Known Dead at 21; Loss at \$200 Million

500 Injured 5,000 Homeless After Storm Hits City Without Warning

LUBBOCK, gleaming jewel on the throat on the young and opulent South Plains, has been crushed. A mighty tornado struck the unwarned city about 9:30 Monday night, leaving 21 known dead and 500 injured.

The devastation included the recently completed palace-type banking institution of the First National Bank, Pioneer Gas Company Building. Also the skyscraper Great Plains Life Building and other new and modern structures in the business area. No building in the main business area escaped damage.

The city of 196,000 was partially without power, lights, gas and water. Bell Company said 25,000 telephones were out of service. Over 500 long distance lines were useless.

Every available peace officer, fireman and the augmented Department of Public Safety, was pressed into service to be aided by the National Guard, as reports of looting were received.

Hospitals were soon filled with the injured as ambulances and private cars struggled through the dark streets congested with down power lines, uprooted trees and debris of demolished homes.

Two Hundred Million Loss
The loss was being estimated at \$200,000,000 by Tuesday night, and some thought it might even go higher. The stricken area was about one mile wide and six miles long.

The State Highway Department was moving in heavy equipment as the giant clean-up job started Tuesday. Other cities were responding to appeals for assistance.

Disaster Area
Lubbock was declared a disaster area Tuesday after Congressman George Mahon and Senator John Tower and other officials arrived from Washington.

Governor Preston Smith is in Europe on vacation, but Lieutenant Governor Ben Barnes arrived early Tuesday in the Governor's place.

Hard hit in the path of the tornado was the Lubbock Avalanche Journal building which was partly unroofed and flooded. The newspaper was unable to operate for the Tuesday morning edition and the issue was printed by the Amarillo Daily News. Editor Charles A. Guy and Mrs. Guy were in San Francisco.

Lubbock schools closed Tuesday and no business was transacted in the stricken area, which was later sealed off to the public.

With power and telephone failure in the downtown area, the

news media was handicapped. Three television stations (out of the path of the storm) remained on duty all night, as did KFYO radio which received its power from emergency units.

City Is Stunned

Residents of Lubbock, as well as the entire area, were stunned by the devastation created by the storm. Telephone communication was impossible and the public was constantly being warned to stay at home.

Many former Matador and Roaring Springs residents now live in Lubbock and grave concern spread over this community. Early Tuesday many residents received long distance calls regarding friends and relatives in the stricken area.

Four in A Bathtub

A Texas Tech student and his wife from Matador, Mr. and Mrs. Ronnie Cox were in their Tech Village apartment (which was hit) with two boys who were visiting them, when the storm struck. Mrs. Cox, the former Shelly Stevens, is pregnant. The four went into the bathroom to seek shelter in the bathtub. Mr. Cox shielded his wife with his body and the two boys crouched over them, after first dragging in a mattress which they used as a cover.

Peering out, they saw the steel and concrete roof lift a time or two, then vanish. They escaped injury, but a steel beam from the roof pierced a divan where they had been sitting only moments before.

John Stevens and L. M. Cox, respective fathers of the couple went to Lubbock early Tuesday and brought back their clothing which was soaked during the storm. Mr. and Mrs. Cox are presently with his aunt and family, Mr. and Mrs. Leo Archer, former Matador residents.

John Russell also drove to Lubbock in the early hours to ascertain the safety of a granddaughter, Linda Russell, a Tech student and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. M. (Sonny) Russell, and of other relatives who live in Lubbock.

Barnhill Seeks Son

John L. Barnhill left around 1:30 a.m. Tuesday for Lubbock, after television news reported that University Arms apartments had been struck. His son, John Lynn Barnhill has an apartment there and is employed as assistant teacher in Government at Tech while working on his Masters degree.

In the meantime, John Lynn, with a friend, Miss Sandy Corder, a teacher in Amherst, arrived here around 4:30 a.m. in her automobile. Her apartment on Broadway, had also been struck. The air conditioner in Barnhill's apartment was damaged, and his car was wrecked. After an extensive search, including the hospitals, Mr. Barnhill learned through friends of his son, that he was safe, and returned home around noon.

Mrs. Vernon Higginbotham and daughters, Jan, Nancy and Betty were in Lubbock, Monday and decided to remain overnight at a motel after storm clouds began to appear. She called home to inform Mr. Higginbotham of their plans, and after the news of the tornado was broadcast, he left immediately to join his family in Lubbock to accompany them home.

RAINFALL HERE LESS THAN 1969

Rainfall here to the 10th of May was less than for the same period in 1969, according to records kept by Bob Stanley. The total for 1969 was 5.59 inches as compared to 3.98 inches this year.

The rainfall in 1969 was none in January, 90-inch in February, 2.80 inches in March, 83-inch in April and 1.06 in May.

This year .03-inch in January, 54-inch in February, 2.97 inches in March, 44-inch in April (and about .10-inch Monday night).

Polite Robber Regrets Action

A polite robber who held up Glen Brotherton, employee of the State Comptroller's office, at gunpoint last week, said he regretted his method of obtaining money, but needed it to get to a job in California.

Brotherton, on his way home about 10 p.m., had stopped at a rest area at Silver Falls. He noticed a car parked near by in which a woman sat. He met a man coming out of the rest room. When Brotherton started out he was met by the man holding a shotgun who demanded his wallet and started his apology.

Brotherton offered to lend the money (about \$45) and allow the robber to return it to him. The man holding the gun declined, but did return the wallet with driver's license and other valuables, after removing three gasoline credit cards.

He then removed the keys from Brotherton's car and tossed them in high weeds and brush. The car drove away while the victim searched in the darkness for his keys. Brotherton later returned to Crosbyton and reported the robbery.

The car, bearing a California license was stopped by Childress police who arrested the couple. Brotherton recovered his credit cards and most of his money which the polite holdup man had taken.

Residents Warned Of Vicious Dogs

Local residents are warned to beware of vicious dogs roaming the streets, since recent attacks on residents.

Latest incident occurred Thursday when Miss Nina Kincanon was attacked and bitten by two dogs, in the vicinity of Spot Cash Grocery. She was treated by Dr. Albert Traweck.

"Animals should be penned up until it is determined whether they have rabies, or not," the physician stated. "When they are shot immediately, the best evidence is destroyed. The patient should be treated and the animal kept penned for at least a week before being destroyed. The head is then sent to state health authorities to be analyzed."

Ed D. Smith Jr. Deputy Sheriff In California

A native son of Motley County, Ed D. Smith Jr. is now a deputy sheriff in Monterey County, California. He was commissioned March 24. He presently works at night shift in Salinas, according to a recent letter to his mother, Mrs. E. D. Smith who currently is employed at Silverton.

Smith graduated here with the Class of 1960, later attended Tarleton and Tech for a time, then entered the armed service in 1964. After two years of service he found employment in California and has lived there since that time. He married in 1967.

In a letter to his mother, he said his sergeant is from Lubbock and that a patrol deputy with whom he works, is from Pampa. His home is Seaside, California (1949 Napa Street).

"Almost 70 years later, Mrs. John Duff Green will be honored by friends and family Sunday at her home with a combination birthday and Mother's Day celebration. Joining the celebration will be some 50 to 100 guests who will gather in Roaring Springs for the festivities. The day will also mark her 70th year as a resident of the area.

"The then-Miss Myra Kelly taught for seven years at the turn of the century and as one of the leading citizens gave the small community of Afton its name. On Christmas Eve of 1901, she was married to John Duff Green, a ranch-hand who was the first person to meet her upon her arrival in Dickens. Green died in Spur in 1960.

"Mrs. Green has seven children, 17 grandchildren and 19 great-grandchildren. It has been an active 90 years for Mrs. Green, who still makes several flights a year to California aboard jets that were not even envisioned 70 years ago when she received \$40 a month in gold for her teaching duties. She's just hoping that the second 90 will be as much fun."

BILL BARNHILL IS NAMED TO ATTEND 10TH NUCLEAR SCIENCE SYMPOSIUM

STUDENT and teacher, Bill Barnhill and Principal Wayland Moore of Matador High School will attend the four-day 10th annual Nuclear Science Symposium at the University of Texas, Austin, June 25.

Barnhill and Moore are among the 23 students and teachers sponsored by the West Texas Utilities Company. The symposium is sponsored by the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation and the university. WTUC and nine other electric power companies in Texas make up the foundation.

Barnhill and Moore are among some 550 students and teachers who will attend the meeting. They will have the opportunity to hear scientists from both industry and education discuss physics and other related topics.

Two afternoons will be spent touring the science laboratories of the university. Included will be visits to experiments being carried on in thermonuclear (fusion) research. These experiments are being carried on by scientists at the university for the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation.

"West Texas Utilities Company is interested in this research as a future source of generating electricity," Roff Hardy, president, said. "These experiments are aimed at eventual control of the nuclear reaction which takes place in the hydrogen bomb."

When harnessed, the energy released could be used for such peaceful purposes as power generation.

A major feature of the symposium will be an address by Dr. Theos J. Thompson, member of the U. S. Atomic Energy Commission, Washington.

"Our association with the university in this program," WTUC President Hardy, said "has provided a field of research for a number of university students and the opportunity to have these annual high school symposiums."

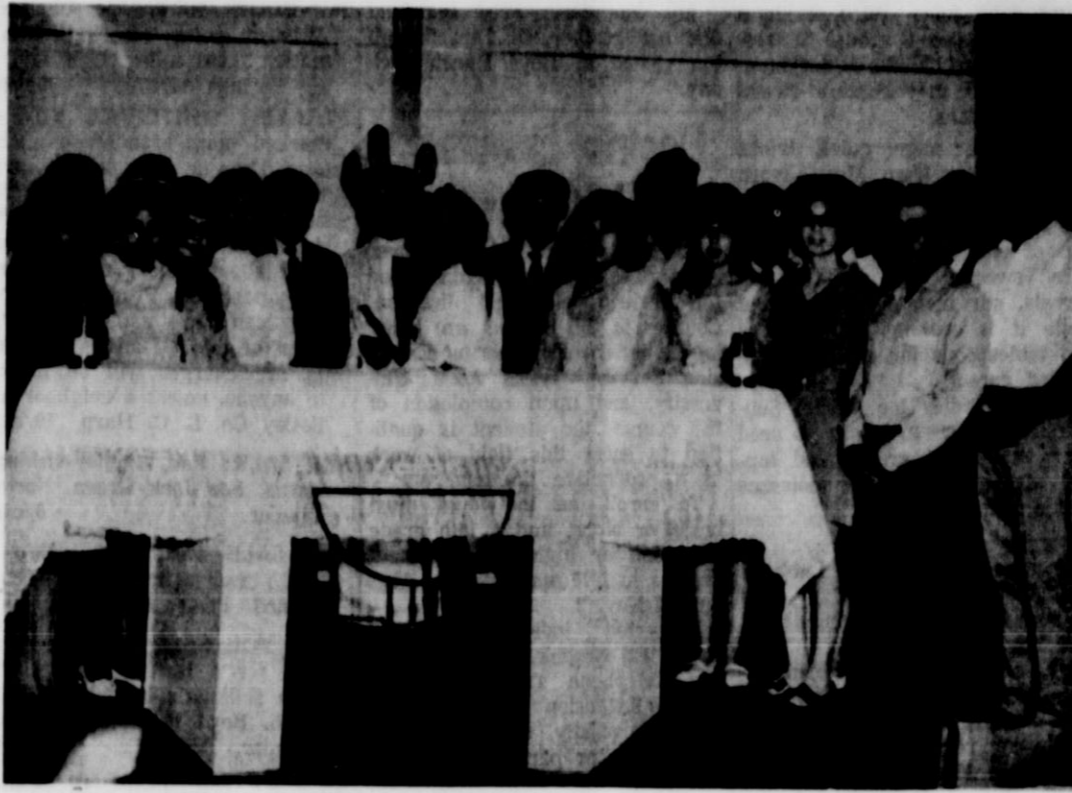

Acreage Survey Scheduled Soon

During the last half of May, some 40,000 Texas farmers will receive at their mailboxes a most important questionnaire from the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service in Austin.

County Agent Pallmeyer says it will be the annual acreage survey and that many farmers in Motley County will be included in the 40,000. The information derived from the replies will be the basis for the official estimates of crop acreage for the State of Texas and for each county.

Cary D. Farmer, state statistician for the Texas Reporting Service, emphasizes the importance of getting back just as many of the 40,000 questionnaires as possible so that each county will be well represented. Accurate estimates are of great importance to farmers in planning production and marketing and in providing an unbiased picture of Texas Agriculture, Palmer adds.

The Texas Legislature, explains the county agent, has provided a program of estimates for each county. Because Texas covers such a wide area, State totals alone do not provide adequate information on our most basic industry; hence, the need for county information. The program is a cooperative effort of the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Statistical Reporting Service and the Texas Department of Agriculture.

All farmers in the county who receive the questionnaire should fill it out accurately and completely and return it as soon as possible to the Reporting Service.

Molasses is Still Used as Sweetner

In the 18th and 19th century, every American cabin and covered wagon had a molasses jug or barrel. It was the principle sweetener.

Its popularity shrank only after sugar refining was improved and sugar became abundant and lower priced.

Whether used in cattle food, on pancakes or grandma's molasses cookies, the sweetener is produced by cooking the juice of special cane until a syrup is reached.

Mrs. Gwendolyn Clyatt, Extension consumer marketing specialist at Texas A&M University, explains about the types of molasses and gives a few quick tips using the old time favorite.

Unsulphured molasses, delicately flavored and reddish-brown in color, comes from juices of sun-ripened, fully matured sugar cane.

Sulphured molasses is a product of sugar making and contains sulphur from manufacturing fumes.

For cattle feed and alcohol, sulphured molasses is boiled to remove a large quantity of the sugar.

Sorghum syrup comes from sor-

ghum cane juice. Pure sorghum must be labeled Sorghum Molasses, Sorghum or Pure Sorghum. Otherwise it may contain sweetening additions.

Here are some quick tricks with molasses from Mrs. Clyatt. For a molasses milk shake stir one tablespoon molasses into a cup of cold milk.

To sweeten hot whole-grain cereals, stir molasses into cereal while it is cooking. Use one to two tablespoons for each cup uncooked cereal.

A West Indies Ice Cream Sundae calls for molasses poured over vanilla ice cream and topped with gingersnap or molasses cookie crumbs.

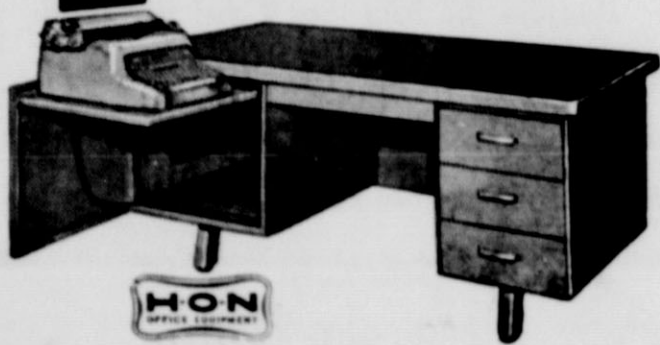
