## Santa is Coming Here Saturday

**SANTA CLAUS IS COMING TO MATADOR. He will be here Saturday at 2 p.m. and will ride in a parade which will start on south Main Street and continue north to the courthouse. The announcement was made Tuesday by Lion Eddie Russell, chairman of the Lions Santa Parade Committee.**

Santa will be in one of six floats scheduled to be in the parade, which will be led by the Patton Springs High School Band. Santa will probably ride in the Lions float accompanied by Lions Queen Jana Jones.

Other floats scheduled in the Santa parade include Baptist R. A.'s Boy Scouts, F.W. Elernas Study Club, and North Pease Youth Camp (Church of Christ), and the Patton Springs school.

Patton Springs Carolers will sing Christmas carols after the band reaches the business section, and announced Santa will greet as many little girls and boys as possible during his visit here Saturday. He is later scheduled to go to Roaring Springs as guest of the Roaring Springs Lions Club, where he will again visit boys and girls.

Santa will visit business places here and aided by helpers, he will give away candies, nuts and fruit. Other Lions on the Santa detail here are Alvin Stearns and J. M. Hill.

### Humble Leases Received Here

HUMBLE LEASES OF 466,526 acres of Matador Land & Cattle Company land made on the first day of December, 1937, have been received by County and District Clerk Pat Sheridan. The vast tract of land is located in Motley, Dickens, Cottle, Floyd and Crosby Counties, but approximately 250,000 acres are located in Motley County.

The land is being released by the Humble Oil & Refining Company after 29 years and approximately 50 test wells. In most instances one half the minerals is owned by the purchasers of the Matador Ranch land, while the other one half is the property of the Treador Royalty Co. of Dallas.

Largest owner of the former ranch empire is Rock Island of Wichita, Kansas (now operated as the Matador Ranch) and comprises 116,000 acres, including the ranch headquarters here at Matador.

The leases (to be released) were received by Special Delivery Saturday, by Clerk Sheridan. Other counties have also received proper instruments for releasing. Only exception was one section of land in Dickens County, said to be located east of Spur, which had been subleased.

### Lighting Awards Plaques Received

Four engraved plaques to be presented by Matador Lions Club in the annual Christmas lighting and decorations contest, have been received.

Two of the plaques will be given in home decoration and two will be given in the decorations of business places (a first and second place plaque in each division).

Lion Elbert Reeves ordered the plaques and had them engraved, as club secretary. He delivered the last week to Doug Meador as chairman of the committee. Others on the committee are Rev. John Fitzgerral and Bill McGahren. Out of town judges will select the winners on December 17.

## Young Mother Dies In Weird Tragedy

**A YOUNG MOTHER, prone on the highway shortly after 1 a.m. Sunday, was run over by an automobile and her body mangled. Mrs. Billye Karen Smallwood, 25, died in Paducah Richards Memorial Hospital at 3:58 where she had been rushed by a Seigler ambulance.**

The tragedy occurred on State Highway 79, about 1/4 mile south of the Matador city limits and only a short distance from the entrance to the Matador Ranch headquarters. The car which ran over Mrs. Smallwood was driven by A. Dale Kaiser, White Deer school teacher, who was accompanied by his wife and Mr. and Mrs. Charles Meadows. They were returning home from a football game at Snyder. The weather was cold and a light drizzle was falling.

First officer to reach the scene was Deputy Bobby Williams, who was relieved by Sheriff J. D. Spray, who waited beside Mrs. Smallwood until the ambulance arrived.

Officers quoted Kaiser as saying he thought the body was "a bundle of feed" that had fallen from a truck. Investigations indicated that the woman's feet were pointed south, and that the car was northbound.

Kaiser stopped his car immediately and had gone back to see what he had hit when Deputy Williams passed. Ambulance attendants said Mrs. Smallwood was conscious during part of the time, although her body was badly mutilated.

No charges had been filed late yesterday in the case, as officers continued investigation. Mrs. Smallwood was the mother of two daughters, LaFonda 7, and Rocky 4. She was working as a beautician in Ralls.

Funeral services were held at 2 p.m. Tuesday in Dumont Methodist Church, with the Rev. Cecil Guthrie, pastor, officiating. Interment was in the Dumont Cemetery under the direction of Norris Funeral Home, Paducah.

Mrs. Smallwood was born in Cottle County Oct. 23, 1941, and had been living in Ralls for the past two years. She was employed by Maurine's Beauty Shop there.

Survivors, in addition to her daughters, include her parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Smith, Dumont, three brothers, John, Keith and Stanley Smith, all of Dumont, and one sister, Mrs. Jim Cross, Matador.

Funeral services for Mrs. C. D. Pipkin, 87, held at 2 p.m. Saturday in the First Methodist Church, marked the passing of the last surviving charter member of this congregation.

The Rev. John Fitzgerral, pastor, officiated, assisted by the Rev. W. B. Vaughn, retired minister and former pastor of the church. Burial was in East Mound Cemetery under the direction of Seigler Funeral Home.

Mrs. Pipkin died at 5:20 p.m. Thursday, Dec. 1 in Crosbyton Memorial Hospital. She had been a resident of Nichols Manor Convalescent Home in Crosbyton about five months.

Mrs. Pipkin was a member of one of Motley County's earliest families. Born Ida Edmondson, January 29, 1879 at De Leon, Tex., she came to Motley County with her parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. T. N. Edmondson and other members of the family, in 1891. The trip from Comanche County was made in covered wagons with two other pioneer families, the Joe Hollands and the J. L. Burlesons.

She was a girl of 13 when her parents helped organize the Matador Methodist Church under some cottonwood trees on Ballard Creek in 1892, and was among its original members.

She was married to the Rev. C. D. Pipkin, a circuit-riding Methodist minister, February 2, 1898. He helped organize a number of the early-day Methodist churches in this area, including that at Crosbyton, where he was pastor for several years.

Rev. and Mrs. Pipkin returned to Matador in 1918, and he died here in March, 1941. Mrs. Pipkin was also preceded in death by one son, Clyde.

She is survived by four sons, W. N. (Bill) Pipkin, Matador, Earl Pipkin, Marble Falls, Tex., Leslie Pipkin of Lamesa, and Cecil Pipkin, Lubbock, a brother, Jim Edmondson of Dumont, a sister, Mrs. Orwin Roy of Crosbyton, 16 grandchildren and 19 great grandchildren.

Nephews were pallbearers. They were Howard Edmondson, Julian Edmondson, Emmett Jenkins, Homer Jenkins, Neal Roy, Glen Roy, Herman Ellithorp, and Clarence Jenkins.

YIELD of cotton per acre has doubled in the past 20 to 30 years, which accounts for some of the surplus, according to Walter Wells, ASCS office manager of Lubbock.

He made the principal address at the regular luncheon meeting of the Matador Lions Club here in the Methodist Church basement at 12:30 p.m. Tuesday. Wells was introduced by Lion Richard Newman office manager of the Motley County ASCS office.

The speaker announced his subject as "The Future of Agriculture," and said he sees an exceedingly bright future for the production of food and fiber on the nation's farms. He based his outlook on the many changes which have been made in farming in recent years and said the future must hold many more.

He said the present population of the earth is 2 billion people, and that it is estimated that 3 billion will live on the earth in the next ten years.

He sees many changes, with larger farms and fewer farmers. "Many side Prods. and landowners will find them. It has been said that one fisherman or one hunter is worth as much to the economy of the country as the production of a bale of cotton. We will see many changes in thinking."

In reporting to approximately 200 college presidents and professors, the committee said it would recommend to the Legislature an optional retirement or annuity program, paid research or study leaves, state aid for group insurance plans, the waiving of tuition for faculty members and their families and lifting the legal ban against construction of parking lots that don't charge user fees.

**WATER PLAN ADVISORS** — Twelve West Texans have been named as an advisory group to the Texas Water Development Board to keep the board informed of West Texas attitudes toward the state's fulfilling its Texas Water Plan.

The 12, nominated by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce and the Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., of Lubbock, will be kept fully informed and will be asked for advice as two major Texas engineering firms and the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation explore various ways to get water surpluses from East and Northeast Texas to West Texas.

**HIGHLIGHTS and SIDELIGHTS FROM YOUR State CAPITOL**

AUSTIN, Tex. — Gov. John Connally has made his big decisions on state spending and taxes for the coming fiscal period.

He scheduled releases of his budget by sections starting this week. Reportedly, it calls for just under \$200,000,000 in new taxes.

First section on state employment problems calls for payroll hikes of \$75,000,000 from all funds and \$26,000,000 from the general revenue.

Connally told Texas mayors and council members that he will not recommend the optional local sales taxes they advocate. He indicated that he won't ask for an increase in state general sales levies.

Speculation is that the governor will include a gasoline tax increase, college tuition boost and sales tax on alcoholic beverages in his revenue program.

He definitely will recommend some financial relief for hard-pressed cities. He hinted this will be in the form of state assistance for building, maintaining and policing streets.

While Connally completed his financial recommendations which will be sent to legislators on December 15, legislative budget writers made no progress.

LI Gov. Preston Smith has not called a meeting of the Legislative Budget Board since dismissal of Director Vernon McCrex on August 29. Smith promised a legislative budget would be submitted by the January 15 deadline, however.

**REQUESTS ALMOST DOUBLE** — Texas' state agencies have requested 93 per cent more money for the 1968-69 biennium than they are receiving during this biennium. Governor Connally said that's evidence of the increasing complexity and magnitude of state government.

### COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:

For those interested in making newspaper logs that burn in multi-colored flames, here are the instructions.

Loosely rolled newspapers should be tied with heavy twine and soaked in a solution of 4 pounds copper sulfate and 3 pounds rock salt dissolved in 1 gallon of water. For additional colors, add small amounts of copper chloride, potassium chloride, strontium nitrate, lithium chloride, most of which can be purchased from drugstores or chemical suppliers. It will take several days for the papers to dry, but once dry, a paper log will burn all evening, producing rainbow colors.

Wood logs or cones can also be treated and the result will present the rainbow colors. To treat these materials, you will need an onion sack to place the items to be treated in the solution, and weigh the bag so all the material will be covered. Soak for about 10 minutes, dry overnight, and they are ready for use in the fireplace.

With the arrival of colder weather, proper feeding of cows

and calves takes on more importance.

The production efficiency and comfort of a mature cow is not reduced by cold weather, provided she is full of forage, has a dry coat and is exposed to dry still air. The temperature at a given level of feed intake where no additional feed is necessary to maintain body temperature is called the critical temperature. It is slightly above the temperature at which cattle begin to shiver. A cow on a fasting diet or without any feed will reach the critical temperature at about 55 degrees and a maintenance ration will lower the critical temperature to about 23oF.

Cattle can be kept warm and survive cold weather if they consume sufficient forage. Low-quality roughages high in fiber serve as efficient feeds during storms because of the high heat production that results from digesting the fiber and roughage.

Additional information in this subject is covered in B-1043, Feeding the Cow & Calf, which is available for the asking.

The boar accounts for one-half of the genetic material in swine herds and therefore is important

in the selection of a good boar. A good boar should be growthy and weigh about 220 lbs at about 5 months of age. He should be well muscled, have adequate length, have sound feet and legs, and be free of any physical defects.

Boars are 8 to 9 months of age before they reach sexual maturity and should be 9 to 10 months of age before using. Do not overfeed, as overfat boars are not as active as lean trim boars.

Don't use just any type of boar. Be sure to give your hog program a full chance for success, mating good type animals.

It is easier to remove garden debris now than wait until bad weather. Remove faded annuals, cut back the perennials which have finished blooming, cleaning up the debris and replenish mulches now. By cleaning now, you can help eliminate or reduce many of the insect or disease problems which you may encounter.

Don't rush the pruning of woody ornamentals, waiting until late winter, just before the new growth starts.
