-from fryer-roosters to large toms. Practically all commercially grown turkeys are young, quickly grown and suited to such methods of cooking as broiling, frying, and roasting. A boneless cooked turkey roll may be the perfect solution to a small Thanksgiving dinner for a couple that wants the traditional meal, and can not make use of the larger bird. The following is a guide for turkey size and number of servings: Ready-to-cook weight whole turkey of 5 to 8 pounds will yield 6 to 10 servings; 8 to 12 pounds will yield 10 to 20 servings; 12 to 16 pounds will yield 20 to 32 servings; 20 to 24 pounds will yield 40 to 50 servings. In most cases, large turkeys are more economical and

they are excellent for use in future meals.

The majority of housewives will be cooking frozen turkeys. Thawing a large turkey requires special care. Recommended procedures for thawing are: (1) Thaw in the refrigerator in the original wrap on a tray. This requires one to three days, depending on the size of the bird. (2) Thaw the bird, still in its original water-tight wrap under cold running water or immersed in cold water, changing the water frequently. This requires 6 to 7 hours for larger sizes. (3) The latest method is thawing at room temperature. The turkey is kept in a closed paper bag. The bag keeps the temperature low enough to protect quality, and forms its own insulation. The bird must be kept from thawing rapidly in the surface, as bacteria can multiply, and the paper bag keeps a temperature only slightly warmer than the refrigerator around the bird. This will take 16 hours for large birds and 12 hours for smaller ones of 8 to 12 pounds.

Booklets are available from the Home Demonstration Agents office with hints on buying, storage and charts for temperature and cooking time for the meat and poultry. They can be obtained by a phone call, card or visit to the office.

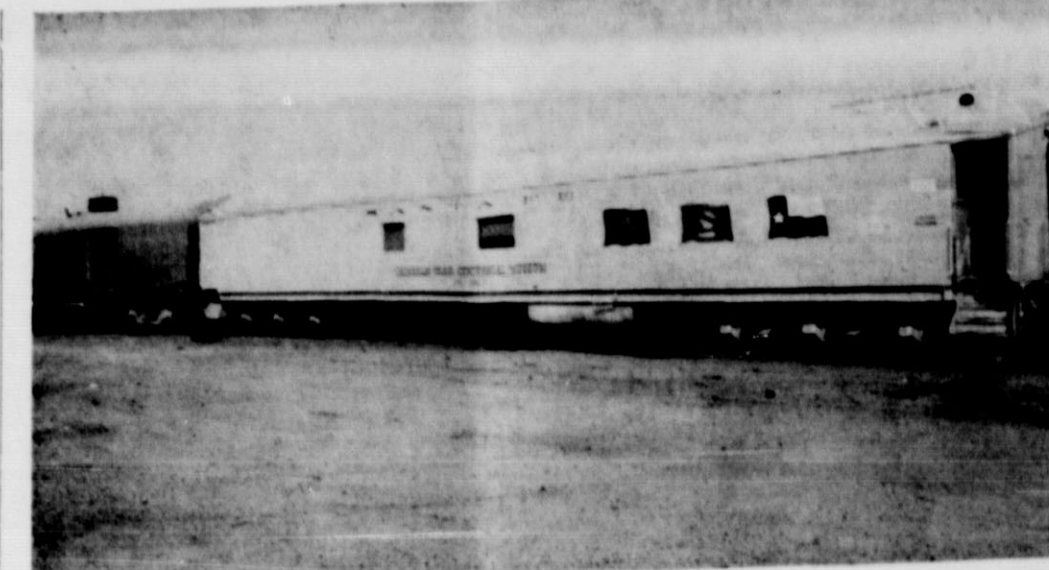

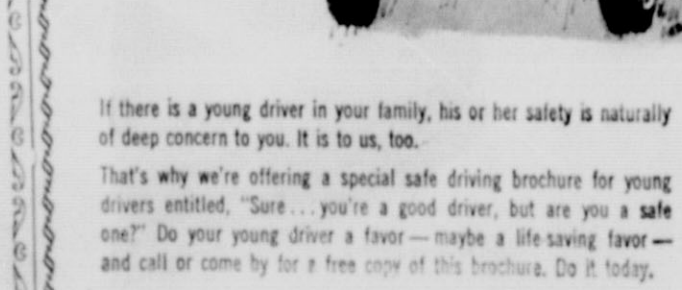
