Schedule Changed For Public Health Clinic

Due to unforeseen schedule changes, the Public Health Clinic usually held on the 4th Tuesday of each month, will

be changed to Friday, October 24, for this month only, it was announced this week.

Mrs. Mike (Jimmie) Isbell, R.N. has assumed duties of Public Health Nurse in the Matador office of Region 2, and will be in the office at Motley General Hospital from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. after next week's clinic. She is also serving as County School nurse.

The clinic next Friday will be held at the hospital from 10 a.m. until 3 p.m. Preventive health services provided without cost will include immunizations, tuberculosis skin tests, check blood pressure, and diabetic screening.

The Motley General Hospital will be a sub-office of Public Health Region 2, Mrs. Isbell said, and will provide services to residents of Motley, Dickens and King Counties. Persons desiring further information can reach Mrs. Isbell at 347-2622.

BROOM SALE Vernon Man Killed When Car Hits Transport Truck

One man died and another suffered minor injuries when a car slammed into the trailer of a gasoline transport truck about 4:30 a.m. Saturday three miles north of Matador on Texas Highway 70.

Dead on arrival at Richards Memorial Hospital was Bobby George Hodges, 34, of Vernon. He was a passenger in the death car, a 1969 Oldsmobile, registered in his name, officials said.

Identified as driver of the car was Donald Gene Baker, 31, also of Vernon.

Driver of the truck, Marvin Bryan of Amarillo, was not injured. Investigators said the northbound car struck the southbound truck's rear section.

T. W. Jennings of the J. M. Hill ranch northwest of Matador, was first at the scene, and notified night deputy Fred (Snow) Crenshaw, who notified Sheriff Jinks Wilson. Other investigating officers were Thomas Canon, Highway Patrolman from Paducah and Sgt. Bill Dean and Ranger Leo Hickman of Childress.

Sheriff Wilson reported finding a shotgun and loaded high powered 22 rifle at the scene, along with two cartons of shells at the scene, and about 50 pocket knives, hunting knives and other hardware items in a suitcase in the car.

Services for Hodges were held at 10 a.m. Monday in the Sullivan Funeral Chapel in Vernon with burial in East View Cemetery. A native of Vernon, he was employed as a truck driver.

El Progreso Hears Patriotic Program

El Progreso Club met October 9 in the home of Mrs. Howard Traweck, for a Patriotic program highlighting Our Heritage.

The meeting was called to order by the President, Mrs. Harold Campbell, who distributed and discussed the yearbooks. Much interest was shown in the Course of Study, "The Bicentennial," portrayed throughout the book. The current theme is, Looking Back, Looking Around, Looking Ahead, Just Looking.

Leader for the day was Mrs. Ben Keltz who opened the program, leading the group in singing the first verse of "America," accompanied by Mrs. Traweck. Roll call was answered by members, "Reminiscences about Roy Rogers and Dale Evans."

Mrs. Traweck then accompanied herself as she sang, "This is Worth Fighting For." She was joined by one of her pupils, Miss Zanna Marshall, and on duo pianos they played "Battle Hymn of the Republic" and "Paul Revere's Ride," the latter with group participation. "America, the Beautiful," was also enjoyed by the audience.

Mrs. Keltz then introduced Mrs. Frank Pohl, who reviewed Dale Evans' new book, "Let Freedom Ring." The book is dedicated to her beloved departed brother, Walter Hillman Smith; to her adopted son, John David (Sandy) who died in service; to all faithful Americans who have lived, fought and died in order that freedom might ring in this country; to our founding fathers, who believed, "Where the spirit of the Lord is, there is Liberty." II Cor. 3:17. God grant that their labor of love and sacrifice will not be in vain.

As the book is told in "first person," Mrs. Pohl gave her review as such, making Dale Evans' great enthusiasm for freedom ever more mindful to the audience.

In continuing the introduction, she said, "I want to be a part of the answer. I want to keep Old Glory flying high; I want to keep aflame the touch of freedom. I want to pass it on when I die, for there is so much good in this country. But all you hear about is the wrong. I want to hear a cheer for the nation. I want to sing the Star Spangled song. I love the 13 stripes of red and white. That represents a courageous fight, to put the 50 stars on the patch of blue, 50 stars for me and you. And for the trouble we have there is a solution, for God has given a Book to show the way. They read the Bible and wrote the Constitution. We'd better start to read and pray."

The idea for the book sprang from "just an idea" as Dale and Dr. Frank S. Mead were discussing the Bicentennial Celebration for 1976. "The thoughts she has put on paper should be read in every home and school across the nation," said Mrs. Pohl. A few excerpts from her review are as follows:

"This country is going through some pretty rough times right now - corruption, scandals, inflation and decreases in church membership and loss of interest in the church. A lot of people have lost hope in a system and way of life... this book is to tell us what is good about America and how to make it better..."

I am calling on you who love your God and your Country to act, wherever you are, with faith in Almighty God to make this nation one under God. The bible says, 'Blessed is the nation whose God is in the Lord,' (Psalm 33:12). America was founded on faith in just such a God, on the Bible, on faith and trust in each other, and that all men are free and equal.

"Much is written by Dale Evans of our early history; the faith the Pilgrims had in this new land; the wars they fought for our freedom; the progress they made putting to work the principals laid down in the Declaration, creating the Constitution and Bill of Rights; how Tom Paine was the first to call this country The United States of America; how this country was conceived in freedom

and, God willing, in freedom we will spend the rest of our days."

"Dale Evans quotes many great Americans," Mrs. Pohl continued, "and many verses from the Bible showing her deep religious feeling toward life. When she and Roy started to pay tribute to God and Country in their shows, some folks in high places of public communication would accuse them of preaching and using their religion for commercial purposes... that has changed. The criticism has died away and many are speaking out for God and Country on TV and radio."

In her conclusion, this Biblical quote was used, "If my people, who are called by my name, will humble themselves and pray and seek my face and turn from their wicked ways, then will I hear from heaven and forgive their sins and heal their land."

The group sang the last verse of America, and the inspirational thought was "Mothers," given by Mrs. Albert Daffern.
