Rites Held Monday For Dr. J. S. Stanley

A GREAT physician, who had endeared himself in the hearts of hundreds of families in this entire area for 35 years in dedicated practice of his profession, is dead.

Dr. J. S. Stanley, 63, died shortly after noon Saturday in Baylor Hospital, Dallas, where he had been a patient for almost six weeks.

Services were held at 10 a.m. Monday in the Lamar and Smith Chapel at 800 W. Jefferson in Dallas, with the Rev. Carl Keightley officiating. Burial was in Hillcrest Memorial Park.

James Sidney Stanley was born July 17, 1907, at Gause, Texas near Bryan, the son of a pioneer physician, Dr. C. J. Stanley. His parents came to Texas from Wisconsin and after living in South Texas, moved into the Hereford and Dimmitt area where they lived until 1917.

Dr. Stanley attended high school at Cameron and graduated from Buckholts High School. He attended Southwest Texas State College at San Marcos and S.M.U. in Dallas. He received his M.D. degree from the University of Texas Medical School at Galveston and interned at Jefferson - Davis Hospital in Houston.

He married Pearl Stacey, January 31, 1933 at Leesville, Texas. In 1934 he was Texas Tech physician in Lubbock, and in 1935 he purchased the practice of the late Dr. H. C. Earle in Matador, occupying an office upstairs in the old First National Bank building. He practiced there until 1944, when he built the first unit of Stanley Hospital. His practice continued to increase and in 1948 he doubled the size of the hospital.

Because of a cardiac condition Dr. Stanley closed the 18-bed

hospital July 1, 1966. He continued his medical practice from a clinic on Eubank Street until early this summer when an apparent heart attack forced him to cease his practice.

Dr. Stanley was a member of the Methodist Church, Matador Masonic Lodge and Matador Lions Club. He had served as president of a seven-county medical association. He was a member of the American Medical Association and the Texas Medical Association.

Survivors include his wife, Pearl; two daughters, Mrs. Ruth Harrison of Dallas and Mrs. Franklin Thrasher (Kay) of Mount Vernon, Tex.; a sister, Mrs. Carl Israel of Austin; a brother, R. M. (Bob) Stanley of Matador; and three grandchildren, Stacey Harrison and Jim and Paula Thrasher.

Friends from Matador attended the funeral and served as pallbearers. They were C. M. Barton Jr., John Barnhill, Alfred Barton Jr., R. E. Campbell Jr., and Pat Seigler, also Leroy Stone of Turkey.

Matadors Muzzle Bulldogs 34 to 6

The Matadors Friday night muzzled the Anton Bulldogs 34-6 here on Burleson Field, in the first conference exhibition this season.

Matador gained 330 yards rushing to Antons' 76 yards. Halfback Donnie Jackson zipped for 151 of these yards to average 6.2 yards per carry. Matador had 21 first downs to Antons' 10. Halfback Lee Hurt sailed for 95 yards for 4.1 yards per carry.

In the first half, Matadors' quarterback Bill Barnhill was almost untouchable as he scored 3 touchdowns and booted two successful after touchdown kicks. He gained 60 yards for 3.6 yards per carry.

Matadors' Jackson charged over for a knockout punch in the first part of the second quarter. With eight seconds left until the half time whistle Barnhill crossed the goal-line on his third try. At the end of the first half, Matador was ahead 26-0.

Matador wrapped up its scoring in the fourth quarter when half back Hurt powered across for a touchdown and Barnhill pulled the same caper on the extra point run.

The Matadors will challenge another team of Bulldogs Friday night here when Amherst meets them at Burleson field for the Homecoming football game. The Matador Matadors will crown their Football Sweetheart during the halftime activities.

Mahon Predicts Billion Cut in Budget Requests

WASHINGTON, D.C. - Representative George Mahon reports that prior to the Congressional recess last week, all the regular appropriation bills for the session had passed the House of Representatives.

Mahon stated that in the House bills, including a vetoed bill which must be revised and re-passed, the House was below the budget by about two and one-half billion dollars. Final clearance through both Houses will be required before all the bills will be presented to the President for his approval.

When the final chapter on appropriations for this session of Congress is written, Mahon predicts the Congress will have reduced the budget requests by about one billion dollars.

Mahon indicated that in Congressional actions taken or anticipated in certain non-appropriation bills, the budget requests may be increased, and that savings in appropriations may be offset by spending which is mandated in non-appropriation bills for such purposes as increased social security and veterans benefits and housing aids.

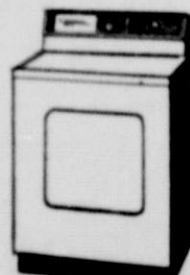
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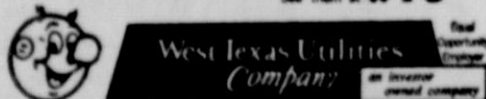

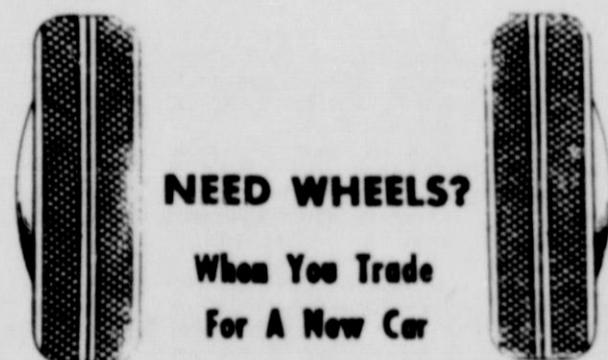
