Moore Family Turns Hobby Into Money Making Business

When someone says he/she has a hobby, fishing, tennis or something along those lines usually comes to mind, but for brothers, Wayland and Glynard Moore, and Glynard's son Kyle, a hobby means work.

The Moores, longtime Matador residents, say they are farmers by trade and metal craftsmen for the fun of it. The large number of buckles, spurs, bits and dehorners they turn out, make it easy to see they enjoy their hobby.

Wayland, Glynard and Kyle are all modest about their craftsmanship and the recognition it has brought them. They say although they have built things for famous people, they get more pleasure out of building things for people they

know. "We would just as soon build things for ordinary folks because we can watch them enjoy our work. We get a lot of satisfaction out of that," said Wayland.

While the Moores enjoy building all types of metal products, Wayland said their soon to be patented cattle dehorners are their biggest money makers. Several ranchers had told them they were not satisfied with the quality of dehorners on the market. After some research, the Moores came up with a design and began making dehorners for local ranchers. They make these in all shapes and 4 sizes and have sold about 600 sets so far. The dehorners have been field tested on the Pitchfork, Moorehouse, 6666 and several other large ranches. The Moores' dehorners have held up better than any other dehorners on the market according to the ranchers who have used them.

Belt and spur leather buckles are also specialty items the Moores enjoy making. These buckles are made of mild steel

and are inlaid with silver to the customer's specification. The silver inlays range from a ranchers brand to floral designs and anything in between. It takes about 10 man hours for the Moores to make a buckle. This includes cutting out the raw steel buckle, polishing it, cutting out the inlays and solder them onto the buckle. The Moores try to split these tasks to increase turnout.

Spurs and bits are also on their repertoire. They say they enjoy making these items, but the time required to finish one set, 80 to 90 hours, makes it hard to justify building such time consuming items for a hobby when their other products are in demand too.

While the dehorners can be purchased at area ag supply stores, the other items the Moores make can only be custom ordered. These craftsmen are about 18 months behind and already working on orders for next Christmas.

Matadors Win 3rd At Brownwood Holiday Classic

The Motley County Matadors brought home the 3rd place trophy from the highly rated Brownwood Holiday Classic Tournament, held in Brownwood, Texas over the Christmas Holidays. The Matadors competed in Division I of the Tournament, which included twelve teams, representing some of the highest ranked in IA and 2A High School Basketball.

The Matadors made a good start by defeating Cross Plains 83-49. Senior Matt Washington scored the highest number of points with a total of 20 for the game. Another Senior, Tony Gonzalez, added 18 points, while David Alexander, also a starting Senior, put in 12 points. Sophomore starter, Chris Campbell rounded out the two digit numbers with a total of 13 points. The other starting member of the team, Junior, Clay Ewing, added an additional 7 points to the game. Also participating in the tournament were Burr Barton, Brad Wilson, Paul Barton, Neal Sedgwick, Noel Guerrero, Frankie Ortiz, and Billy Lefevre.

On Friday at noon, the Mats faced Grandview, Champions of the 1989 Holiday Classic Tournament. A very determined Matador team came away victorious over the highly ranked class 2A team, with a final score of 67-62 in favor of the Matadors. The victory placed the Mats in a position on the bracket which required them to return that same afternoon at 4:30 and take on the previous

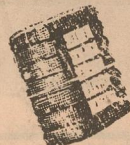
years' 2nd place winners of the tournament, class 2A Bangs. With only a couple of hours rest, the Matadors waged a very close contest with the Bangs Dragons, the final scoring difference being only five points, Bangs 78 - Matadors 73. High point shooter for the Grandview game was Alexander with 19 points. Other two-digit players were Campbell with 16, and Gonzalez with 12. Campbell came away as high point man in the Bangs game, scoring 16 points. Washington scored 14, Ewing 13, Gonzalez 11, and Alexander 10. Senior, Billy Lefevre contributed three-3 point shots which came at very crucial points in the game.

The contest for 3rd place winner was held on Saturday at noon. The Mats were very confident of a victory over class 2A Coleman, and were successful with an ending score of Mats 89 - Coleman 71. A total of 20 points was made by Alexander making him high point for the game. Washington scored a total of 17, Gonzalez 16, Campbell 15, and Ewing 14. The third-place trophy was presented to the Matadors by Harlem Globetrotter star, Meadowlark Lemon. Throughout the tournament, the feeling of the fans, coaches and even officials was that had the Mats had a better draw on the bracket, they would have won the tournament. Not only were they impressed by the team's playing ability, but also the teams' and fan's attitudes and behavior throughout the 3-day tournament. The Mats then traveled to Clarendon on Saturday to play the Broncos. The Broncos were out to get even for the defeat suffered at the hands of the Matadors at Matador earlier in the year. However the Matadors hung in to remain victorious in overtime, beating the Broncos 72-69. Chris Campbell scored a big 29 points for the Mats. Alexander put in 20 and Gonzalez added 14.

The Mats will begin District Competition on Tuesday night against Patton Springs. The Matadors record for the season to date is 12 victories and 6 losses. The Mats are showing great promise this season, and are hoping to be in the Play-offs. Everyone come out and support YOUR TEAM!!

Hospital Board Meeting Report

The Motley County Hospital Board met Tuesday, January 8 at 6:30 a.m. at Billie Dean's Restaurant with all Board members present. Also present was Tony Rose, EMT Director.

President Larry Hoyle opened the meeting with the minutes and December expenses of \$5,447.71, leaving a balance of \$18,007.96.

Hoyle reported that the water pipes in the attic over the north end of the Clinic building froze and burst December 24. The pipes have been repaired. Not all of the other repairs have been finished. There was no insurance for this damage. Also alot of supplies will have to be replaced.

Hoyle read the resignation of Joyce Campbell as bookkeeper for the Hospital Board and Ambulance Service, effective February 1, 1991. Hoyle stated that Tony Rose is being trained for this position.

Hoyle reported the new ambulance from the Collins Company may be ready for delivery by January 10.

Hoyle asked the Board to approve EMS training for Lisa Rose, (she is now an ECA) and Renee Meyer, to be taken in Floydada. He explained the Board pays for the training and the trainee works so many hours or pays the training fee back to the Board.

The Board discussed the purchase of the radios for the new ambulance. Bob Davis motioned to purchase the Motorola radios, motion died for lack of a second. H.C. Smith suggested they wait

until the ambulance is here and then select the right radio from the place they can get good service.

Davis suggested they check on the phone lines the Board is billed for. There could be at least two they were charged for that are no longer used. Hoyle said he would check on this.

The Board went into closed session at this time.

Decision made in closed session was to give Lisa Rose a raise, as she has worked one year as assistant director of the Ambulance service.

Meeting adjourned.

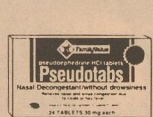

Home Economically Speaking

PREVENT RUST ON YOUR APPLIANCES' FINISHES

Rusting of appliances hits hardest in the southeast area of the United States, near the eastern and western coastlines and around the Gulf of Mexico. Average life span of appliances in these areas may be shortened due to the moist climate and salt air from the ocean.

Once the rust begins, it may be difficult to keep it from spreading. Sanding and painting or replacement may be the only solutions.

Take these preventive measures to help keep rust from occurring:

* Keep your appliance in a dry space. If you live in a warm, humid climate, place your home equipment in an air-conditioned room. Don't keep the appliance on a porch or breezeway.

* Keep your appliance clean. Wipe with a clean, damp cloth frequently, using mild, non-abrasive cleaners. Consult your appliance's Use and Care manual for specific cleaning guidelines.

* Apply a coat of paste car wax to your appliance's finish. This will give it some protection against moisture and dirt that encourage rust.

* Apply touch-up paint immediately on any scratches so that rust doesn't have a chance to form and spread. Most manufacturers sell touch-up paint to match your appliance's color.

Proper care can control rusting and help increase the life-span of your appliance.

UNSOLICITED MERCHANDISE

Getting gifts is fun. But what do you do when you receive a "gift" that you did not order from a company that expects payment?

Some merchandisers send "gifts" with strings attached -- invoices to be paid, obligations for more orders or automatic subscriptions. If you receive unsolicited merchandise, you do not need to pay for it. Don't let the accompanying letter make you feel guilty if you do not want the item. Don't assume a charity represented is legitimate just because they say so, and don't be pressured by a follow-up letter, phone call or even sales visit.

If you receive items you have not ordered or requested, you have the following choices:

* If the package is not opened, mark it "RETURN TO SENDER". The U.S. Postal Service will send it back at no charge to you.

* If you open the package and do not like the item, throw it away.

* If you like what you find in the package, keep it -- unconditionally. By law, unsolicited merchandise is yours to keep. Don't get pressured into paying for something you don't want.

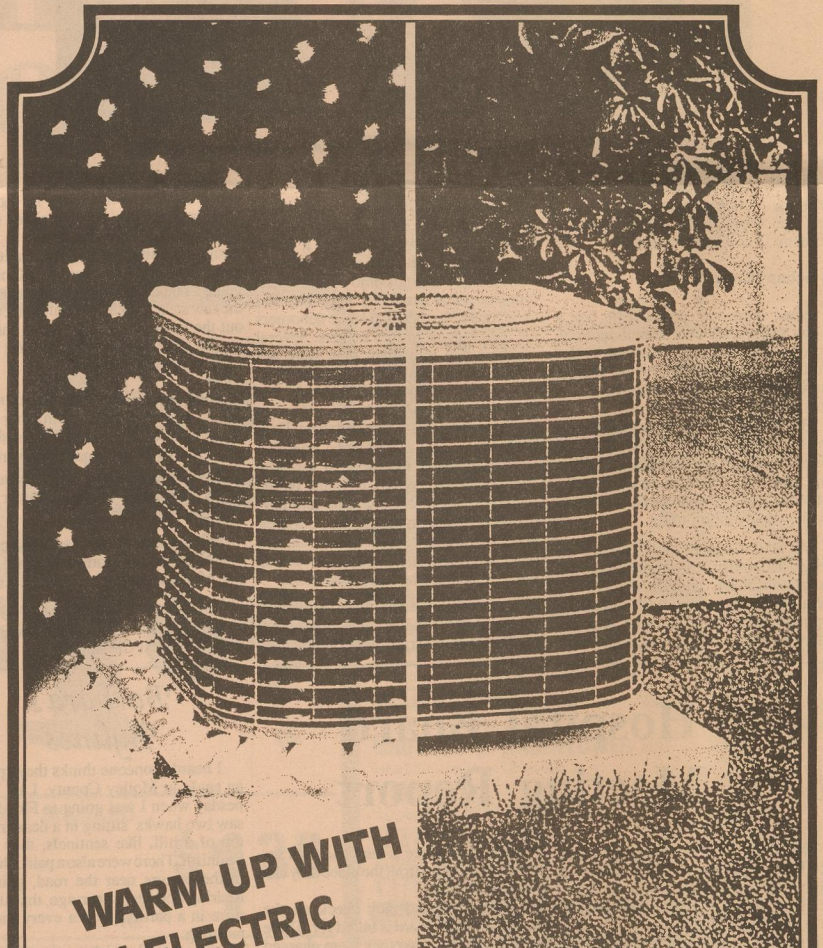
