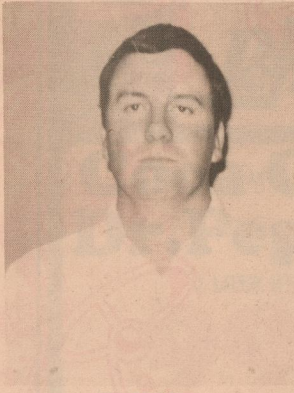

# First Christmas Carol

The first Christmas carol composed in America was written in the Huron Indian language, by a Frenchman.

The lyrics were written in 1641 by a native of France, Father Jean de Brebeuf, for his Christian converts. He set the words to a popular French tune, "Une Jeune Pucele."

In his writing, the French priest described the Hurons' reverence for Christmas: "They built a small chapel of cedar and fir branches in honor of the Infant Jesus... Even those who were at a distance of more than two days' journey met at a given place to sing hymns in honor of the newborn Child."

After the Hurons were defeated by the Iroquois, they resettled near Quebec, preserving the Christmas carol among their traditions.

# Christmas Memories

As time keeps running down hill to Christmas and I realize that this year I won't have any family with me, I find myself drowning in a pool of self pity! But after talking to several of my "widow friends" I found out that I am not the only person who will not be with family. We have put our heads together and have decided we will make our own Christmas. What would we do without friends!

There are a number of Christmases that stand out in my lifetime.

When our house was being built in 1917 and 1918 we were living in our big two story barn until our house was finished. My two brothers and I loved that barn. The loft was our play room and we enjoyed every minute that we spent there. We were in the barn for one Christmas and that was a special Christmas. Santa brought me a "lady doll" made out of papier mache' and she was dressed just like a grown up lady! But that beautiful doll didn't last long because I left her in my father's chair, he sat on her and she was mashed flat as a pancake! That same Christmas Santa Claus brought me doll dishes, a white doll bed with a blue mattress and a real trunk. The tray didn't last long, because my younger stepped in it and broke the bottom out. He said he did it accidentally, but I have always doubted that statement. My dad made a doll table for me - it was made out of an old bread-board and I thought it was beautiful!

It seemed I always got everything that I wanted for Christmas, but one time I was disappointed. Teddy Bears had just come on the market and I asked for a bear. But it wasn't on the tree. My dad told me that they were so expensive that even Santa couldn't afford them.

Those first Teddy Bears weren't soft, furry huggable bears that they are now. Their fur was real short and very stiff and the bodies were stuffed with excelsior which is wood shavings and those bears had the hardest bodies. I finally got my bear, though, - my husband gave me a big brown, soft, loveable bear for my birthday only a few years before he died.

Another Christmas, I remember clearly. My brothers hung their stockings in my bedroom beside my stocking. On Christmas morning, our stockings were full of fruit, nuts and candy, and my younger brother, John, had a handful of switches in his, but under his stocking there was a pair of boots - and my brother, Howard, had a saddle blanket under his stocking. I was very puzzled and couldn't understand how Santa knew the size boot that would fit John. My brothers convinced me that Santa knew everything. That year Santa brought me a doll, a toy stove and a doll buggy. I could never understand how Santa Claus could come in my room, leave all those presents in my room and never awaken me. I guess I was a really dumb kid. It's embarrassing to admit that I was in the 6th grade before I found out that Santa was the spirit of loving, giving, and caring. But my brother

kept me believing in St. Nick by all the wonderful things they told me about him!

The way I was convinced that there really was no live Santa was rather sneaky on my part. One Christmas Eve our parents sent us upstairs to bed early telling us that the earlier we went to bed the sooner Santa would arrive.

Like all children on the night before Christmas I couldn't go to sleep. I kept hearing Mom and Dad talking downstairs in low tones. I slipped out of bed and tiptoed to the top of the stairs and peeked down into the living room, and Mom and Dad were putting presents on the tree. I could see a big baby doll and a set of white furs - a muff and a fur scarf. Dad was putting a little box under the tree

and I heard Mom say, "I wish you would take that back, she is getting too much." Dad said, "No, I want her to have it." I slipped quietly back to bed and felt so guilty for having been so sneaky. I never told my parents what I had done. The next morning I couldn't wait to open that little box. It was my first wrist watch! That day I grew up a lot. The furs and watch made me feel grown up, but the doll made me cling to childhood a little longer. I still have the watch, but it doesn't run. One day my brother John and I got into an argument that was rather physical and my watch flew off my arm, hit the wall on the other side of the room, it stopped to never run again.

I've always had happy holidays at Christmas time - but some of them have been filled with loneliness and sadness. During World War II my husband was in the Army for almost four years. Three of those years were spent overseas in North Africa, England, Belgium and France and for three years my Christmas holidays were filled with loneliness and worry. But there were several "war widows" who were friends of mine and every war time Christmas we all got together at my house, had a Christmas Tree, exchanged gifts, ate and played bridge.

Sometimes we played bridge all night. Friends are one of the most wonderful gifts we can receive. In spite of the loneliness and worry we had a lot of fun together.

I'll never forget the first war time Christmas that my husband was overseas. He sent me a picture of him standing by a Christmas tree. The soldiers had decorated that tree with wads of cotton, the only decorations on the tree and no gifts under it. I can still look at that picture and cry!

Christmas was always a big event at our house. My father was Santa Claus at the Church and one time he dressed as Santa Claus at home. My two oldest nephews were at our home for Christmas one year and they were very small at the time. Dad came in dressed in his Santa Claus suit and all of us were telling him hello and making a big thing out of his appearance at our house. The younger boy looked Santa over carefully and said, "Huh, he looks like grandpa to me."

Dad never wore his Santa suit at home again.

The Church Christmas tree was always a big event. The men would go out and cut the biggest native cedar tree they could find, put it up in the church and the women and children did the decorating. By Christmas Eve that tree was loaded with all kinds of gifts. The Church would always be full, and every child there would get a red net bag of fruit, candy and nuts.

There was always a Christmas play. The little boys wore their bathrobes, towels for turbans, and crown's made of pasteboard and covered with tin foil. Little girls were angels with their halos quivering over their heads and their little wings all askew, and my big baby doll was the Baby Jesus for many years. I have long since given that doll to my great niece. Maybe it is still portraying the Baby Jesus. I've always missed having the big tree at the church, with the church full of people, and the sparkling eyes and eager faces of the children. But times have changed!

The saddest Christmas of my life was the year our son, our only child, died. Christmas has never been the same since. But Christmas is always a joyful happy time if we will just keep the meaning of Christmas in our hearts, and remember that Jesus was born to save us all from our sins if we'll only believe and accept him.

# A Christmas Journey

Please allow me to share something with you that is worth sharing. A long time friend of our family, the late J.L. Woodruff sent on Christmas a letter containing a sentiment expressed a few years ago by a Dallas clergyman, the Rev. John Anderson.

The sentiment is I have held and have expressed numerous times when teaching a Sunday School class, though never so eloquently as the Rev. Anderson. Those who are away from home or traveling during the holiday season know how it tugs at their hearts to hear the old song, "I'll Be Home For Christmas."

Whether the journey is to Bethlehem or to the Land of Oz, you long to get there, says the Rev. Anderson. He portrayed images of the meaning of Christmas by drawing a parallel between Dorothy's journey in the beloved children's classic The Wizard of Oz and the Christmas journey of Christmas to Bethlehem.

Dorothy is caught in the vortex of a cyclone. She is whisked out of Kansas and lands in a magic kingdom where there is a yellow brick road. "She doesn't know what to do, but she

wants to get home," said Dr. Anderson. As Dorothy begins her journey she picks up three delightful characters who also are looking for something...a scarecrow looking for a brain, a tin woodsman who says he needs a heart, and a cowardly lion seeking courage.

The uncommon little group trekked down the yellow brick road in search of the Wizard of Oz, who, they were told, would tell them how to realize their dreams.

According to the Scriptures, it also was an unlikely group that make the journey to Bethlehem to witness the newborn Jesus. In the New Testament book of Luke, the writer tells about the down and out shepherds and peasants who visit the manger. And Matthew writes that the up and in... three wise men were led by the stars to the birth home of the savior, Dr. Anderson said.

As if in a parable, Dr. Anderson said, Christians today are on a journey to that little town of Bethlehem. "Some of us are never going to get there," he said. "Some of us are so intrigued withinsel and glitter that we miss the starlight and stable straw. We want to go to Bethlehem, but we don't want to lose the map."

Dr. Anderson, remembers that in Oz, on his way to visit the wizard, the scarecrow came up against all sorts of problems, and solved each one. Every time the tin woodsman saw people in trouble he cried, and the group had to keep stopping and oiling him to keep him from rusting.

Whenever danger struck along the way, it was the lion who "leaped ahead to help his friends and protect them," the minister recounted. Finally they reached the wizard, only to find that he wasn't a great king on a throne, but a wizened little shrimp of a man.

Something always happens on a journey, Dr. Anderson said, and the wizard tells the little group what happened to them. The scarecrow had a brain, he said, but didn't use it. The tin man had a heart, but didn't know it and the lion was so humble he didn't realize he had courage.

"That's what life does to you," Dr. Anderson said. "You don't just see it at the end. You gather it as you make the journey." The three wise men, he said, started out wealthy and arrogant; they knew the stars. They had a lot to live with, "but little to live for." They thought they knew it all, but all they had was a general direction.

"Not until they found God's word, only in the word of God, can the final revelation come," said Dr. Anderson.

Dorothy took a journey, he said, and she would never be the same again. She would never forget what she learned.

If Christians walk with Jesus .... not just to Bethlehem, but the cross .... they will discover "that going home is the best part of the journey."

"That's why we celebrate and care about each other and sing joyous songs," he said. "It's Christmas Day. It's a journey we cannot miss."

# A Christmas Reminder

The shepherds' fields can still be seen northeast of Bethlehem where David kept his father's sheep. Hence Bethlehem was known as "The City of David." Located in Judea, in the hill country on the main highway to Hebron and Egypt, it is 2550 ft. above sea level. Modern Bethlehem's slopes still abound in almonds, olives and figs. Still considered a village, it has a population of under 10,000.

After the conquest of Canaan, it was called Bethlehem-Judah to distinguish it from a town in Zebulun also known as Bethlehem, now a village of Beit Lahm, seven miles northwest of Nazareth.

Bethlehem was the burial place of Rachel and the home of Ibzan the 10th judge; of Ruth's father-in-law, Elimelech, as well as her husband, Boaz. David was the great-grandson of Ruth and Boaz.

In Jeremiah's time there was an Inn near Bethlehem that was the usual starting place for travelers going to Egypt and it is believed to be the place of our Messiah's birth. So the town that was "little among the thousands of Judah" became quite famous - even to this day.

Much has been said and written and sung about Bethlehem, but we should be reminded that because of Jesus it is remembered. Jesus made the difference then, as He still makes the difference now. Without him in our daily lives, a "Sunday" religion is worthless. Without Him in our hearts, our words are empty when we speak of Him. Without his anointing, a prayer, a song, a sermon is lifeless. A church service without the presence of the Holy Spirit is little more than a social gathering. Where there is

absence of the Lord, there is hatred, envy, jealousy, greed, gossip, back-biting, all the things He hates; but where His presence is welcomed and acknowledged, there is peace and joy, forgiveness, compassion, love, understanding and a sincerity that cannot be mistaken by those that see our daily lives.

He then writes his memories of his service in the Civil War. The family lived in the state of Missouri at the time of his service.

James Knox was the father of Rev. Bob Jameson, Luther, Lem, Tom, Ed, John, Charlie and Almus. Many descendants still live in Motley County.

Almus & Linnins My dear children,

Your letter received good to hear from you again. This arrives as well. J.D. Lem and Jim have just returned from Ford Co. They were four days getting from Ford home and Tom and Bob went out and met them just this side of Tongue River and they then put 6 head to the wagon and had a team still for the Hack too. Boys were worn out and Tom and Bob told them to take Hack and come on and they would bring wagon, J.D. and boys got here at 8 in night. Tom and Bob at 10, so you see they (too) had it the hardest. So each think well that has ever been the case. Each know that there's been a little bit worse that any others ever experienced.

Well this brings me to a little synopsis of my boyhood days.

In the latter part of Civil War when times were rough and wolley my people were all or nearly all Southerners and I had grown up in size to the stature of a man. The Federals were and had been in possession of our Country for quite a while. So word came that General Price, a rebel general, was coming again to route the Yankees. So orders from the Federals was to enrolle every man into the Militia. So I did not wish to take up arms against my own people and to avoid bearing arms and fighting my people I hired to the Federal Government to whack a 6 mule Team. So I left home early in September and the night following, word came early in the night to string out fellow on double quick (string out, a word for hitchup). So we did, then began a race for Rolla, Missouri which was 100 miles distant. My recollection is the second unhitching we were in Rolla. May have stopped twice on the Road and partook of a little sow belly (or bacon) and crackers. 100 six mule teams going at break neck speed and one awful rain fell on us and some pretty deep Rivers to cross and in the night, but we got there all the same. Then Fort building was in order and every soldier and every Teamster was put to work.

Well it would take so much time and space to describe a Ford and the building thereof but I worked in the trenches, night after night. We worked by relays. Then news came that Price was passing north of us and aiming to capture Jefferson City the Capital of MO. Orders string out once more and proceed to the Commissary Department and load on double quick and it was pouring down rain. We loaded and then the march began for the

Many admonitions are made to people to confess, repent, ask forgiveness and receive Jesus into their hearts, but what we believers seem to forget from time to time is that he also calls us to pray, humble ourselves and turn from our wicked ways. It is our own free will that determines our eternal destiny. In that manger in Bethlehem, our reason for being was born; our hope of eternity came as a man but yet God. He grew in wisdom and knowledge. He at times was hungry and cold and was tempted as all men are; but He resisted temptation and fulfilled his purpose for being on earth - He died in our place. And He is coming back to receive us into himself!

# A Christmas Letter From Long Ago

capital which was 100 miles distant. We traveled day and night over 200 wagons and an army of Cavalry. 2 Rivers to cross and in the night and it rained all the time and was cold. Rivers so deep I had to draw feet away up on the saddle to keep out of water and I was riding a 16 hand mule (at that).

A torch was on the opposite side for us to drive too. Well we went into that in the front wagon at dark and at 2 o'clock next morning we had all pulled the opposite bank. Had been three days with nothing to eat except one little piece of bread and a little piece of meat. So we camped without orders in a flat bottom covered with water. I was fevering and chilling. I piled up some fence rails to keep me out of the water and lay down to get some much needed rest. Was worn out, sick, lonely and yet thousands of men.

One old General was scared out of his wits all the way; we jumped stumps and scattered things but this we did not dread; the worst that lay upon our minds was

Oh who is after McNeil  
Someone is I know  
Surely is General Price  
For I heard the Cannon roar.

So on we went pell mell for Jefferson which was then distant 12 miles. So we made it and on we went through the city to the Missouri River before we unhitched we were ordered right back the road we had come, and out to Fair Grounds 4 miles from City, and everything was confusion so much, so they let us pass through all but one of the Federal lines. Which were all in battle array and the Rebels coming up a long hill fighting as they came. Then a courier came with orders to get back to City with those wagons. Think of it kids, hundreds of wagons to turn and run, you ought to have witnessed that maneuver. Then run, my, all the reason we did not fly we did not have wings.

Now this is my story of a continuous rainy and stormy trip and sleepless trip more days than you kids without no one to look up into my face and call me sweetheart or give me a crust of bread. No blankets to keep me warm or dry. As they had stolen my bedding. We remained 9 days in the Capital. Witnessed the battle around the City. As Price had never thought of taking the City he moved around and marched on leaving a detachment of soldiers to keep up the fight till his main army was up the country. Then I witnessed 16,000 men land from Steam Boats all Infantry all to pursue Price. I was then detailed as a Regimental Teamster then came one of the hardest and longest marches and a starvation and freezing for weeks. I can't give any more of that memorable trip as am out of paper. But am sure it was equal to your trip from Ovalla.

Well Christmas is over and we will never be all together again. I am sad. Small Pox is all over Paducah; more than 100 cases yellow flags up everywhere.

And sorter keep up on Your side, in tears as well as laughter.

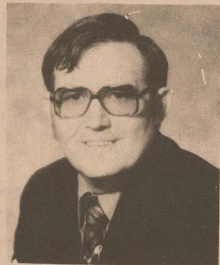
I've seen old cows a starvin', and it ain't no happy sight:

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## Home Economically Speaking

### COOKING NUTRITIOUS AND DELICIOUS FOR THE HOLIDAYS

Nowadays, most people know to cook with less fat, but a few guidelines are needed. Cooking nutritious and delicious meals requires leaning small, but significant changes in food selection and preparation.

Misconceptions are that delicious foods cannot be low in fat, cholesterol, sodium, sugar or calories. However, tasty, family meals that are low in calories and fat and high in nutrition can be prepared. Plus, good eating habits and better health are the results.

Learn to recognize rich and heavy foods and to modify and balance the meal with lighter ones. Reducing fat doesn't have to involve abrupt changes in eating patterns. These simple cooking tips can help you modify your favorite recipes:

- Whenever possible, cook with little or no added fat.
- When roasting or broiling, use a rack in the pan to drain off excess fat.
- Avoid high fat cream sauces, mayonnaise and dressings. Fat can be reduced by a third in gravies, sauces, puddings and quick breads.
- Cut back on fatty meat products. Always choose the leanest cuts of meat. Remove skin from poultry.
- Trim off excess fat from fatty meat products.
- Use skim milk or low-fat milk in soups and gravies. Substitute low-fat yogurt when recipes call for cream.
- Use whipped low-fat cottage cheese in place of sour cream or mayonnaise. Yogurt or cottage cheese may be substituted for sour cream in some recipes for sauces, dips, dressings and main dishes.
- Substitute vinegar, wine or broth for oil-based marinades. Try lemon juice on salads instead of heavy dressings.
- Avoid adding salt or reduce it by

half. Instead, add more herbs and spices to increase flavor.

- Substitute two egg whites for one whole egg when recipes call for eggs.
- Avoid deep-fat frying.
- Skim off fat from soups, sauces and stews.

- Use generous amounts of fresh vegetables and fruits. Fruits and berries can replace desserts and can satisfy your need for sweets.

- Omit sugar and other sweet products as much as possible. Sugar can be reduced by a third in many holiday desserts. If a recipe calls for 1 cup sugar, for example, use two-thirds cup. This works best in fruit-based recipes and in making puddings and custards. The sugar in cookies and cakes can also be reduced, but requires some experimenting to find an appropriate level.
- To increase fiber intake, substitute whole grain flour for one-fourth to one-half of the refined flour in holiday baking. If a recipe calls for 3 cups of all-purpose flour, use three-fourths whole grain flour and 2 1/4 cups all-purpose flour.
- Read labels when buying canned and packaged food products. Look for ingredients that add fat, sodium and calories.

Now is a good time to try modifying favorite holiday recipes for healthier alternatives to hand down as part of your family tradition.

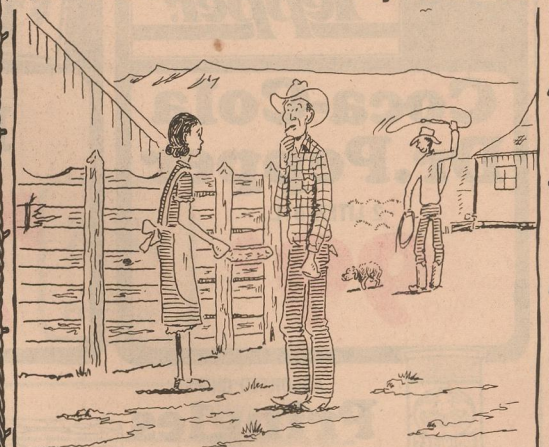
