The American Federation of Labor in declaring for light wines and beer, did not speak the opinion of the entire body of American organized labor, according to an editorial in the Locomotive Engineers Journal, a copy of which has been sent to the Reporter.

The engineers, the conductors and other trainmen's organizations are quite otherwise than for light wines and beer, it seems. The Journal is quite outspoken in its attitude toward the question—and the attitude is altogether different from that which the A. F. L. professes.

Says the Engineers Journal, in part:

"The most progressive note sounded at the annual convention of the American Federation of Labor held in Portland, Oregon, during the past month was the emphatic endorsement of workers' education through a bureau controlled by A. F. of L. executives. Industrial democracy and the principle of the Plumb Plan were also approved, as they were at the Montreal convention of the Federation,

and with probably the same result— indefinite action.

"These gains are offset by two backward steps which deserved the disapproval of every clearheaded worker, whether within or without the A. F. of L. Now, this Journal does not presume to pass judgment upon the internal affairs of the Federation. That is something which the A. F. of L. union alone has the right to do. But when the Federation claims to speak for the American Labor movement and makes decisions which are repugnant to the highest ideals of important labor organizations outside of the Federation, then we are under a moral obligation to express our disapproval lest by our silence we lend consent.

"We refer specifically to the acts of the Portland convention in putting labor's stamp of approval upon the booze business and in condemning the one independent, reliable labor news service in the United States because it was not controlled by the present A. F. of L.

"By a divided viva voce vote the Convention adopted the recommendation of the Executive Council for the manufacture and sale of 'wholesome' beer and light wines, condemning 'irrational efforts' to suppress the liquor traffic, and ridiculing prohibition enforcement officers. Our comment upon this action is to publish below the judgment of the executives of the four Transportation Brotherhoods upon the booze business. Grand Chief Stone of this Brotherhood states:

"The International convention of the B. of L. E. in 1918 declared by unanimous vote in favor of worldwide prohibition. The vote was cast by 828 delegates representing 90,000 locomotive engineers in the United States and Canada. In addition, Section 12 of the constitution and by-laws of the B. of L. E. declares that the "use of intoxicating liquor as a beverage by members of the B. of L. E. is prohibited."

"President Robertson of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Enginemen adds:

"I would be bitterly opposed to any modification or repeal of the Volstead Act. Section 4 of the con-

stitution of the B. of L. F. & E. states, "A member who uses intoxicating liquors to excess or who shall be found guilty of drunkenness shall, upon conviction, be penalized."

"President Sheppard of the Order of Railway Conductors states:

"The O. R. C. has long had an article in its constitution which provides that any person engaging in the liquor traffic shall be expelled from the order. I do not agree with Mr. Gompers that organized labor is in favor of any modification or repeal of the Volstead Act."

"President Lee of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen says:

"I can very emphatically say that so long as this Act is on the Statute books of the country the B. R. T. is in favor of its enforcement, as it is in favor of the enforcement of all the laws of the country."

"We believe that prohibition has ushered in a new day for the workers of America; that it is enabling them and their families to enjoy comforts that they never could afford when a part of the pay envelope went for booze; that labor must choose between putting its money over the saloon bar or putting it into labor cooperative banks; and that the 'wholesome' wines and beer recommended by the A. F. of L. convention constitute the precise reason why millions of workers in Europe have never been able to secure as high a standard of living as have American workers—their brains are so pickled in alcohol that they cannot think straight. No man ever yet improved his lot by taking poison into his system.

"We further charge that the liquor interests of this country have always been in league with the most ruthless exploiters of labor and the worst corrupters of our political life. As a prominent Denver labor leader, quoted in a recent issue of the New Republic, states: 'In Denver we had 108 unions meeting in 28 different places, mostly above saloons. We could not get together because the liquor interests didn't want to see us bunched. But when the state went dry, we were able to put it over, and now we have a splendid labor temple, owned and controlled by the local

Foster's Weekly Weather Bulletin.

Washington, Nov. 24.—High temperatures are expected on all parts of the continent near Nov. 26. This is an unusual condition. Usually low temperatures prevail in the west, while they are high in the east, but the severe storms during the week centering on Nov. 22 promise to pull a great cold wave over all the continent, followed by a great warm wave. In the past ten days large sections east of Rockies crest have had no precipitation, seeming to indicate that the expected great drouth is laying its foundation. The severe part of the drouth has not been expected much before middle of December.

First half of December promises to average much warmer than usual but the whole month promises an average of warmer than usual. The drouth, of course, will still be as usual in spots to a limited extent and very warm weather may be expected when the drouth is most severe; I expect that to be west of longitude 92. Most precipitation is expected for December on the east half of the continent and the coldest weather in sections that get most precipitation.

Not much danger of fruit being damaged on west half of continent by freezing; greater danger may come from dry weather. I am expecting serious damages, west of longitude 92, where good crop weather depends on snow; as I see it, a serious shortage of snow may be expected. Some parts of our southern states will get bad crop weather the coming winter for truck gardening. The time has fully come with those who till the soil should begin to stop the losses that come from bad crop weather seasons. Enough now is known to, at least, make a beginning of the ending of these serious losses.

All who have my private advices have been warned not to sell their grain at present market values. Those who must buy grain, or the products of grain, should make their purchases now. But cotton is high enough and I doubt the ability of Europe to pay the present cotton prices. Many southern people would better sell cotton and get sufficient grain to carry them through the coming shortage of winter grain. Those who are herding cattle on grass of southern plains sections should look out for a grass shortage and in the southern Rockies the sheep herders should expect a shortage of winter water and grass. I repeat my warning that very serious damages are coming to North America from short crops of 1925.

In all lines of human interests the scientists, particularly the younger

ones, are changing as to the nature of electro-magnetic forces; they are adopting the theories for which they contended, as a newspaper editor twenty years, besides delivering 2,000 lectures; and have done much time and efforts for years more as a weatherologist. My present weather work is based on the theories I advocated of those forty years. Mountain prejudice have crumbled before long and strenuous efforts. — S. Gelo Standard.

NEGLIGES

BREAKFAST COATS

The breakfast coat is a practical garment and is smart and handsome. There are coats of crepe de chine and lace; changeable taffeta and plisse ribbon, with decorative motifs, streamers and rosette buttons; and with the breakfast coat, as with all negligees, is worn the attractive cap. One can buy ready-made locks all arranged to form a coiffure as well as a cap, made not necessarily of hair, but of Chinese silk, and the undressed locks of the wearer are hidden by rosettes of braided hair or silk which come well down at the sides of the head. To complete the costume one slips into the light satin sandals, trimmed and buckled with fancy stones.

ROBES

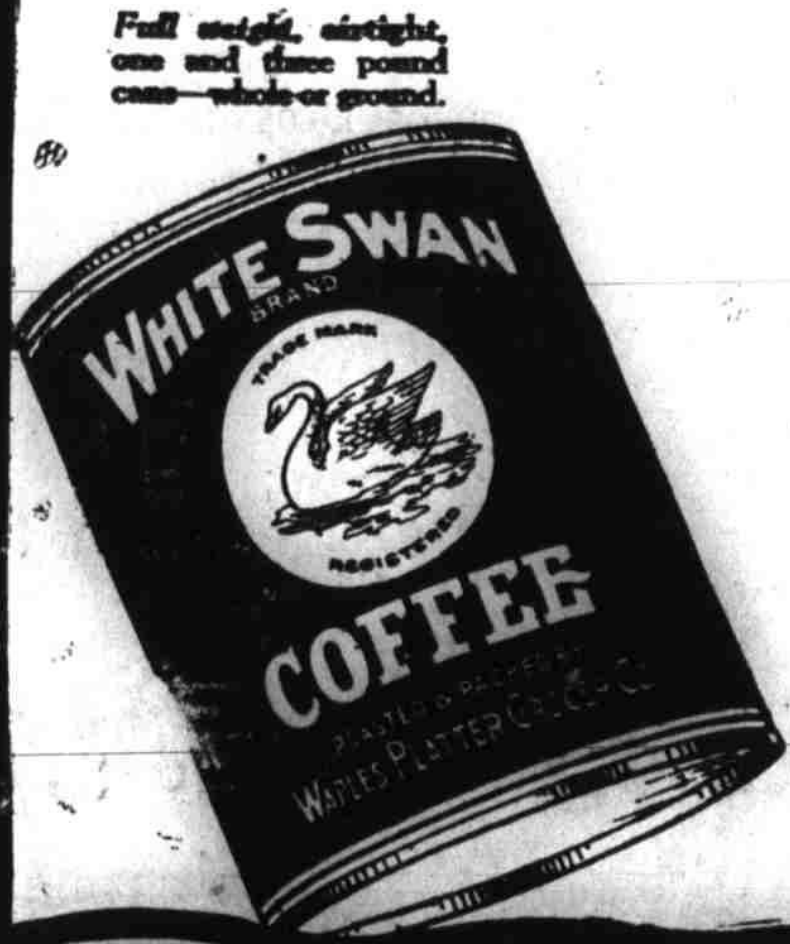

Private capacity and monopoly is a greater menace to national prosperity and sanity than government ownership.

Texas & Pacific to Reorganize
New York, Nov. 26.—Details of the plan of reorganization of the Texas & Pacific Railway company, which has been in the hands of receivers since October, 1916, were disclosed today by Kuhn, Loeb & Co., who will act as readjustment managers.

The plan, which has been approved by the company's board of directors, the Missouri Pacific railroad, and representatives of the road's common stock shall remain undisturbed and without assessment.

Other important features were the conversion of the company's outstanding second mortgage income bonds aggregating \$24,676,000 into a like amount of 5 per cent non-cumulative preferred stock, the authorization of a new general and refunding mortgage, aggregating approximately \$17,000 per mile to provide for improvements and to retire existing funded debts, and the funding of judgments against the company.

A special meeting of stockholders has been called for December 21, to authorize the necessary corporate action to carry out the plan. Holders of income bonds, desiring to participate in the readjustment, may deposit their bonds with the readjustment managers.

The plan, Jerome J. Hanauer, of Kuhn, Loeb & Co., pointed out, contemplates a readjustment without foreclosure or sale, so that the company will be able to retain its federal charter. Substantially all debts of the com-

pany, other than judgments which will be funded under the plan, have been paid, Mr. Hanauer said, his firm had been informed, and it is expected that there will be available to be turned over to the company upon consummation of the plan, at least \$1,500,000 in cash, which, he said, would be sufficient, together with \$3,000,000, to be obtained thru funding of additions to betterments, made during federal control for the expenses of readjustment, working capacity and all capital expenditures during 1924.

The receiver's estimate, he said, that the net income available for interest will be not less than \$4,500,000 for 1923; \$5,600,000 for 1924; \$6,300,000 for 1925, and \$6,700,000 for 1926.

Assuming acceptance of the plan by all security holders, he said, annual fixed charges after the plan is operative, will be \$2,268,510, and the annual dividend requirements of the new preferred stock will be \$1,233,800, a total of \$3,502,310.—Fort Worth Record.

Exterior appearance is enhanced by a windshield visor, cowl ventilator and secure rear fenders of new design. Interior arrangements of the Tudor sedan meets all comfort requirements both for driver and passengers. The driver's seat is of "bucket" design, with easy cushion and back, assuring restful posture.

There is a noticeable roominess in front and plenty of footroom. The tilting seat opposite the driver folds compactly out of the way so that the entrance and exit through the large and roomy door is easily and conveniently effected by those occupying the rear seat, which is amply large for three persons.

Because of the location of the door, the driver has convenient access to his seat without folding up the extra seat alongside. The gasoline tank is located under the driver's seat, making it unnecessary for him to disturb any other passengers when filling the tank.

Interior fittings are attractive. The upholstery is in special Ford fabric of dark brown with floor rug to match. Both the doors and side windows have been equipped with revolving type window regulators of the same design as those used in cars of much higher price.

Trouble Savers.—A pile of newspapers kept in one corner of the kitchen will save much trouble if used to set soiled pots on.

Milk.—It is said that if milk is heated until it is lukewarm and then suddenly cooled there will be much more cream.

Peach Stains.—A peach stain is very difficult to remove. It may be done, however, if these directions are followed. First wet the stain thoroughly, then spread cream of tartar on it. After this wash in the ordinary way. It will probably be necessary to repeat the process if the stain is very old.

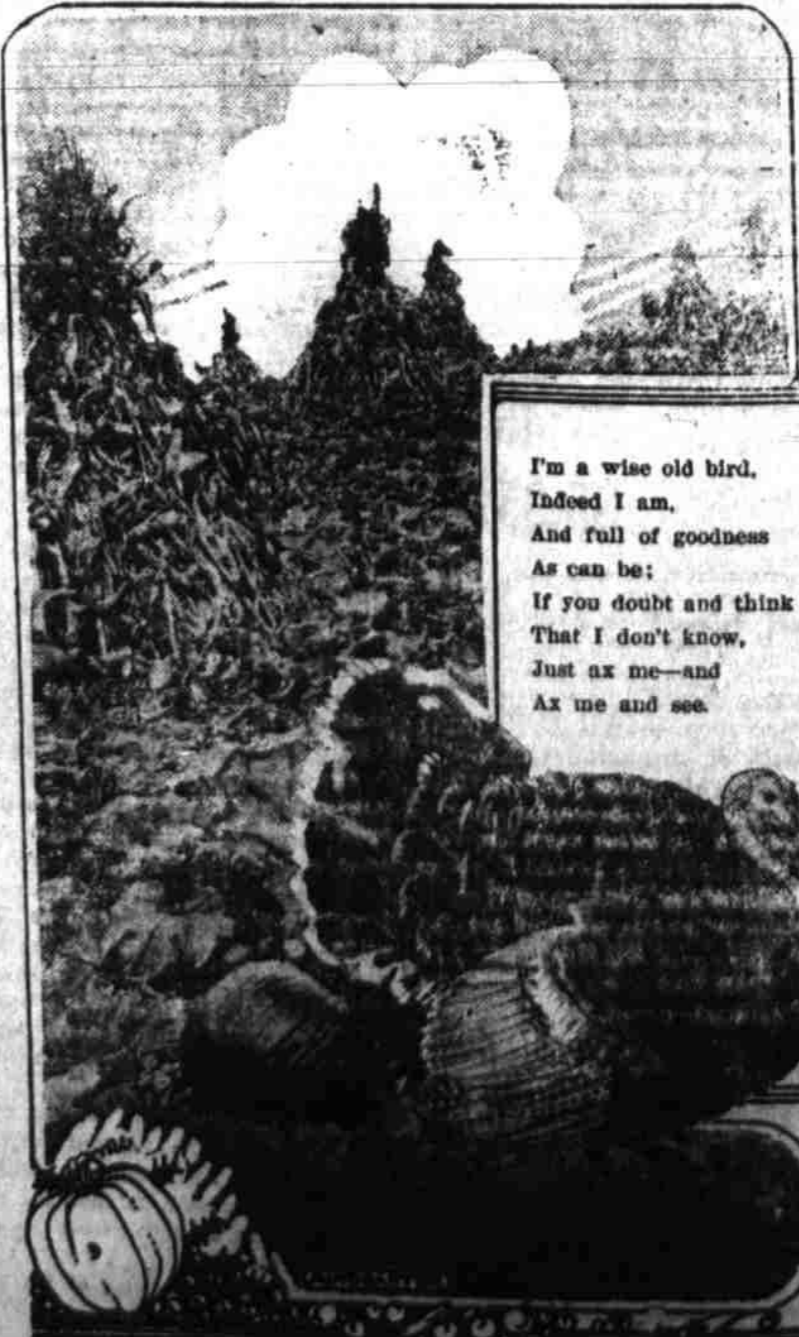

The Lesson of Lubbock

Development succeeding development gives new proof that in selecting Lubbock for the home of the Texas Technological College the board of locaters made no mistake. Up on the South Plains, with the natural momentum of their enthusiasm only accelerated by their success in obtaining the College, men and women are building steadily toward a great community. Evidence in point is that a \$500,000 bond issue for civic improvement went over in the election by a vote of 25 to 1. This sum includes \$300,000 for street paving and storm sewers, and \$75,000 for a new city hall and follows a bond issue of \$200,000 for water and sewer extension voted only a year ago.

The city of Lubbock has found out something about bond issues. That is, that taxable values, if properly assessed, will be so increased because of installation of needed improvements that the difference will pay for the bonds with little raise in the tax rate. That is a lesson other Texas cities faced with a pressing need for improvements and a current high tax rate, might learn with profit.—Fort Worth Star-Telegram.

When Opportunity Knocks

Opportunity is knocking at the doors of Texas farmers. He is knocking most persistently at the doors of farmers who succeeded in producing a fair crop of cotton. It has been many years since they have been given the opportunity to make a start towards securing for themselves a more permanent agricultural income than past seasons offered them. Many farmers have been placed in a position financially where they can make permanent improvements, purchase needed machinery, equip their homes with lighting systems and running water, and give themselves a start with a few purebred cows, hogs and chickens. Good livestock is the cheapest in the end because of their productiveness and the rapidity with which they develop. Permanent prosperity is never at home on any farm that is without good livestock.

Farm and Ranch does not advocate the abandonment of cotton as the money crop on Texas farms where it is suited. Cotton is the great staple crop of the South and every farmer should endeavor to increase his acre yield and improve his staple from year to year. Cotton should be made to pay the land notes, improve the buildings and buy the comforts and luxuries every farmer is entitled to. It should not be the sole source of support. The table should be supplied, the clothing purchased and other things provided to a large extent from other farm resources.

Farmers who have made money out of cotton this year should take a lesson from the experiences of many who struck it lucky in oil. During the boom days in every oil field in the Southwest, men were made rich over night. Some were wise and immediately invested their winnings in something of a permanent nature. Others reinvested in oil and today, many of them are back to their old jobs, or working at something else at ordinary rates of pay. Cotton farmers who have profited by a fair production and good prices should not reinvest everything in cotton. The price of cotton is not always going to top 30 cents or even 25 or 20 cents. If history is repeated, it may reach a level where it is unprofitable to produce it. The farmer who fixes up his place and stocks it, within reason, with purebreds, and has learned to provide himself with other and more regular sources of income, will be the prosperous citizen of the community some day. The one crop plunger will have had his day, and will have nothing to talk about but the time when he made a third of a bale per acre and sold it at \$150 per bale. His money will have been spent and his income reduced. Every gambler has gone broke who played the game long enough, and the one crop plunger is just as much of a gambler as the man who sits around the ring in the cotton exchanges and bets on the course the market will take.

A monthly income, though small—something to sell on every trip to town—has brought more comforts into the farm home than the once a year income from a single crop over any period of years than can be selected.—Farm and Ranch.

The counties of Texas as a general rule are making an honest effort to place their roads in good condition before January 1, 1924, in order that the Highway Department can keep them in this condition after this date. A great majority of the county commissioners' courts realize that the Highway Department will not have sufficient funds to improve all of the roads on the state system. They realize also that it would be unfair to counties that had discharged their duty in keeping the state highways in good shape until January 1st, for the department to go in and improve the roads of a county that had not tried to do its duty under the law. But there are still some of those county commissioners' courts that think they are saving money to their county by letting their roads go in ruin, in the hope that the state will rebuild them after January 1st. In face of the highway commission ruling that roads will be maintained in the condition which they are found January 1, 1924, counties that think they are saving money by permitting their roads to get in bad shape before January 1st, reminds me of a little boy seven years old who came from Cincinnati to a small Indiana town to visit a friend. He had never heard the word "kidding" until this visit, and when a dinner guest in the house was taking her departure with many words of appreciation to her hostess, who in turn was telling the guest how delighted she was to have had her as a guest, the little fellow turned to the rest of the company and demanded:

"Now they're kidding each other, ain't them?"

Let's quit kidding ourselves and get our roads in proper shape before January 1.—Texas Highway Bulletin

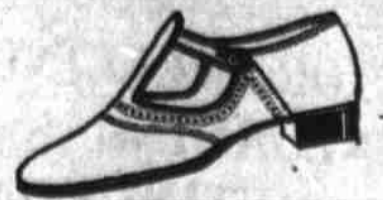

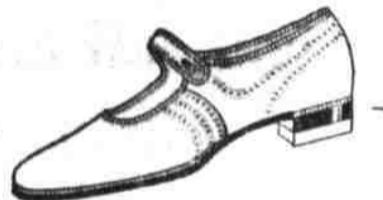

President of Texas Tech

Houston, Nov. 23.—A vision of Texas Technological College at Lubbock as the greatest technical school in the Southwest, an institution not alone for West Texas but for all Texas, was described here Thursday night by Dr. Paul Whitfield Horn, chosen president of the new college at a meeting of the board of regents Thursday.

Dr. Horn announced, simultaneously, that he is "delighted at the opportunity," and that he will offer his resignation to Southwestern University at Georgetown, of which he has been president since 1921, to become effective January 1.

Detailing the advantageous circumstances under which the new technical school will open its doors, Dr. Horn expressed the belief that it has "one of the most auspicious starts of any such institution in the history of the Southwest."

Dr. Horn has devoted his entire career to educational work. After his education at Central College, Fayette, Mo., and Baylor University, he became president of Prior Institute, Jasper, Tenn., but resigned in 1891 to accept the principalship of the Sherman, Texas, High School. In 1904 he became superintendent of schools in Houston, a post he held for 16 years. From Houston he went to Southwestern, as president, in 1921.

The technical college, created by the last session of the Legislature, will be erected on a 2,000-acre tract adjoining the corporate limits of Lubbock. An appropriation of \$450,000 is now available for buildings and an additional \$100,000 will be on hand early next Autumn.

Sanguinet, Staats & Hedrick, Fort Worth architects, selected Wednesday by the board to design the structures, will begin preliminary plans at once, it is understood, although details have not been worked out. William Ward Watkins of Houston will be associate architect.

Protracted discussion over the selection for the presidency took up the greater portion of the board's time Thursday. It was the first meeting at which all nine members had been present.

The new school, which will have equal rank with A. & M. College, was created in response to a campaign of several years' duration by residents of the North and Northwest Texas districts, who complained that A. & M. at College Station is so far distant from their homes, that training there is not suitable to the entirely different conditions of West Texas.

First proposals were for a West Texas Agricultural and Mechanical College, but this was altered in the Legislature and the technical college resulted.

Members of the boards who attended the meeting here were: Amon G. Carter of Fort Worth, J. W. Meadows of Waco, W. P. Hobby of Beaumont, Clifford B. Jones of Spur, John Carpenter of Dallas, Mrs. Charles De Groff of El Paso, R. E. Underwood of Plainview, Dr. J. E. Nunn of Amarillo and Mrs. Frank Drane of Corsicana.—Fort Worth Star-Telegram.

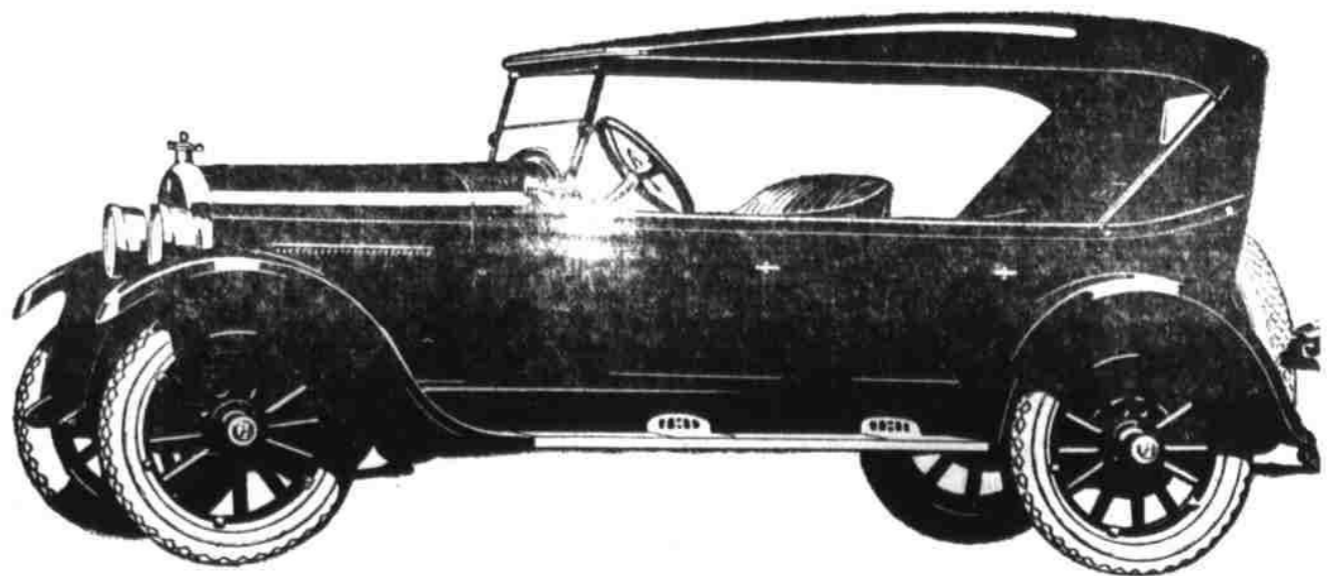

Park Board Postpones Trip

Continued bad weather in the various parts of Texas where proposed state park sites are located, has caused postponement of the inspection trip by the newly created State Park Board from November until after the first of the new year.

This action was decided upon by D. E. Colp of San Antonio, board member from District No. 2, and Fred M. Herndon of San Antonio, secretary of the Texas Parks Association, after reports of 27 inches of rainfall in the Panhandle section near Palo Duro Canyon park site recently, and heavy rains in other sections of the state.

Governor Neff and Lieutenant Governor T. W. Davidson have expressed a desire to accompany the Park Board on the first trip of inspection of the proposed sites, and the January schedule will be planned to meet the convenience of the board members and the state executives, as nearly as possible.

In addition to the 10 larger park sites offered originally to the state, many smaller ones in various sections of Texas, ranging from a few to around 200 acres, are being offered, according to Herndon, who states that several of the smaller towns in Southwest Texas have interested themselves in donating former city parks and small sites near their towns to the state as state parks. These offers will be placed before the board at the January meeting in San Antonio, he stated.

The Park Board, composed of Mrs. Phoebe K. Warner of Claude, D. E. Colp of San Antonio, Hobart Key of

Marshall, Mrs. W. C. Martin of Dallas, and Mrs. James J. Welder of Victoria, is anxious that every county in Texas have at least one park, if no larger than a few acres, to preserve the natural beauty of the state and provide breathing spaces for its future generations.

Operations Under Narcotic Law
November 24.—As a result of the operation of the Harrison Narcotic Law there has, in the last five years, been converted into the Treasury of the United States more than \$3,000,000 over and above the cost of administration, it is announced by the local narcotic office. This information is based upon the following statement by Federal Prohibition Commissioner R. A. Haynes, who has federal jurisdiction over the administration of the narcotic laws, with Col. L. G. Nutt as head of the Narcotic Division.

"The Harrison Act, while primarily a revenue law, was never intended as a revenue producing measure, but for each of the last five years the money turned into the Treasury as the result of fines, penalties, etc., under this law has far exceeded the annual Congressional appropriation of \$750,000 and at no time has the cost of enforcement equaled the appropriation.

"During the fiscal year of 1923 a total of 7201 criminal cases were made, 93.6 per cent of those already tried resulting in convictions and prison sentences aggregating 4692 years, 6 months and 21 days. This is in addition to 29,776 civil cases reported, all of which was accomplished with an average of 170 men, the limit the small appropriation will permit, who are allocated among 15 divisions into which the United States, Hawaii and the Territory of Alaska are divided.

"There are on record in the United States at the present time 285,405 narcotic registrants, consisting of physicians, dentists, druggists, wholesale dealers, manufacturers and importers of narcotic drugs, all of whom are under close surveillance by the federal authorities, in order that no narcotic drugs imported and manufactured are sold and dispensed except as contemplated by the law. All dealers are required to keep an accurate record of sales and submit a sworn report to the Washington office each month showing the drugs sold.

"Suppression of the traffic in narcotic drugs since the passage of the Harrison Act in December, 1914, has resulted in the per capita consumption of opium having decreased from 36 grains to 7 grains, in morphine equivalent to 7-8 of one grain, while the per capita consumption of cocaine

is only 1-4 of one grain.
"It is estimated that from fifty to sixty per cent of the various narcotic drugs consumed in this country by the ordinary "dope fiend" or drug addict are smuggled into the country across our international borders and through the various ports of entry on our shores. To cope with this problem would require a force several times larger than that now available."

More Good News

The following valuable information has been officially received from Captain J. D. Fauntleroy, State Highway Engineer.

In addition to the State taking over the maintenance of all State Highways January 1st, 1924, as announced in our October 30th Bulletin, the State Highway Department will also take over the marking of all state highways on January 1st, 1924, under the direct supervision of the sixteen district engineers, details of which are as follows:

The road signs will be very simple in design and merely intended to inform the traveler the distance between towns, cross-roads and other important places.

In addition to these signs, road markers will also be erected, which will consist of a black circle, six to eight inches in diameter, containing a single white star and in the center of the star will be the number of the highway. These circles will be painted on telegraph poles, bridge heads, culvert headwalls and occasionally on sign boards where there is nothing else available to show such markings. For example: Anyone leaving Texarkana and following State Highway No. 1 will see these markers erected, or markers on posts, headwalls, etc. at relatively close intervals all the way to El Paso.

In addition there will be other signs for "Bad Curves," "Railroad Crossings," "Detours," etc.

The State Highway Department will finance the marking of all highways and have exclusive control of same, which will eliminate the necessity of the public contributing funds for the purpose of marking highways.

This is, indeed, valuable information and persons reading same should make it a point to tell others.

The highway bills, advocated by the Texas Highway Association, and passed during the 38th Legislature, made it possible for the State to take over this important work.

Watch That Match and "Smoke"

It will probably surprise a great many people to learn that carelessness with matches and smoking materials today constitutes the greatest single cause of fire loss in the United States, yet the carefully compiled statistics of the National Board of Fire Underwriters show this to be true.

"It is the custom of the National Board of Fire Underwriters to combine, under the classification of 'Matches-Smoking' fires due to either of these hazards," says W. E. Mal-lieu, General Manager of the organization, "because so many of the match fires are due to burning lucifers thrown away by thoughtless smokers."

"The destruction of property from this cause now amounts to nearly \$26,000,000 a year, which is far more than the toll exacted by any other hazard, despite the fact that the damages from 'Matches-Smoking' are so largely preventable.

"The remedy lies in educating the people to a greater degree of carefulness in handling lighted matches, cigars, cigarettes and pipes, and, to their credit, it may be said that two of the largest tobacco companies in the country, and two of the principal match producers, are endeavoring to change the habits of their careless customers by imprinting suitable precautions upon cigarette and match boxes."

In course of time, the effect of these appeals to the public should become visible; otherwise it is fairly safe to predict that public sentiment will bring about further enactment of personal liability laws providing for civil punishment of persons guilty of causing fire destruction by their obvious carelessness.

A life sentence has just been given a Mexican at Sacramento, California, who set fire to a school house and burned 10 Japanese children to death.

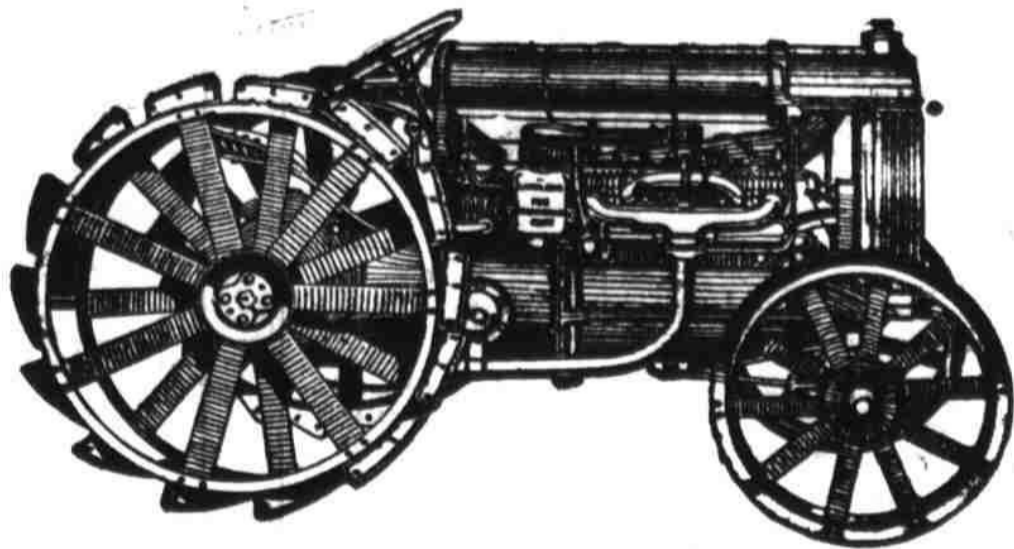

The plans for the observance of Golden Rule Sunday call upon the people of America to serve a menu in their homes similar to that served in the orphanages in the near east, the difference in cost of the orphanage menu and the ordinary meal to be contributed to orphanage work overseas. The observance is very appropriately fixed for the Sunday following Thanksgiving. Having on Thursday partaken from well-laden tables as a token of rejoicing in the prosperity of America, it is fitting that on the following Sunday people give special consideration to the needs and distress of those who are less highly favored.

FOURTEEN NATIONS SUPPORT COOLIDGE

European Countries Join American President in Backing Golden Rule as Practical Program.

Geneva, Switzerland.—Officials of relief organizations from fourteen European countries have asked their governments and peoples to join in a great international movement to save the destitute orphans and widowed mothers in those countries of the Near East that have suffered from recent wars.

Dec. 2 has been set aside as "Golden Rule Sunday." On that day people will be asked to observe the broad principle of the Golden Rule by foregoing their usual noonday meal and eating instead the frugal ration usually partaken of by the parentless children of Greece, Armenia and Palestine.

The world's people will then be asked to contribute the difference in the cost of the two meals to the principal relief organization in their country, to be administered for the needy children.

Notable people in Europe who will co-operate to give the day an international aspect are King George of Greece, Prince Carl of Sweden, ex-Premier Clemenceau of France, M. Paul Hymans and Dr. Alice Masaryk.

AMERICAN FOODS BEST SAYS FAMOUS DOCTOR

Athens.—American standard food-stuffs are the best in the world, says Dr. Mabel Elliott, famous woman physician, who for the past two years has been medical director of American orphanages in the Near East. From the standpoint of purity and high food value, she asserts that no European nation can compete with the United States, and for this reason she insists on American products in all orphanages and hospitals, in order to meet adequately the needs of undernourished children.

Dr. Elliott's annual report, summing up the results of the care of 50,000 children in orphanages as well as clinics for 50,000 additional children in refugee camps and homes, says:

"Stable American foods are now the backbone of all our menus for rebuilding children who became weak and anaemic during the refugee exodus from Asia Minor. Our menus contain, not only bread made from American flour, and corn grits in porridge and stews, but also the liberal use of corn syrup, American condensed milk and American cocoa and macaroni, thus making a balanced ration to meet all the scientific requirements as to relative food values, calories and vitamins.

The favorite orphanage pudding is composed of corn grits with cocoa, sweetened with corn syrup, and made more nutritious and palatable by adding a sauce of American condensed milk. Such a pudding has a high food value and is very economical—no other equivalent food value could be obtained from other foods at twice the cost. Moreover, it is so palatable that children eat it eagerly several times a week, and never seem to tire of it. The American people, in providing for these parentless children such pure and wholesome foods from their own tables, are certainly making a practical application of the golden rule."

Dr. Elliott has recently returned to America to arrange for the publication of a book of her experiences under the title of "Beginning Again at the World's End."

REFUGEE MEAL FOR AMERICANS

Whole Country Asked to Adopt Orphanage Menu for Just One Sunday Dinner.

RELIEF HAS SAVED MILLION

People of All Nations Will Figuratively Gather Around Same Table as Practical Sign of Sympathy With Near East Sufferers.

How many comfortably fed, clothed and housed Americans will sit down to a Sunday dinner of rice, corn grits and soup—typical orphan fare—on December 2, as a practical test of the golden rule?

The question is asked today by Charles V. Vickrey, general secretary of Near East Relief, who is in charge of the plans for the general observance throughout the United States of "Golden Rule Sunday." In an interview, Mr. Vickrey said:

"If American people will renounce for one meal the food they are accustomed to eat, and contribute the difference in cost to the support of starving children in the near east, the situation in Greece, Armenia and Palestine will become infinitely more real to them.

"I have recently returned from several months in those countries. America is a name to conjure with there. Bitter reproaches are heard against nearly every other country, but none against us. That is because people realize that Americans have gone to them with a helping hand and a square deal, rather than with the mailed fist.

"America could well have afforded to have spent every penny of her relief funds as a long-sighted, cold-blooded business proposition. The good will that has resulted from relief work in the near east is of incalculable value. When these orphans we are caring for today grow to manhood, they will become the leaders of their nations and their eyes will turn toward America.

"At least a million persons in the near east would not be alive today had it not been for American aid. Even today, 100,000 persons are being cared for day to day by the Near East Relief, mostly women and children who would probably perish in a few days or weeks if the work ceased.

"Our workers are now concentrating not only on the physical care of our 50,000 orphans, but on their industrial training as well. At the age of 16, when an orphan leaves our care, he is equipped to enter some useful trade or business. In Naraseth there are boys working in our carpenter shop a few feet from the spot where Christ toiled. In Macedonia, hundreds of Greek orphans are learning farming in the atmosphere where Paul spent many years in establishing the first European churches.

"Five dollars a month provides food and physical necessities for an orphan, and \$100 a year provides for his education as well. The observance of Golden Rule Sunday by a million American families will provide enough funds for thousands of orphans.

"When people break bread together, they become friends. On this International Golden Rule Sunday people of all nations figuratively will gather around the same table, partaking of the same food representing the menu which the unfortunate children of the near east hope, by the benevolence of the West, to eat 365 days in the year. But even this simple menu the orphans cannot have unless the rest of the world practices the Golden Rule."

RED CROSS ADVANCING IN HEALTH CAMPAIGN

Extends Service to New Fields and Brings Healing Hope to Remote Sections.

"The supreme opportunity for leadership" for the American Red Cross is its health service. Thus a committee made up of prominent physicians, sanitarians and public health experts after months of exhaustive study, reported and urged that not only should the Red Cross continue its present service, but should undertake a comprehensive educational campaign along public health lines. The annual report of the American Red Cross, just issued, discloses that it has grasped this opportunity in the fields of public health nursing, instruction in home hygiene and care of the sick, nutrition work, first aid to the injured and in water life-saving.

Health service is fundamentally, historically and practically an important function of the Red Cross, and each year marks its extension into new fields and along broader lines. In the Red Cross Nursing Service there are enrolled nearly 40,000 nurses, 20,000 of whom served during the World War. The past year Red Cross nurses were assigned to duty in isolated sections of Alaska and North Carolina and to work among the fishermen of Penobscot Bay, Me.

The Public Health Nursing Service, inaugurated by the American Red Cross in 1912, which operates chiefly in rural sections untouched by other public health agencies, has 1,038 Red Cross nurses working under the direction of Chapters. This work has won so high a regard that many of the nurses are taken over by the local authorities to maintain health services for their communities. Instruction in Home Hygiene and Care of the Sick is noting a steady advance. Since 1914 certificates of proficiency have been given 304,427 women who completed the Red Cross course. In the last year 26,595 certificates were awarded and 65,901 students were under the instruction of 1,054 Red Cross nurses.

The benefits derived from meals balanced to meet each person's peculiar needs is winning widespread recognition through the work of the Red Cross Nutrition Service, particularly in the schools. During the school year 2,633 carried on regular instruction in nutrition, reached more than 150,000 children and adults. More than 2,250 volunteers assisted in this work. Throughout the country 35,283 health meetings were held under Red Cross auspices, attended by approximately 254,500 persons.

Annual Summons to Red Cross Banner On Armistice Day

America's great humanitarian effort in behalf of stricken Japan early in September gave the answer to the question, "What is there for the Red Cross to do in time of peace?" What the American Red Cross did at once when this crushing earthquake disaster came without warning showed that it was ready on the instant with country-wide team work to carry out quickly and effectively the request of the President to lead the national effort for the relief of the many thousands of sufferers. Preparedness to take the field when relief is needed is a charter duty of the Red Cross. Without a membership enrolled in every community in the land this readiness would be impossible. That is why your dollar membership is most important.

It is imperative that the structure of the American Red Cross be made up of millions of individual units. Opening Armistice Day, November 11, and closing with Thanksgiving Day, November 29, the Roll Call this year will penetrate to the ends of the earth and to the ships sailing the seven seas. The 3,600 Red Cross Chapters in the United States will have their busy volunteers enrolling members during this period imbued with renewed enthusiasm due to the recent revival of effort when the call came from Japan.
