normal because a large majority because of adverse weather conditions, during the early part of June. The 1969 per acre average varied on individual farms from 3,141 to 641 pounds per acre. It is probable that Motley Coun

ty will maintain its fourth place rating in the state, peanut production, according to Richard Newman, Motley ASCS office manager. The average on a five-year basis was 2,195 pounds per acre.

Motley County had seven new growers to receive allotments in 1969, two in 1968, one in 1967 and one in 1966. The ASCS office has six applications for 1970.

Peanut acreages are governed by marketing quotas voted on by the peanut producers themselves There are no price support or diversion payments for peanuts but peanuts are eligible for CCC loan but no Motley County peanuts have been placed in the loan. It is not easy to get a peanut allotment. The new grower must have had two years experience. He must have satisfactory soil

Probably a record in Motley County is the number of qualified voters who registered before the deadline. The total is 1.256, as compared with 1.081 registered to vote in 1969 elections.


