





The baptismal font, of olid marble incised with an an-cient Egyptian hieroglyph for vater, is placed near the door of the church.

The artistry within the church shows a decided Egyptian origin. All of the wall surface is covered with intricate geometrical design and many details of beautiful workmanship. There are inscriptions in Greek, Araic and Koofic script used a part of this decoration. Some of the portraits of Saints, used as cons, seem to have been influenced directly by the almond eyes and stylized posture of the wall paintings of Ancient Egypt
