WASHINGTON -- The Farmers Home Administration, preparing to ease its ban on granting emergency loans to farmers without crop insurance, has instructed local FmHA offices to begin accepting loan applications, says U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm.

'The 1990 farm bill specifically waives

the crop-insurance requriement, and now

FinHA is moving to reverse its policy as the law requires," Gramm said. Specifically, FinHA's Washington office has advised its state directors, dis-trict directors and county supervisors to

begin processing emergency loan appli-cations from farmers who did not carry crop insurance in 1990. "Clearly, FmHA intends to complete

Mrs. Elliott, leader, introduced the program with a review of "Christmas Traditions", using as her source an article form the Lone Star Gardener magazine on "Christmas Legends of the Birds",

taken from the South Carolina Gardener.

She also read a clever parody titled "The Day After Christmas".

"Wild birds have a place in Christmas legends, traditions and the hearts of mankind at this special season," she said.
"Scripture reveals Christ's close associa-

scripture reveals Clinists close associa-tion with birds and their use in parables and teachings." The article cited as ex-amples in legends, the goldfinch, robin, wren, stork, bluebirds, whippor-will and the canary, once a wild bird, and con-cluded with this interesting fable: "The Spanish say that while the Holy Pamily were seeking escape from Herod

Family were seeking escape from Herod and his soldiers, birds accompanied them, encouraging them with song. When it seemed they would be overtaken, a dove seemed niey would be overlaken, a dove and quail flew to safety, but a lark led them into concealment. When the sol-diers asked which way did they go?' the lark sang 'follow me' and led them away. Since then, the quail have been unable to fly to great heights and they sleep on the ground in a circle, heads pointing out-ward towards their enemies. The dove has since been unable to sing a glad song, but laments its sadness for forsaking the Holy Family. The lark continues to sing its flutelike song and is known as a herald

Answering roll call, the members brought a childhood family picture to show and tell about

An interesting paper on "The Chrismon Christmas Tree" given by Mrs.
Robert Darsey described the emblems used in decorating a tree with a religious theme. The introduction stated, "The Chrismon Tree began as an offering to God. He blessed the offering and it became a song of praise and thankfulness to Him...Chrismons speak of our Lord, Jesus Christ, whose birth we celebrate in December."

The word "Chrismon" Mrs. Darsey explained "...is a combination of parts of two words -- Christ and Monogram. The two words -- Christ and Monogram. The symbols used to decorate the tree bring out the reason we celebrate Christmas. Chrismons are usually made in a combination of white and gold: white refers to our Lord's purity and perfection; gold to His majesty and glory. An evergreen tree is used to symbolize eternal life, and tiny white lights point to the Christ as the Light of the World."

Mrs. Darsev described some of the Chrismons used, including Cross and chi of roses (the chi being the first letter of

Chrismons used, including Cross and chi of roses (the chi being the first letter of Christ, in greek); the Manger Scene, the Angels, Wise Men; and chi Rho with Alpha and Omega (the beginning and the end) which symbolizes the divinity of Christ. An Orb with Cross symbolizes God's dominion over the earth, which is our Blessing not only during the Christmas Season, but throughout the whole mas Season, but throughout the whole

word is Yule is Scandinavian, coming from the word wheel, indicating the changing of the season as the sun turns on its course." She also read a companion paragraph from Douglas Meador's Trail Dust: "Christmas is a drift fence across prairies of the past to keep friends from

COST OF LEGAL SERVICES

Some new year's resolutions - buying or selling a house, establishing a child's

of setting a flower, establishing a cliffur education fund, writing a will - may call for legal services. Unless you had a lawyer whose serv-ices you use regularly, how will you select one? Lawyers' fees are often a big consideration. A little extra effort in the selection process will help prevent unex-pected large bills later. Follow these tips: *Comparison shop. Comparison shop

for lawyers' services just like you do for other products and services. Call to get prices on specific, comparable services.

* Ask for recommendations. Get personal recommendations from friends, relatives and co-workers. Ask whether they felt their costs were reasonable.

Check referral services. Some legal aid offices will offer low-cost legal ad-vice and referral. For real estate dealings, a title company or real estate broker may be willing to refer you to the lawyer with whom they work.

* Talk with your attorney. Schedule a

* Talk with your attorney. Schedule a meeting before the project begins to ask how fees are charged for routine services such as notarizing, photocopying, etc.
* Get it in writing. You can ask for a fee agreement at the beginning of the project which outlines in writing the retainer estimated hours and cost per hour

tainer, estimated hours and cost per hour, projected expenses and timetable for completion of the project. You can have your lawyer bill you on a monthly basis and question any fees which seem unrea-sonable.

* Investigate alternatives. For routine

legal tasks, such as real estate transfers and wills, pre-packaged kits or computer software is available. You should, how-

ever, confirm the legality of the alternative with a lawyer or legal aid office.

* Recognize your choice. Realize that higher cost does not imply better service. The legal field is very competitive and legal fees widely for comparable exper-

GETTING THE MOST FROM CREDIT CARDS

It is easy to forget that credit cards can It is easy to torget that credit cards can be used for more than paying for products and services. Checking current credit card agreements for forgotten benefits may prove worthwhile. Many credit card companies offer warranty periods for products bought with their card. Medical assistance programs may be available through some credit cards which provide referrals to doctors when traveling, arrange for eyeglasses or medication, or range for eyeglasses or medication, or provide needed transportation to hospi-tals in emergencies. Some credit cards will relay urgent messages for a traveler or deliver emergency cash. Others offer discounted insurance for card holders. Some even offer low-cost banking services. Many of these benefits are over-looked by card holders when they could provide useful, or even vital services.

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

Social Security, increases from \$520 to \$540 in 1991. A person earns 4 credits, the maximum, if 1991 annual earnings are \$2,160 or more. A 5.4 percent cost-of-living adjustment willincrease the amount of 1991 Social Security and Supplemental Security Income (SSI) payments.

People will see the increase in their benefits received in January 1991.

The annual increase raises the amount of the maximum Social Security retire.

Other changes effective for 1991 involve the retirement earnings test -- the amount of annual earnings a person can have and still receive full Social Security benefits. The 1991 amount increases from \$9,360 to \$9,720 for people 65 through 69, and from \$6,840 to \$7,080 for people under 65. There is no limit once a person reaches age 70.

If earnings are over the annual limit, \$1 in benefits is withheld for each \$3 of earnings over the limit for people 65 through 69. The withholding rate is \$1 in benefits for each \$2 of earnings over the limit for people under 65.

USDA Plays Important Role In Quality Improvements

USDA agencies are in the forefront of USDA agencies are in the forefront of dealing with water quality pollution and identifying ways to improve water quality. USDA agencies, of which the Soil Conservation Service is a part of, assumes an important role as a result of the President's Initiative to enhance water quality. For fiscal year 1991 alone the President has proposed 44.1 million dollars in funding to go toward the improvement of water quality.

The first step in dealing with a water quality problem is to determine if a pollution problem exists. In order to determine tion problem exists. In order to determine this the primary use of the water in question must be designated. Water Quality levels vary depending on the use for the water. For example, the levels of water quality for drinking water are greatly different than the quality levels of water to be used for irrigation. The water quality is considered polluted when an unfavorable condition in the water exists that in turn restricts or effects the designated in turn restricts or effects the designated use of the water.

After it has been determined that a problem exists then the source of the pollutant must be identified. Some of the more common pollutants associated with

agriculture are nutrients, sediment, ani-mal waste, salinity, and pesticides. Availability of the pollutant along with the means by which the pollutant is transported must be identified and understood in order to plan treatment for improving water qual-

After a problem and its source is identified a planned practice to decrease the pollutant and in turn improve the quality of water can be developed. The primary

objective in improving water quality is to control the amounts of pollutants that reach bodies of water. Practices must decrease availability, prevent detachment, or interrupt the transportation process of the pollutant. For example, the transpor-tation of sediment and pollutants may be decreased through a decrease in the runoff and an increase in soil infiltration

The Soil Conservation Service's primary role as part of the Presidents Initiative will be to inform and educate the the will be to inform and educate the public of water quality problems and means by which our waters quantity can be improved. 




