Miss Jana Jones, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Jones, sponsored by the Matador Lions Club.

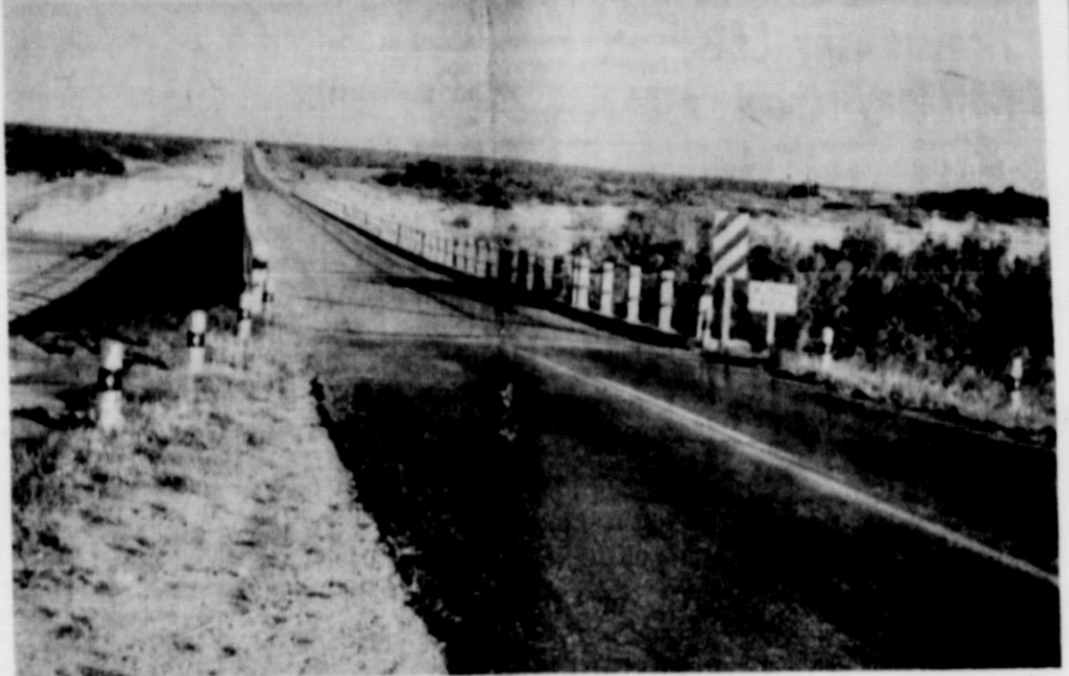
Miss Barbara Slover, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Billy R. Slover, sponsored by Eternas Study Club.

Flomot Association Schedules Annual Quarter Horse Show

The third annual Flomot Quarter Horse Show has been scheduled for Sunday, July 24 at 1:00 p.m. Mrs. C. C. Jones announced this week.

Bill Saul will be manager of the show and Russell W. Moore of Plainview will judge the entries.

The Flomot show will be an open one but all entries in the Quarter Horse division are approved by the American Quarter Horse Association.

The show will be staged in two divisions: adult and youth. The youth division will be further divided into the following age groups for competition, 9-13, 14-17, and 18-21.

Youth activity will be under the management and sponsorship of local 4-H Club boys and girls and their leaders. QHA will give a trophy for showmanship at halter and one for all around excellence to the high point youth.

In the adult show a trophy and six ribbons will be given on all classes. The trophy will be for grand champion horse, and reserve champion will be awarded a rosette. Stallions and mares foaled will be judged in classes 1962 through 1966, and geldings in classes from 1962 through 1964. Performance will follow halter.

A \$5 entry will be charged for participation in the halter class and a \$2 entry fee will be charged for each class in youth activity.

Calif. Plane Makes Forced Landing At Buzz Field Airport

A Newport Beach, Calif., family, Dr. R. C. Woodruff, his wife and three children, were guests at a local hostelry Friday night of last week, when propeller trouble developed in his Banana plane and he made a forced landing at Buzz Field on State Highway 70, near Roaring Springs.

Office Deputy, Miss Rachel Patton, at the sheriff's office, got first word of the doctor's distress by radio at 2:40 in the afternoon when the plane was 15 miles east of Matador enroute to Wichita, Kansas, destination Michigan.

The doctor was advised by the State Department of Safety to attempt a landing at Paducah, but the flyer decided against this, preferring the dirt field at Buzz to the concrete runway at Paducah, because of firehazard.

Matador Fire Department was alerted and was at the field waiting for the plane when it landed, at 3 p.m. Fire Chief Bill Jameson headed the group of firemen who answered the distress call.

The plane had a "run away prop." The trouble was remedied the following day and the family proceeded on their way.

Learning the distressed stranger was a doctor, it was unofficially suggested that he be tied to a post and his things sent for.

The travelers were reported delighted with the considerate attention they had in the emergency at Matador.

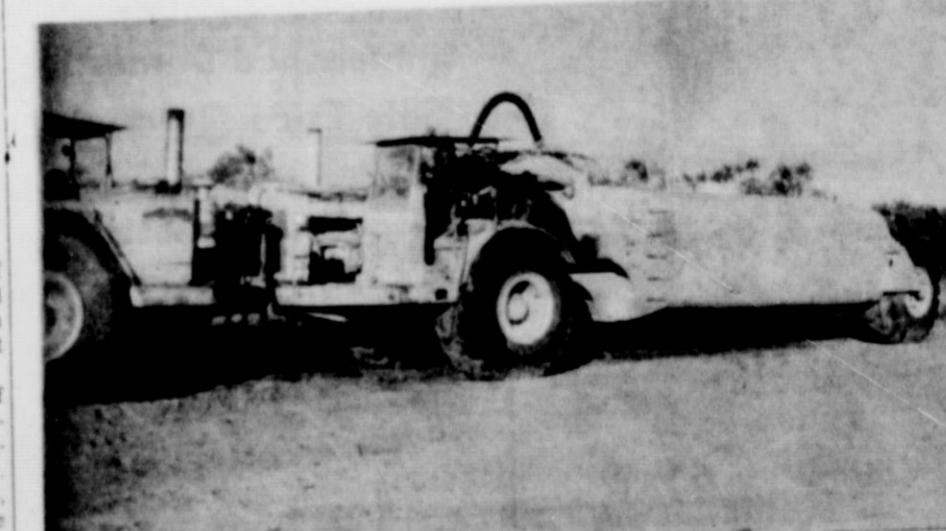

COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:

For simple maintenance of a cow's present body weight, pasture forage should not be less than about 4.3% digestible protein. If the cow has a calf, the digestible protein of the pasture grass should be from 4.8 to 5.3%. Most pasture grasses will not meet this requirement except in the young, actively growing state, thus the need for supplemental feeding.

In most commercial operations, cows lose weight slowly after calving, while the calves are gaining about one pound a day. If the calves are born in the proper season, it usually should be not more than 90 days before new forage growth begins.

Cows will graze the more nutritious parts of the grass if there is plenty of grass available, but when grass is limited due to drought, or overgrazing, protein is needed to prevent the cow

from losing too much weight. If enough mature grass is available to furnish needed energy, one to one and a half pounds of a high protein feed is enough supplement for dry pregnant cows, while two to two and a half pounds of high protein feed supplement will meet the requirements for cows nursing small calves.

For longer lasting cut flowers, cut them in the late afternoon or early evening. Avoid collecting them during the heat of the day. Put freshly cut flowers in a container of warm water and place in a draft-free spot until water cools to room temperature. Flowers are then ready to use in any arrangement.

Ranchers with mesquite will probably be interested in this article that appeared in Texas Forest News, Texas Woods Inc., Austin, has found that mesquite wood can be cut and processed into flooring one day and installed the next. Tests revealed an average total shrinkage of 1.7% from the green to the over-dry state, as compared to 10 to 15% shrinkage of oaks. Mesquite flooring material requires no filler, nor does it require a coat of varnish. Its hardness makes the finishing operation relatively simple, with the grain pattern similar to that of fine walnut or mahogany.

At present logs six inches in diameter are being used, but it is desirable that the minimum size be eight to ten inches in diameter, and 30 inches in length. I have pictures of mesquite flooring, so if you are interested, stop by and take a look.
