VOTERS went their own free way in Saturday's Democratic primary, and it was not the way many had expected. One of the factors that produced strange

sounds in the results was the light vote. In Motley County less than half of the registered voters went to the polls, and the pattern was reflected across the state. The county polled about 600 votes, with about 1250 registered.

LOCAL WOMEN JUDGE PADUCAH FLOWER SHOW

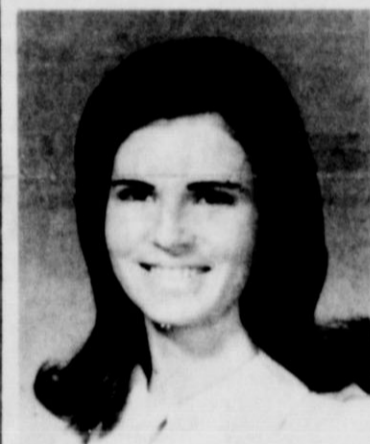

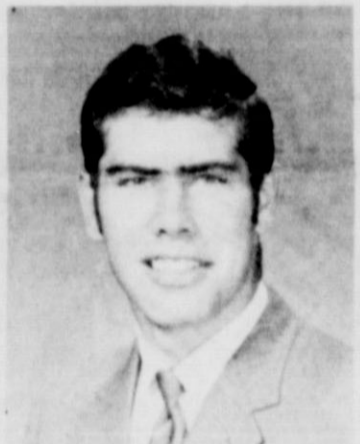
ROARING SPRINGS GRADUATE HONOR STUDENTS ANNOUNCED

Lions Impressed by Tech Museum Plan

THE HISTORY of the west is in the process of being set into a permanent, tangible group of buildings to be known as "Ranch Headquarters" at the Texas Tech University museum.

The plan now in the process of becoming a reality was explained Tuesday by Jerry Rogers, a representative of the university museum, who was principal speaker at the regular luncheon meeting of the Matador Lions Club held in the basement of the Methodist Church. He described the plan in detail, accompanied by slides of various historic buildings which will be moved to the 12 acre site at Tech. Rogers was introduced by Lion Douglas Meador.

"Before it is gone, let's save a way of life we cannot afford to lose," Rogers said, "that our children and their children can understand the history of the pioneers who braved droughts, winds, loneliness, rustlers and Indians. This is the story we wish to capture, from the drab to the colorful, from the tragic to the humorous. Much has been written, but words alone can never tell the story as it begs to be told."

Rogers said 20 historic ranch buildings have been carefully selected by a committee of histor-

ians and historic-minded ranchers and are being moved to the Ranch Headquarters site.

Help Is Needed

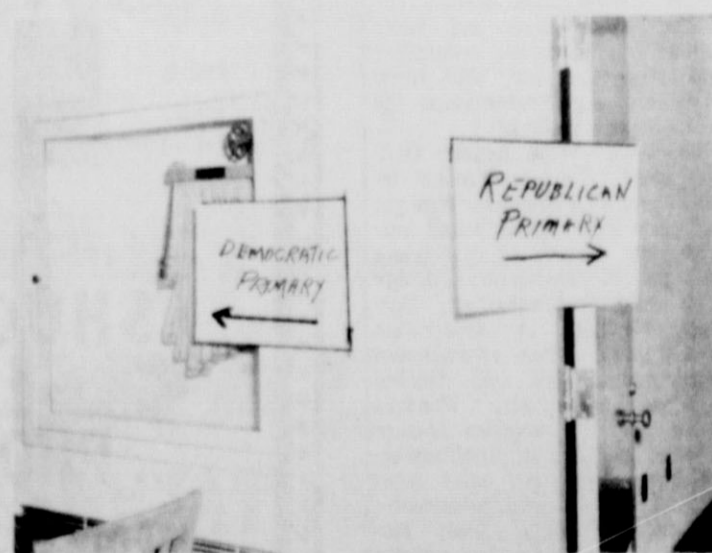
Rogers asked his impressed listeners to help in locating historic furniture, equipment and other exhibit items; in finding old photographs and sketches to make possible accurate restoration of the buildings. He also explained the need for aid in financing the project through gifts, bequests and memorials. He said a memorial gallery will honor those who donate buildings, equipment, furnishings and funds to make Ranch Headquarters possible.

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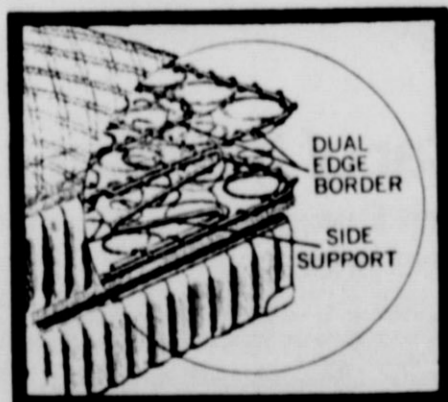
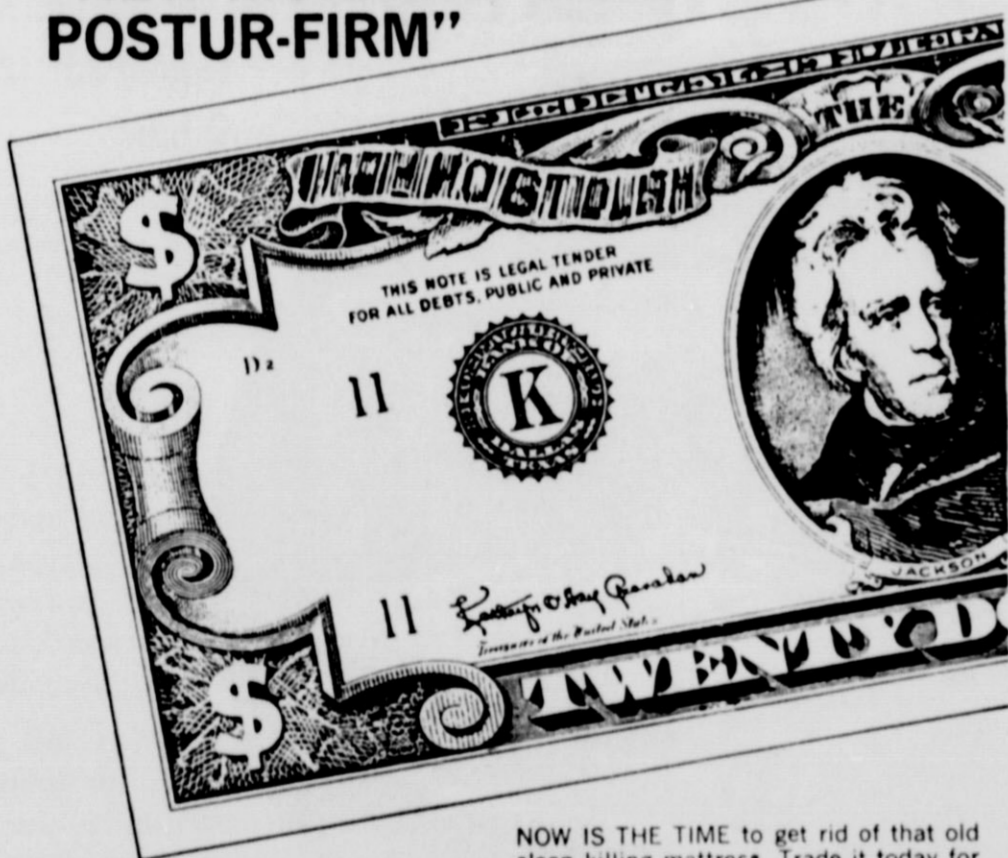
