Hospital Here May Open by April 15th

HOSPITAL service may open here by April 15 in the Motley General Hospital, it was announced Tuesday by Administrator, Fred Wallace. He was the principal speaker at the luncheon meeting of the Matador Lions Club held in the basement of the First Methodist Church, Tuesday.

Mr. Wallace said he had about 70 applications in response to an appeal for employees, and that he had a full staff with the exception of Registered Nurses, but that it was probable a former

The facility is expected to be completed by the first of April. He said the hospital, under present arrangement, will have 17 employees.

Mr. Wallace said it is probable that the hospital will not have Medicare approval at the opening, until the required staff of Registered Nurses can be employed. He said, however, it is not unusual for a small hospital to open without Medicare until a staff can be completely recruited.

Guest Speaks on Mediums of Art At Meeting of El Progreso Club

Ten mediums of art were discussed by Mrs. Verna Power, decorator from Childress, in a program on "Creative Homemaking" for El Progreso Study Club, Thursday afternoon. Hostess for the meeting was Mrs. John Barnhill.

Mrs. L. B. Campbell, president, opened the meeting, and Mrs. R. E. Campbell Jr., served as program leader and also presented the Inspirational Thought at the conclusion.
