Hospital Crisis Is Discussed at Meet

SHADOWS OF THE FUTURE projected themselves into a meeting held Monday night in the District Court room here, when interested citizens and taxpayers were informed of the grave hospital situation facing Motley County. Despite the near freezing weather, the room was more than two-thirds filled.

The problem was easy to explain. Two privately-owned hospitals in Matador may close and Motley County may face a future without a doctor. Two doctors, Dr. Albert Traweck and Dr. J. S. Stanley, are weary after long years of service, and their hospitals are operated at a loss, or on a "break-even" basis. They could earn more in private

practice and with much less worry.

The meeting was opened by J. M. Hill representing the Matador Lions Club and followed by County Judge Elbert Reeves representing the Commissioners Court. He introduced Joe Smith of Lubbock, representative of a bond firm, who explained the manner in which a hospital district is created through a special act of the State Legislature.

Judge Reeves explained that if interest was sufficient, two elections would be required. The first would be to create the district and the second would be on a bond issue sufficient to support the district's needs. A mythical 30c per \$100 property valuation was used. It was explained that a property owner with \$1000 in tax-rendition would pay an extra \$3 per year. A property owner whose rendered property has a valuation of \$10,000, would pay an extra \$30 per year.

With the county's approximately \$3,000,000 property rendition the mythical 30c levy would bring in about \$22,000 (allowing for delinquent taxes) with which to pay off the bond issue.

Considers Expense

Dr. Albert Traweck said he had advocated the district B or 10 years ago and that he was not against the proposition provided no doctor would maintain office in the county hospital. He was assured that the law prohibits a doctor having an office in county owned property.

He gave a detailed explanation of his opinion regarding the problems the district might face in operating a hospital. He cited the problem of obtaining nurses, cost of insurance, interest, equipment, replacements and strict regulations of the State Health Department. He said he would probably continue his present operation whether the district is organized or the plan abandoned.

Will Not Make Money

Dr. Stanley spoke briefly. He said his hospital is about on a break even basis, but that it is not a money making proposition. "I have some about as far as I can," Dr. Stanley said, "and I will not be able to continue to operate the hospital and continue practice."

Dr. Stanley said he had an offer to sell his hospital for a convalescent home but that he was willing to move his office to a clinic if it would mean keeping a hospital facility in the county.

In answer to some questions, Dr. Stanley said, "A hospital district will not insure getting the services of a younger doctor, but it will increase the chances ten times." He said young doctors do not want to come to a small town private hospital.

Glen Brotherton made a motion that a straw vote be taken on the attitude of citizens present regarding the creation of a hospital district. The motion was seconded by "Corky" Marshall of Roaring Springs. Dr. Traweck protested that the action was premature. John

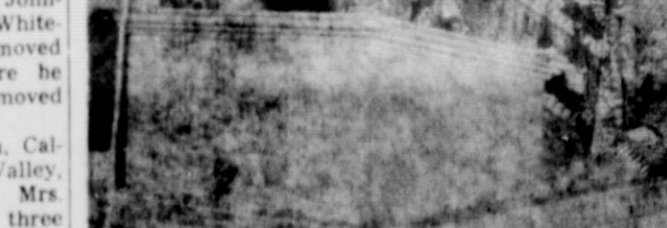

A Thankful Heart is Only Gift Man Can Give God, Says Speaker

A thankful heart is the only gift that a man can give God and can say, "this is my own," declared Rev. James Hancock in a Thanksgiving message Wednesday night of last week, in union services at the First Baptist Church.

"We are prone to think of prayer as petition," Rev. Hancock asserted. "We often fail to express gratitude for what we have received... let us think of prayer as thanks-giving."
