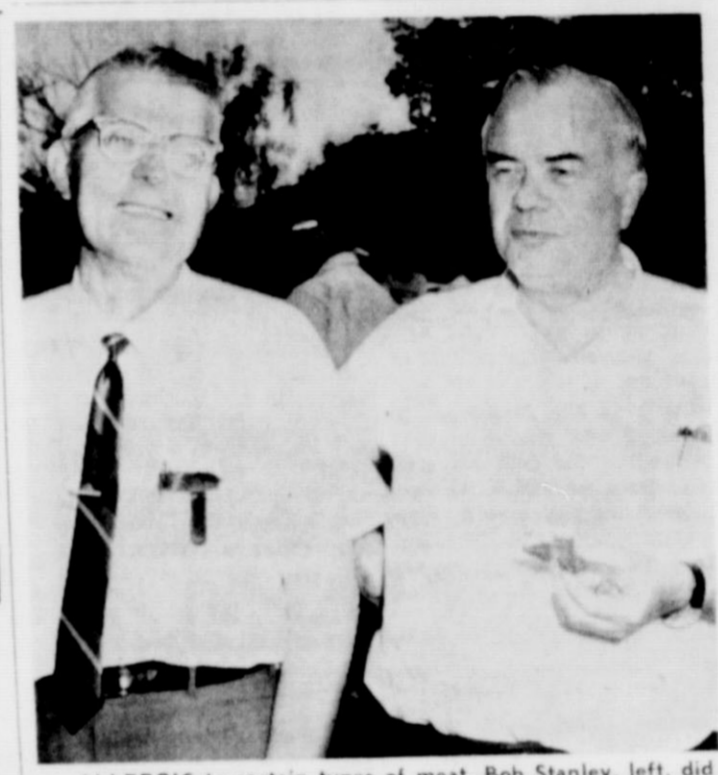
Window Decorating Committee At Work

Petition Here Will Seek Local Option

A PETITION filed Tuesday with District and County Clerk Pat Sheridan requests the Commissioners Court to call a special local option election, which would legalize the sale of alcoholic beverages within the incorporate city limits of Matador. Sheridan certified the petition and declared it contained more than the number of legal voters within the city to request the calling of an election.

Several names were stricken from the petition because the voters did not live within the city. Law requires 10% of number of voters in last general election for Governor. While the Matador precinct voted in the neighborhood of 500, residents of the city were estimated at 350, which would require 35 names on the petition. Sheridan said that there were many more.

Next meeting of the Commissioners Court is early next month. The petition asks for a vote on the legal sale of alcoholic beverages within the city of Matador. It is interpreted to mean the sale of wine and beer for on or off premises consumption, and the sale of hard liquor. It is illegal in Texas to sell hard liquor by the drink.

County Judge Elbert Reeves said the next meeting of the Commissioners Court will be August 8, or the second Monday in the month, at which time a date for the election will probably be set.

The celebration will start with historical tours, beginning at 10 a.m. (to noon) including Matador Ranch Headquarters open (10 to 12) and (2 to 4) Friday and Saturday, and the historical home of the late Dr. and Mrs. A. C. Traweek. The parade is scheduled for 2 p.m. Friday. A program on the courthouse square will include a speech by Lt. Governor Preston Smith and singing by the Sourdough Singers of Matador.

Continuous Program The program for Saturday is filled with entertainment for visitors. Tours will be conducted in the morning. Starting at 2 p.m. will be a double header baseball game, a golf tournament at the Airport Country Club and entertainment on the courthouse square. A barbecue will be held from 5:30 to 8, when the second performance of the pageant will start, to be followed by the street dance.

The 75th Anniversary Association committee has been in almost continuous meeting for at least a week, according to secretary Glenn Woodruff.

Sandwiched somewhere in the two days will be an old fiddlers contest and selection of winners in a beard-growing contest. The beard-growing is voluntary and there is no penalty for not growing a beard, Woodruff declared.

Of course one of the major events will be the announcement of the winner in the Queen's contest at the last performance of the pageant. With this announcement will be the winners of the RCA television sets (one color and one black and white).

State Park Sought For Croton Brakes

THE PAST has been unsaddled and turned out to graze. Matador Ranch cowboys of half a century or more ago are no longer here to look on in disbelief that the Croton Brakes east of Dickens are being considered for a state park.

"Toughest country in the world, where longhorn steers ranged until they died because cowboys and their horses could not cross the innumerable deep gullies," impossible in the past, yes, but today machines and modern engineering skill can subdue any terrain.

Friday afternoon more than 250 people gathered at the Coy Drennan Bar-None ranch house, including high state officials. State officials had inspected the area by plane and helicopter.

Purpose of the inspection and information meeting was to determine the feasibility of developing the highly scenic area into a tourist attraction and recreation spot.

Neighboring towns including Spur, Matador, Roaring Springs, Crosbyton, Lubbock and other communities sent representatives to aid Dickens in a bid for consideration. Free barbecue cooked at a Pitchfork chuckwagon was served the group. Dickens pioneer Robert Reynolds followed the barbecue with an address in which he described the many attractions of the area.

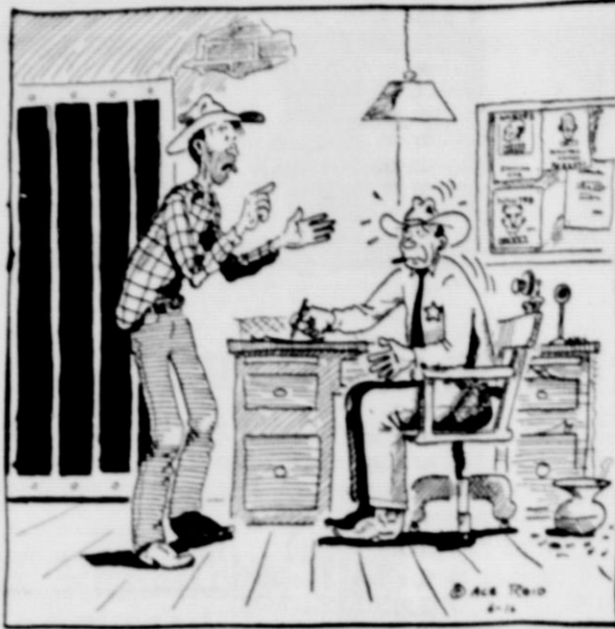

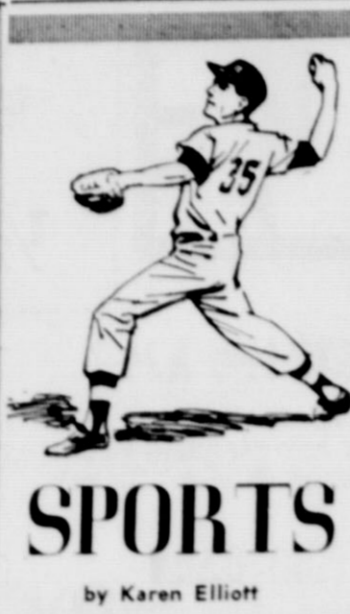

The first check on the cotton seedling disease test plot planted by Bobby Clay of Flomot on June 14 was made on July 4, with the following results: Lanstan 4EC was used, and in the treated area, no infected plants were found. In the untreated area, only two diseased plants were found.

In 1965, seedling disease was a problem in this field, but as cotton was planted over a month earlier, warmer soil may have caused the drop in the disease this year. Additional checks will be made of the test plot.

The beef cattle meetings to cover palpation, crossbreeding and Bonsmaology will be held August 1st and 2nd. Additional information on this program will be given in a later announcement.

A recent survey indicated that Western Stormproof was the most planted variety in the county. Indications are that 53% of the cotton crop is Western Stormproof, followed by Lankart with 19%; Northern Star with 18%; Paymaster with 3%; and Lockett with 2%. Other varieties were 1% or less.
