

The department acquired a free flatbed truck, courtesy of the Federal Excess Personal Property (FEPP) equipment program administered by the agency. Under the FEPP program, equipment acquired through the military is transferred to qualifying fire departments at no

The passage of legislation minimizing liability to industrial companies that donate used firefighting equipment for volunteer fire department use has made additional equipment available, and more donations are likely. Companies interested in donating industrial fire equipment should contact the TFS Rural Fire Defense Section at 409-639-8130 for information on the Industrial Helping Hands program. The value of

ceeds \$4 million.

Volunteer fire departments may save money in another way. A selfinsurance vehicle liability insurance pool also administered by the Texas Forest Service offers liability coverage for \$250 per vehicle, ambulances excluded.

Volunteer fire departments can also purchase firefighting clothing, hand tools and water handling accessories at discount prices through the Fire Safe program. Fire Safe sales to date exceed \$4.5 million, according to the state forestry agency.

Trail Riding Clinic set for historic **Mott Line Camp**

Ray Thomas of Lubbock will conduct a trail riding clinic on May 22 at Mott Creek Ranch for owners of horses which are young or unaccustomed to trail country.

Individual, hands-on instruction for each participant will begin on 9:30 a.m. and conclude with a trail ride in the afternoon. A heart ranch lunch will be served at the linecamp owned for 69 years by the Scottish syndicate's Matador Land & Cattle Co., Ltd.

Nestled in the wildflower-covered foothills of the caprock, Mott Creek Ranch offers unique opportunities to ride over ranch feed roads and view historic sites such as the linecamp established in 1880, a dugout homesteaded in 1900, a pasture rock fence erected in the 1870's, and a horse pictograph etched in sandstone above a spring. Live water crossings are provided by two creeks, Mott and Chimney, headwaters of the Middle Pease.

A professional horse trainer with 35 years experience, Thomas has conducted numerous clinics, instructed horsemen and women and trained horses, both for riding and in the art of pulling wagons or surreys.

"Many horses are not familiar with water crossings, steep hills, and wild game. This ride will serve to introduce them to the challenges on a 'one-on-one' basis," Thomas said.

This is a return to Mott Creek Line Camp for Thomas, who in 1986 joined other Fourth Cavalry Memorial members in participating in History Day at the Ranch, a sesquicentennial project which involved 75 local volunteers in sharing their western heritage.



One of my favorite teachers was laid to rest Monday afternoon. Miss Freda Keahey was my fifth grade teacher as she was to many, many children from Roaring Springs. She taught two generations in my family. She was my mother's fifth grade teacher, mine, my sister's, and my brother's. She also taught many of aunts and uncles, and cousins.

Miss Keahey was a strict teacher. She meant business. You were definitely going to learn in her class. And you knew that you would abide by her rules. And I will tell you, I still remember vividly some of the things I learned in her class. I remember one incident of taking a science test. I had studied and studied for that test and knew it well. But during the test, my 11-year-old mind went blank on one question regarding the nose. I absolutely could not think of the word nostril. After much thought and agony, I had to hurry and complete the test, so I had to write something. I answered the question, but wrote nose hole. Of course, Miss Keahey must have laughed her head off when grading the tests. But she wrote a sweet, little note on my test, beside the question, "the word is nostril". And didn't count it wrong. I will never forget that. My mother saved that test paper. I guess the entire family must have had a good laugh out of my new name for the nostril.

Miss Keahey has lived in a nursing home for the past several years, but before becoming necessary for her to reside there, she was my neighbor in Roaring Springs. She was such a sweet lady and a good neighbor. My son, Jeremy, loved her. She was very kind to him. She always visited with him when he was out playing or walking down the street. She gave him special treatment on occasions, such as when he trick or treated at her house. He always wanted to go to Miss Keahey's house


first, because she had a special treat for him. She shared plant clippings with me and in my adulthood, as her neighbor, I developed an even deeper admiration and respect for her.

When we moved into our house, across the street from Miss Keahey in Roaring Springs, I experienced another embarrassing moment with her. If the nose hole event wasn't enough!

Miss Keahey, Mrs. Miller (my second grade teacher, who has gone on to be with the Lord) and Miss Lula Swim came to my house, with a beautiful plant, to welcome us to our new home. Of course when you move into a different house, you experience difficulties sometimes, as we were experiencing with the drain pipe of the washing machine. While Miss Keahey, Mrs. Miller and Miss Lula were standing in the dining room near the kitchen door, visiting with me, Jeremy and his new, big, puppy ran in the back door, the washing machine overflowed, the dog slipped in the water and slid right into Mrs. Miller, knocking her off her feet, on to the floor. It happened so fast, and was almost like a commercial on TV about some kind of floor cleaner. I was so embarrassed I could have jumped into the washing machine myself and closed the lid.

We all hurried to help Mrs. Miller off the floor, while I was apologizing over and over, the ladies graciously talked a few more minutes and went on their way. Thank God Mrs. Miller was not injured in the event. I'm sure they all thought "she's got her hands full". Visits after that were mostly outside.

I will never forget Miss Keahey. She made an impression on me as a teacher, a friend, and a lady. I'm sure she will be remembered fondly by the many students she taught in the 42 years of her teaching career.

David Leonard Campbell was born Scott Campbell on the Campbell Ranch

January 9, 1919, to William A. and Laura west of Matador, Texas. The family moved to the Darden Canyon Community when David was quite

young, and he started to school there when he was five years old. Later, he attended schools at Whiteflat, Midway, and Roaring Springs, graduating from High School there in 1935. After graduation, he went to work at

After he was discharged from the Air Corps, he came to Matador and worked for Spot Cash Grocery for about two years. He married Dorothy Wason July 25, 1946 at First Methodist Church in Matador. (Eleanor Traweek's "Of Such As These" gives William Wason as a Charter member of the Matador Methodist Church, and established the first Sunday School there. RNG)

In January, 1948, David became a partner in Braselton Implement Company working in Roaring Springs until September 1949 when he, his wife and young son moved to Floydada to manage Braselton Implement Company of Floydada. Two years later, Braselton Implement Company of Floydada sold. In September 1951, they returned to Roaring Springs. By then they had another son, and in 1953 a third

In 1958, the family moved back to Floydada to farm in the Sandhill Community west of Floydada. David retired in 1983 having been in the farming and cotton ginning business for 35 years.

David joined the Roaring Springs Masonic Lodge in 1948 and was Worshipful Master of Roaring Springs Lodge #1171 in 1958. He is now a member of Matador Lodge #824, also Floydada Chapter #227, RAM and Council #163 R&SM and a charter member of Scottish Rite of Freemasonry of Lubbock, Texas.

David and Dorothy are parents of three sons, Gary of Gonzales, LA, Gale and Greg, both of Floydada, Texas. They have six grandchildren. In July, 1996, their family honored them with a Golden Anniversary party at First United Methodist Church in Floydada. They have been members of the church 41 years.
