## Heavily Cited By Pork Producers

LUBBOCK—STATE REP. W. S. "Bill Healy of Paducah—"most powerful man the legislature has ever known," and the "best friend agriculture ever had"—was honored in Lubbock Thursday night by the Texas Pork Producers Association.

Healy was lauded by Texas Commissioner of Agriculture John C. White as a man "hard as nails" when he has to be, but "compassionate and soft-hearted" where the young, the old, the underprivileged, the "disfranchised citizens" are concerned.

Speaking to pork producers gathered in the Red Raider Convention Center, White called Healy the "father of the best of mental health and retardation systems," a man who got where he is today by doing things for people who couldn't pay him back.

"The Texas prison system was one of the worst till Bill Healy said 'do something about it' and now people come from all over to study it," White added. He mentioned the juvenile rehabilitation, teacher pay raises, farm-to-market road system, aid for the young and the aged, and other programs aided by Healy who now is in his fifth term as chairman of the House Appropriations Committee.

Most important for the pork producers was Healy's aid in putting through a marketing program and in securing money for research facilities now being constructed at Texas Tech.

A plaque of appreciation was presented by Don Brothers of Paducah, past president of the pork raisers association, to Healy—a man who "got where he is today by being a man of honor and integrity, by being the hardest-working member of the legislature."

White termed the South Plains area the "most dynamic growth area in agriculture," that other agricultural areas looked to a 200-mile radius of Lubbock where "the most exciting things happen in agribusiness for knowledge of how to meet pollution, water, capital and other problems."

State Rep. Delwin Jones of Lubbock, who introduced White, was himself awarded a certificate of appreciation for his "interest in agriculture." Jones is chairman of the legislature's Agriculture Committee.

The crowd rose to its feet in tribute to Healy as he received his award, sniffed a little, blinked hard and then spoke of being "honored and humbled."

## Crisis Confronts Hospitals In Area

MOTLEY County General Hospital—just two months old—may have to shut down because of the possibility that it cannot get Medicare funds it needs to survive.

It is not alone. Administrators of other small hospitals around the South Plains area tell similar tales of "impossible" Medicare demands that their hospitals conform to the same regulations applied to big-city hospitals.

**Not Enough Nurses**  
Hospital administrator Fred Wallace said Saturday that Medicare representatives conducted an inspection of the Motley County facilities a week ago and told him his staff does not include the number of registered nurses required by law.

The law says that each hospital must have 4.2 registered nurses on its staff. This provides three nurses, each working an eight-hour shift, with a fourth RN in reserve. A fifth nurse would be on emergency call for other area hospitals, accounting for the fraction.

Motley County General has only one registered nurse.

**May Not Get Funds**  
Wallace said he didn't yet know whether funds will be granted to the hospital or not, and added that he expects to hear from Medicare representatives in about two weeks.

"If we're turned down, it will affect all small area hospitals," he said. "We can't survive without Medicare funds, and neither can the other small hospitals. If they deny us, it would be only fair to deny funds to other hospitals which don't meet requirements."

But other South Plains hospitals are feeling the pinch as well. T. J. Taylor, administrator of the Crosbyton Clinic-Hospital, said his hospital was not in immediate danger, since Medicare had granted him a "12-month grace period." But the latest extension, he said implied that the hospital had better meet the standards "or else."

"We've been running on a deficiency of registered nurses since the start of this regulation, and they've been allowing us extensions," Taylor said. "But if it were not for the fine job done in defense of small hospitals by the State Health Department and Blue Cross, we'd have people dying like flies in all rural areas of Texas."

**Supply Won't Meet Demand**  
"The number of RNs available for hospital work in Texas, particularly in these small communities, is just not enough to meet the Medicare standards," Taylor said.

The Plains Memorial Hospital at Dimmitt meets the Medicare standards, but its administrator said it wasn't easy. "We had to get down on our hands and knees and plead with graduates at the nursing schools to move here," said James Hor-

## Light Rains Fall; Prairie Fires Set

MATADOR VOLUNTEER Fire Department battled grass fires, presumably set by lightning, throughout Saturday afternoon and night and until 5:30 a.m. Sunday, while a few light showers fell at Matador.

Precipitation, as measured by Bob Stanley's rain gauge was .32 in Matador, while on the north-east edge of town it was reported that the rainfall left "water running in the fields," near the Jack Luckett place. South of town, a light shower fell at Buzz Field.

The sun was shining during the showers, and lightning wreaked havoc in the neighboring counties of Cottle and Dickens. The Matador Fire department answered at least six calls.

A blaze, set by lightning and extinguished by showers before the fire truck reached the scene, was reported to be on the Parnell land northeast of town. Another run was made to Northfield, and two calls to Paducah were answered.

The local fire department help-

ed battle a blaze on the S-Lazy S Ranch northwest of McAdoo, until late in the night. It was estimated that about 400 acres burned in the 10-section pasture.

John Russell lost a section of pasture to a fire which caught in the night Saturday, at his ranch about 15 miles southeast of town. He and his son, John M. (Sonny) Russell battled and extinguished the blaze, but fire broke out again Sunday afternoon, destroying the remaining grass.

On the Bird Ranch in Cottle county, it was estimated that 6000 acres were lost.

The Haliburton Ranch, three miles east of Dickens lost about one and a half sections as firemen from Lubbock, Spur and Dickens battled the blaze.

Several local grass fires were extinguished by the fire department, and Fire Chief Alton Marshall has issued a request to residents to exercise caution in burning trash in the alleys, or near structures.

## Insurance Policies Protection Offered

In order to protect the public from insurance policies that provide less protection than the buyer assumes, the medical staff of the Motley General Hospital will offer an inspection service.

At a meeting of the staff held

last week, it was decided to offer the inspection as a free service to the public.

The prospective insurance buyer may bring a policy issued by any company, to Dr. J. S. Stanley, Dr. Albert Traweek Jr., or Fred Wallace, Hospital Administrator, for examination.

The staff will not suggest any policy, but merely examine any policy brought to the attention of members.

The purpose of the staff approval is merely to protect the public from buying insurance policies which contain riders or other clauses limiting their coverage.

It was pointed out that frequently a customer buys a policy and pays the premium for years, believing he has protection for himself and family. Then an emergency develops in which he needs the protection, only to discover that the coverage is so limited as to be almost worthless.

A spokesman for the staff said, "It is not our purpose to criticize insurance. It is to the advantage of everyone to have good insurance. We have no purpose except explain to the buyer exactly the amount and kind of protection he is buying."

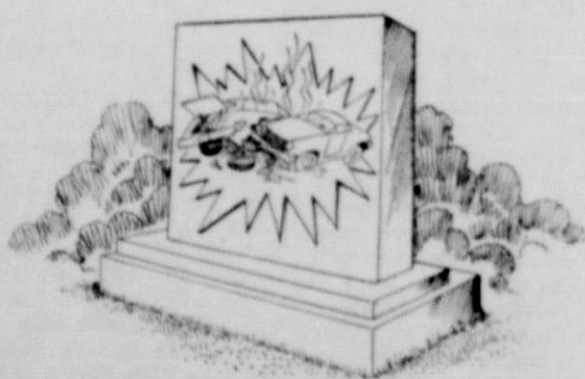
Small topiary trees, sprinkled with multi-colored daisies and connected by blue satin ribbons marked the closed entrance to the

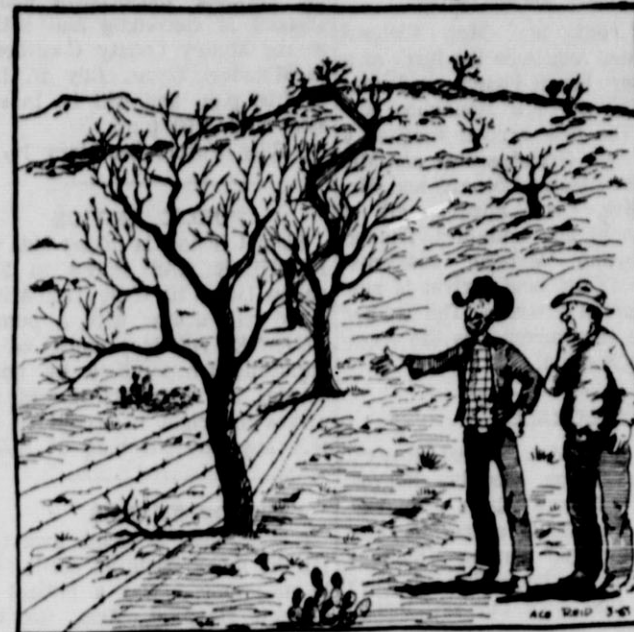
