## Driver Dies After Car Strikes Train

DEATH WAS AHEAD on State Highway 70 about 4 p.m. Monday when a Memphis man drove his automobile into a 67-car Quana, Acme & Pacific freight train at a grade crossing on the edge of Roaring Springs.

Robert Clifton Haynes, 42, of 1316 Main street, Memphis, died in Stanley Hospital a short time after he was brought here by a Seigler ambulance.

E. J. Jones, engineer on the west-bound freight, said he began blowing his train whistle more than half a mile away from the grade crossing. Haynes' car hit the train between the first and second of the five diesel units.

The impact threw Haynes and the motor of his car about 12 feet. The motor was on his foot when help arrived. The car remained upright but appeared to have been hit both front and rear. A step was broken off the second unit diesel. Haynes was traveling north and apparently did not see the train until he reached the grade crossing, although the view of the railroad is unobstructed for a quarter of a mile.

The accident was investigated by Sheriff J. D. Spray and Deputy Bobby Williams, and State Highway Patrolman Buck Johnson.

Haynes owned and operated a pool hall in Memphis where he had lived for four years.

Survivors include his daughter, Mrs. Bobby Murdock of Memphis; sisters, Mrs. James Buck of Colorado City and Mrs. Wilmer Lacy of La Porte; brothers, O. R. and Autry of Weatherford. His mother, Mrs. Nancy Haynes of Memphis and his father, Thomas Haynes of Weatherford.

They have three sons, Marvin of Matador, George of Owensville, Mo., and Wayne Vaughn of Big Spring, who attended the special event with his parents. ## No Clues in Crude Attempted Break In

NO CLUES had been found up until noon yesterday in the ridiculous attempt to gain entry to the vault of the First State Bank here some time Thursday night or Friday morning. Two feet of steel reinforced concrete discouraged the would-be thieves. It was the first attempt in the almost 60-year history of the bank, to gain entry to the money storage.

Vernon Higginbotham, certified public accountant, who has offices in the second story of the bank building, arrived for work about 8 a.m. Friday. He noticed the floor in the west end of the upstairs hall had been torn up, and thought someone was working on the air conditioner ducts.

Insurance agency manager Bill Pipkin, who occupies another upstairs office, arrived later in the morning. The door to his office had been broken open and several pieces of flooring near his door, had been torn up. He called the bank and officers.

Sheriff J. D. Spray and Deputy Bobby Williams investigated the break-in. They found entry had been gained through a window from the roof of the IOOP Lodge building. The would-be thieves (or thief) judged correctly the turn up hallway area to be over the vault.

A small louvered ventilation opening into the stairway at the west end of the bank building, had been broken open (officers believed from the inside). The theory is that the thief or thieves entered the space between the upstairs floor and bank ceiling and finding the maze of ducts and concrete roof to the vault, kicked the slated opening gate loose and retreated.

Entry to the place where the floor was damaged could have been gained merely by walking up the stairs at the west end of the bank. Entry to the space above the vault could have been gained merely by breaking open the ventilator.

Getting into the vault would have taken days of hard work to cut a hole in the concrete. Once inside the vault, getting to the money would still have been

next-to-impossible problem, because it is inside a small vault of almost a foot of solid steel.

Fingerprint experts were unable to find any traces. It is believed entry to the roof may have been gained by climbing the tower of the air conditioning equipment at the rear of the bank building.

It was a different story in all directions. Roaring Springs received more than two inches, with some nearby areas reporting more than three inches. More than three inches were reported in some Whiteflat and White Star areas.

Heavy rains fell on the Ford Ranch southeast of here. Some fields were washed out in the Whiteflat sector. Heavy hail accompanied the terrific rains in some places. Heavy rains also fell on the Plains in the Rails and Crosbyton areas.

Both ranchers and farmers are elated over the improved prospects. Some earth tanks are filled or partly filled for the first time in two years.

Bob Stanley said Monday that the total rainfall here is now more than an inch over the same date last year.

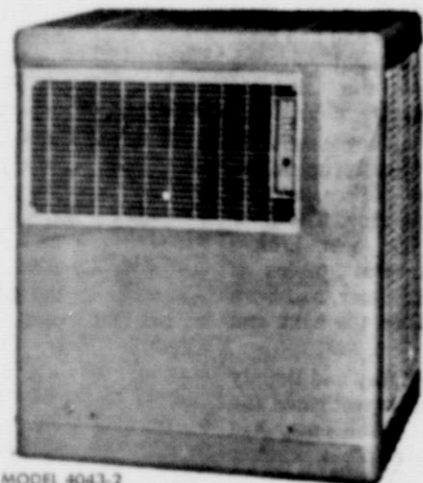



"During the last five years only five morticians have received a license in Colorado while over three hundred have received a Mortuary Science degree in Texas," Mr. Seigler added. 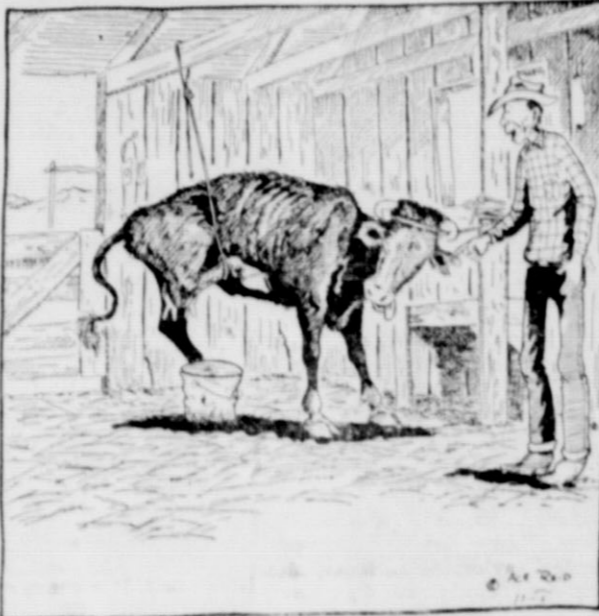

The old minimum weight was 650 lbs, with the old class weights to cover a 150 lb. spread, while the new classification sets the classes on a 100 lb. spread.

Due to the excellent results of the 1965 sale, it was decided to sell the top 5 animals in the market classes in place of the top 4. This will mean 3 additional calves and hogs will be auctioned in 1966.

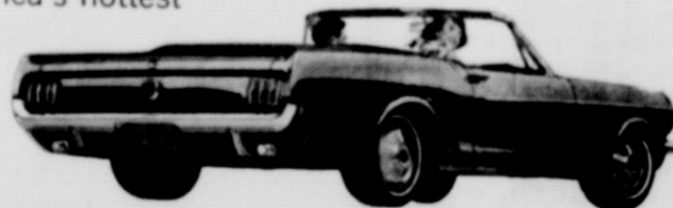
