Short Moisture Shown for 1964

The year that ended at midnight last Thursday fell far short in reaching the average amount of moisture. Farmers, ranchers and businessmen do not need to be informed because the absence of rainfall is reflected in crops, ranges and in gross business.

Here in Matador the total amount of rainfall recorded during the entire year was 13.35 inches (normal is about 20-21 inches). The recording is by Odis Killingsworth, US Weather Bureau official recorder.

The most rainfall in any 24-hour period was August 12 when .98-inch fell. The hottest day was six days previous (August 6) when the mercury reached an official 111 degrees. The coldest day in 1964 was January 13 when the mercury dropped to 6 degrees.

Last January the amount of moisture recorded was 27-inch, but February produced 1.30 inches, March .47-inch. During last April only .06-inch of moisture fell. May had 1.29 and June 2.57 inches.

July was hot and dry with only .77-inch. August had 1.74 and September 1.84. October recorded .41-inch, and November 1.49. Last month the total amount of moisture recorded was 1.14 inches.

Arthur E. White Rites Are Held

Funeral services for Arthur E. White, 88, former resident of the county were held at 3:30 p. m. Dec. 30, at First Methodist Church. Rev. W. F. Gaede, pastor, officiated, and burial was in East Mound Cemetery under direction of Seigler Funeral Home.

Mr. White died on Dec. 27 at 4 a. m. in a Phoenix, Arizona nursing home. Services were also conducted in Phoenix before the body was brought here. He was born Oct. 25, 1876 in Lincoln, Nebraska. He had been a resident of Casa Grande, and Phoenix, Arizona for the past 30 years.

Mr. White resided in the Whiteflat community from 1922 until about 1936 and was a blacksmith there and in Matador during that time. He was married to Miss Clara Bell Hinton on July 4, 1903 at Silver City, N. M. Mrs. White passed away on Oct. 25, 1952, and is buried at Matador.

White, both of Eastland, 18 grandchildren and 32 great-grandchildren.

Four Charter Lions Honored at Meeting

FOUR CHARTER members of the Matador Lions Club, Farris Fish, D. E. Pitts, L. C. Harp and J. R. (Rat) Whitworth were honored Tuesday at the regular luncheon meeting of the civic club.

The program was a review of the pioneer history of the club, organized September 28, 1923, and taken from the excellent records of past secretaries as compiled by Secretary Elbert Reeves.

Farris Fish was the first club president in 1923 and no minutes were made because it was doubtful if Matador Lions Club would continue. At the time the already established Matador Chamber of Commerce had a larger membership.

Business and professional men would go to one club as members of the Chamber of Commerce and then the next day go to another meeting as members of the Matador Lions Club.

Finally a vote was taken and the Lions gained preference. It was not all clear sailing. At about this time the great depression caused many members to be "drop outs" and several times it was suggested the club disband.

The club continued to fight for its existence, and lived to be the greatest civic force in this community. Two of the Lions honored at the "head-table" Tuesday served two terms as presidents. They were Farris Fish and D. E. Pitts.

Secretary Reeves read but a brief outline of club activities during administrations of three of the charter members, L. C. Harp never served as president. "I was president of the Chamber of Commerce" he explained, "which is probably the reason I was never elected president of the Lions." He has, however, during his 37-year membership, served many club offices.

TWO NEW elected county officials assumed office Friday during a ceremony in the District Court room. County Judge Elbert Reeves administered oath of office to new Sheriff J. D. Spray and County Commissioner Reece Timmons of precinct three.

When former Sheriff Jinks Wilson turned in his keys Friday morning, he ended 17 continuous years as a peace officer in Motley County. He served nine years as a deputy and eight years as sheriff.

Commissioner Boone Simpson of Northfield, who did not run last term, completed 14 years in the office. Most of Matador business places were closed Friday but the Courthouse was a scene of activity. Several visitors attended the "swearing-in" ceremony, which was opened by a prayer by Commissioner Chas. Long of Roaring Springs.

Oath of office was administered to Commissioner Clyde Gilbert at his home since he was unable to attend the court-house ceremony because of serious illness.

Former pioneer Matador Ranch cowboy Ed D. Smith, who had been serving as deputy and jailer, has retired to private life. "I want to thank everyone for their cooperation and good will during the time I served as deputy," he told the Tribune.

1964 Had More Births, Deaths

Births and deaths recorded in Motley County in 1964 showed an increase over 1963, but there was a great difference in ratio according to the records of County and District Clerk Pat Sheridan.

A total of 41 deaths were recorded in the county in 1964. Total number of births was 68. Deaths in the past year were almost double that of 1963, when only 21 were recorded. Total births for 1963 were 56.

The records do not necessarily reflect in the actual population of the county, Mr. Sheridan declared. Because of hospitals here and other factors, many births and deaths which become a part of the county's vital statistics, are actually from adjoining counties and other areas.

TO THE RESIDENTS OF MOTLEY COUNTY, TEXAS AND ANY OTHER INTERESTED PARTIES: PLEASE TAKE NOTICE, that after due publication hereof, the undersigned intend to apply to the Texas Legislature at its Regular Session in 1965 for the passage of an Act creating a Hospital District over Motley County under the authority granted by Section 9 of Article IX of the Texas Constitution, the general purposes and nature of such Act being expressed as follows: AN ACT authorizing creation of a county-wide hospital district in MOTLEY COUNTY, TEXAS.

to be known as MOTLEY COUNTY HOSPITAL DISTRICT, providing for an election in Motley County to create a county-wide hospital district and making certain findings in connection with the establishment of the District; providing for the levy of a tax for the District for the purpose of maintaining and operating the District, paying any bonds issued by the District, providing for the issuance of bonds by the District for the purpose of the purchase, construction, acquisition, repair or renovation of buildings and improvements and equipping same for hospital purposes and for any and all such purposes and for refunding bonds and prescribing limitations on such power; providing that the District may execute an operating or management contract under certain terms and conditions and that the District may lease all or part of the hospital facilities under certain conditions; providing bonds issued or assumed by a District shall be lawful investments and collateral for certain funds; providing for the selection of a governing body of such hospital district and tenure of office and powers and duties of such governing body in carrying out the provisions of the Act; prescribing a procedure for the adoption of a budget, the selection of a depository and the power of eminent domain which power is conferred upon the District, prescribing a fiscal year; withdrawing authority for the sale of bonds for hospital purposes by a city located within the District established or the County, prohibiting the levy of taxes by a city for hospital purposes and restricting the powers of Motley County wherein the District is established to levy taxes for the care of indigents under certain circumstances; providing severability; and declaring an emergency.

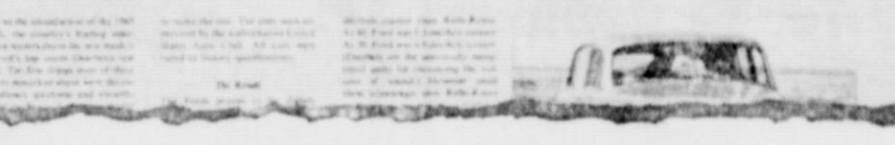

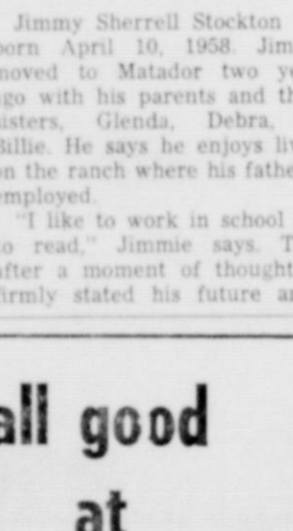

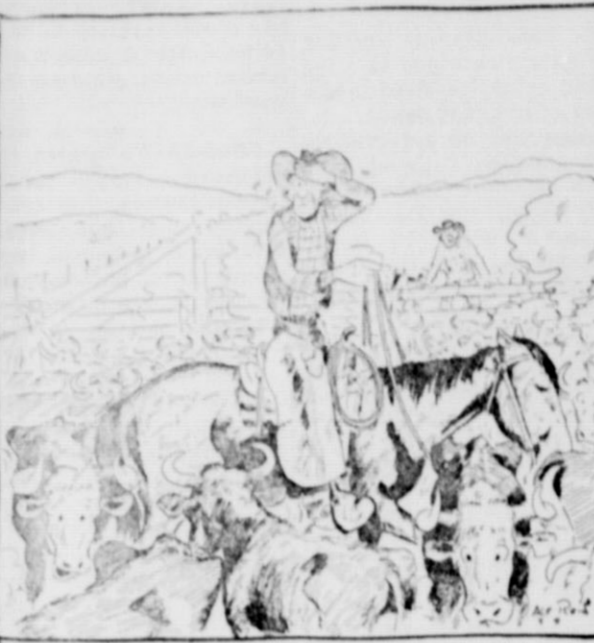

COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:

Now is a good time to check small grains for diseases, and if they are present, resolve to correct this fault before next fall planting. Crop diseases cause reduced stands, reduction in grazing and a reduction in yield.

Leaf rust, stem rust, speckled leaf blotch and loose and covered smut or bunt are diseases that may be found that cause the greatest damage, while stripe rust, mildew, Septoria glume blotch and foot rot cause minor losses. All of these diseases can be controlled with a preventive program. A combination of seed treatment, crop rotation and use of resistant varieties is best, along with proper management of crop residue. Copies of "Diseases of Small Grains in Texas" are available for the asking.

I know that "record keeping" is a dirty word to many, but don't they always help at the end of the year when you are closing out your books for the year and figuring up your income tax? With tax rates as they are now, failure to claim \$25 in expenses results in paying about \$3.50 extra in taxes.

A good set of records have other value, especially when money must be borrowed, so if you are not keeping records, why not give it a trial. They are not much trouble if you record things when you make purchases and sell. Too, they are easier to find in a record book than hunt in the trunk, kitchen drawer or numerous other places where receipts are kept. Books are available for the asking from several concerns, so why not give it a trial.

Plans are underway to organize a "Horse Club" for the boys and girls of the county, but people that are interested in horses and youth are needed to make the program a success. A meeting in January is planned for those who are interested in helping. I have information on programs that have been carried on in other counties, and it will be up to the people in the county to decide what type of program we want for this county. Horse shows, contests, roping, rodeos and items related to care of the horse can be included if desired. Any type of horse can be used, and for those interested in the program handbooks are available.

The following article appeared in a publication of the National Cotton Council, and is worthy of cotton farmers consideration.

Boll weevils are clock watchers, even though they do not know it. Researchers at Texas A&M have discovered that the insects have a "life-rhythm" that completes a full cycle in six hours and affects how much damage weevils suffer from toxic chemicals. The discovery could explain why growers sometimes get a greatly reduced "kill" from normally reliable insecticides. During one half of

the six hour cycle, boll weevils are more resistant to pesticides, then they become less resistant during the second half.

Dr. Charles L. Cole and Perry L. Adkisson found that the six hour full cycle starts exactly at dawn, regardless of the time of dawn. In the first three hours, the insects are highly resistant to such powerful compounds as methyl parathion. During the second three hours, the researchers noted more than 90% of the weevils will be killed by the same insecticide. Resistance again builds up during the first half of the second cycle, only to diminish again three hours later.

The discovery has been hailed by the American Assn. for the Advancement of Science as a significant contribution, not only to understanding insects, but to knowledge about humans. Body chemistry apparently plays a big part in the changes in resistance.
