**Voters Veto Extra Senate Membership**

VOTERS in Motley County Tuesday vetoed the plan to enlarge the State Senate from 31 to 39 members, in an election for which only about one out of five qualified voters troubled to go to the polls. The total vote in the county was only 221, with 167 against and 54 for. Not a single absentee vote was cast.

Only four counties in West Texas, however, voted against the amendment (Motley, Howard, King and Midland). The Lubbock Avalanche said yesterday that 29 counties in the area voted 8,027 for and 4,003 against.

West Texas "did not cut much ice" vote-wise in the election. Big city voters defeated the issue. Harris County voted 4-1 against, Dallas better than 3-1, Tarrant 3-1 and Bexar better than 7-1, Travis 2-1, Brazoria 5-1.

The Senate will remain at 31 members. At least seven present senators, should they seek office again, will be defeated, because 13 districts were combined into 6 in the redistricting for 31 members. No special session of the legislature will be necessary to draw new district lines for the Senate.

**Now County Voted**  
 Whiteflat, with 15 voting, was the only Motley County box out of five which favored the amendment. Nine voted for and six against. Here in Matador the vote was 27 for and 88 against. The opposition was much stronger at Roaring Springs with only five voting for and 39 against. Flomot voted 10 for and 24 against, while Northfield had three favor the issue and ten against.

While the vote in Motley County was small, it was much greater percentage-wise than Lubbock County with a potential 22,000 voters, only 1,729 voted.

**Matadors To Meet Dragons In Opener**

IT IS THAT TIME AGAIN and the Matador Matadors will open their 1965 season here on Burleson Field at 8 p.m. Friday when they meet the Class A Paducah Dragons. The Matadors are being directed by two new coaches, Willborn Myers and Earl Byerley. Supporters of the Matadors are making a concentrated effort to bring as many fans as possible to the field in support of the home team.

Details on the Paducah Dragons are sketchy since this is their first game of the season, and with a new coach, and no scouting reports are available.

Coach Myers is undecided about the starting lineup because of the fierce competition among players for the positions. Ronnie Cox, Captain, Larry Byrnum, John Thomas, Luis Moore, Charles Meador and John Barnhill, the returning letterman are expected to fill some of the spots.

Enthusiasm is high among students and the opener game is shaping up as a hard fought, leather popping, four-quarter thriller.

TWO NEW COACHES who became members of the Matador Lions Club at the regular luncheon meeting held Tuesday in the basement of the First Methodist Church, gave the membership an outline of the 1965 football season which opens here Friday night between the Matador Matadors and Class A Paducah Dragons.

"Our problem is inexperience, in many vital positions of the Matadors Club" head coach Willborn Myers told the Lions, "yet in my years of coaching I have never found a harder working bunch of boys... we hope, before the end of the season to turn out a club of which you Lions will be proud but we are going to make mistakes... in this we hope you will not criticize the boys... they will be trying and they need your support."

**Oil Brings \$139,000 in Royalty Pay**

Motley County's producers and royalty owners are marketing some \$1.1 million in crude oil and natural gas a year, according to statistics released by Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association this week.

Ranking 160th among Texas oil and gas producing counties, Motley County in 1963 received some \$1.1 million from well-head sales of oil and an estimated \$900 from natural gas. County production of oil was approximately 374,000 barrels; natural gas, 7 million cubic feet.

Farmers, ranchers and other mineral owners share in a \$139,000 distribution of oil and gas royalty payments annually.

The Association based its annual study of this county's oil and gas output on statistics compiled by the U. S. Bureau of Mines for 1963. Production data for 1964 would be approximately the same.

Statewide, Texas oil and gas wells produced an estimated \$3.6 billion in income, \$2.9 billion from oil, 730 million from gas.

An important indicator of activity is the amount expended on drilling of wildcat wells seeking new fields and those wells drilled to develop fields already located. The Association estimates that in 1964 approximately \$150,000 was risked by Texas oil and gas operators on drilling ventures in Motley County. According to the Oil and Gas Journal two wells were drilled, a total of 11,000 feet of hole, both dry holes.

In addition to local school and county property taxes by oil and gas operators, taxes on production from Motley County flowed into the State Treasury at the rate of about \$51,000 a year.

Jack Haley of McLean was best man, and ushers were Joe Martin and Melvin Martin, brothers of the bride, and both of Lubbock.

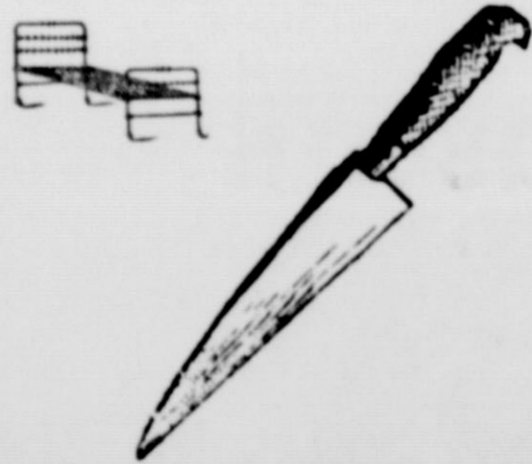
Miss Judy Gwinn, pianist, played wedding music and the traditional wedding marches.

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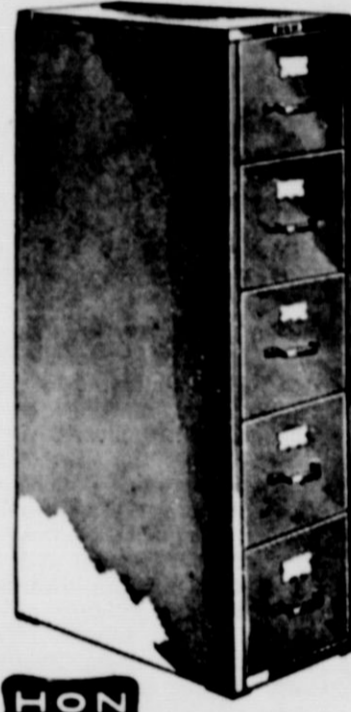

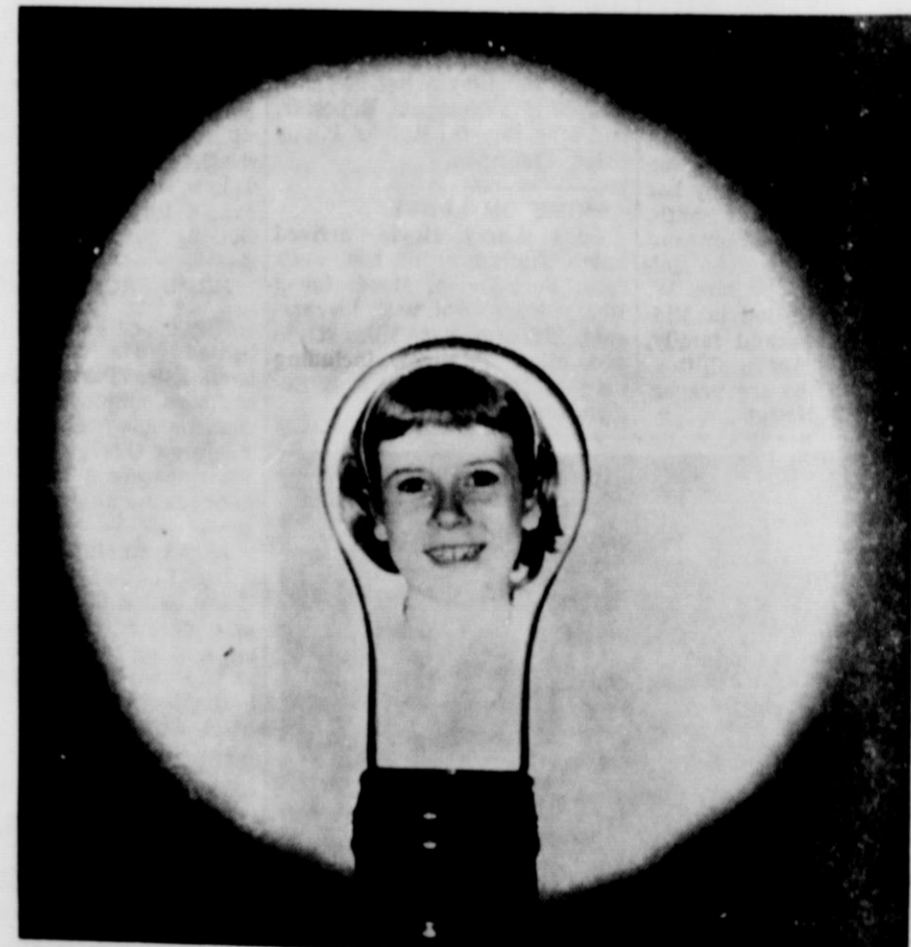

### NOTICE

The Matador Board of Education has adopted a unitary system beginning with the 1965-66 school year. All pupils residing in the district will be assigned to the Matador Public Schools, grades 1-12. The colored school was closed May 15, 1965.

This system will not accept non-resident students, nor will it make arrangements for resident students to attend schools in other school systems where this would tend to preserve segregation or minimize desegregation. Any arrangement made for non-resident students to attend schools in this system, or for resident students to attend schools in another system, will assure that such students will be assigned without regard to race, color, or national origin, and such arrangement will be explained fully in an attachment made a part of this plan. Pupils transferring out of the district will not be furnished tuition or transportation.

Transportation will be provided on an equal basis without segregation or other discrimination because of race, color, or national origin. The right to attend any school in the system will not be restricted by transportation policies or practices. To the maximum extent feasible, busses will be routed so as to serve each pupil choosing any school in the system. In any event every student eligible for

bussing shall be transported to the school of his choice if he chooses either the formerly white or the formerly Negro school nearest his residence.

There shall be no discrimination based on race, color, or national origin with respect to any services, facilities, activities and programs sponsored by or affiliated with the schools of this school system.

Teachers and staff desegregation is a necessary part of school desegregation. Steps shall be taken beginning with school year 1965-66 toward elimination of segregation of teaching and staff personnel based on race, color, or national origin, including joint faculty meetings, in-service programs, workshops, other professional meetings and other steps as set forth in Attachment C.

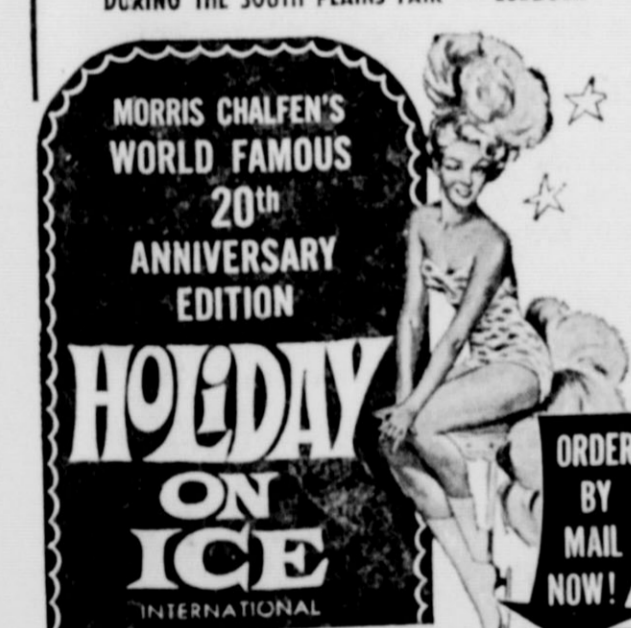
The race, color, or national origin of pupils will not be a factor in the initial assignment to a particular school or within a school of teachers, administrators or other employees who serve pupils, beginning in 1965-66.

This school system will not demote or refuse to re-employ principals, teachers and other staff members who serve pupils, on the basis of race, color, or national origin; this includes any demotion or failure to re-employ staff members because of actual or expected loss of enrollment in a school.

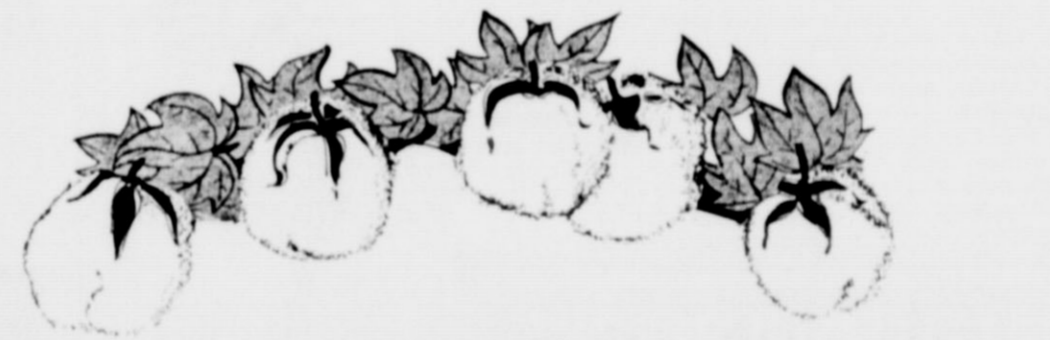

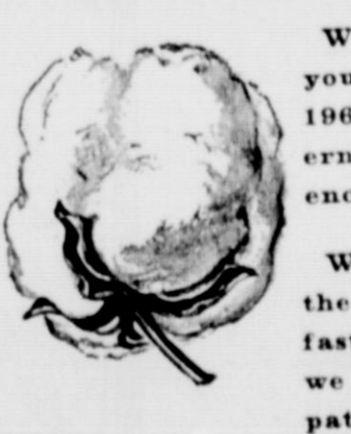

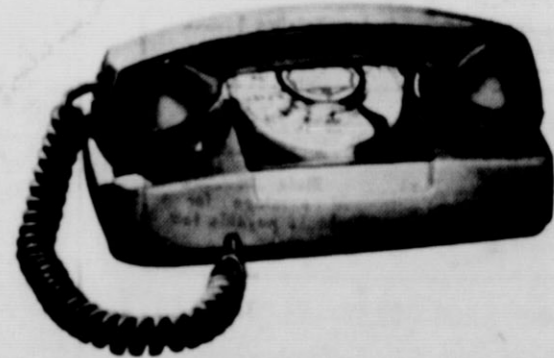

**COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:**

**FINAL REMINDER:** Farmers and ranchers who haven't filed their claim for the Federal Gasoline tax refund are reminded that the deadline for making claims is Sept. 30.

Applications of 16 oz. of technical Malathion per acre on cotton included in the diapause boll weevil control program started Tuesday, Sept. 7th. This year the area is broken into six units located around Spur, Dickens and Matador.

Plans call for three to seven applications, depending on the time of frost, defoliation or destruction of stalks. Twenty four planes will be active, applying insecticide in 100 ft swaths. Every field in the 4,000 square mile area is charted on maps large enough to calibrate acreage as a means to provide adequate coverage for the control area.

Ray Moritz, assistant district supervisor with USDA Plant Pest Control Division is in charge of the program. Planes will be equipped with radio, and in case fields are missed or

other discrepancies occur, please notify someone connected with the program so the faults can be corrected.

For beautiful fall rose blooms, it is necessary to give the plants a little extra care during the fall. Check the mulch applied in the Spring and see if it is still an inch or two thick. Water thoroughly every ten days to soak the soil to a depth of 8 to 10 in. (Frequent waterings encourage a shallow root system.)

Dews will encourage blackspot, containing maneb or folpet every 10 to 14 days, continuing until the first frost.

This is also a good time of the year to tab plants that need to be replaced. Next year it will be easy to spot these plants at time of planting.

If petunias have become leggy and unkept, give them a severe pruning to rejuvenate them. This cutting back will encourage new basal shoots which will flower and produce a new display of fall color. The productive life can be prolonged by proper watering. Soak ground to a depth of 6 to 8 inches by watering about once a week. Annuals require more water than grass or woody plants and may suffer from lack of water before it is noticed.

The USDA reports that fish and wildlife have suffered no apparent harm from the diapause boll weevil control program. The first year of a three year study was conducted by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Service and Texas Tech. with both caged and resident species of fish, bobwhite quail, waterfowl and songbirds examined for malathion effects. No adverse effects were noted on any of the specimens examined.

In addition to the adverse effects on wildlife, results also revealed that although late season treatments depressed populations of beneficial insects in the cotton fields, the effect was not considered significant.

No other pesticide other than Malathion is presently registered with USDA for use in low volume spraying of this type and no other pesticide should be applied in this manner because of potential hazards.

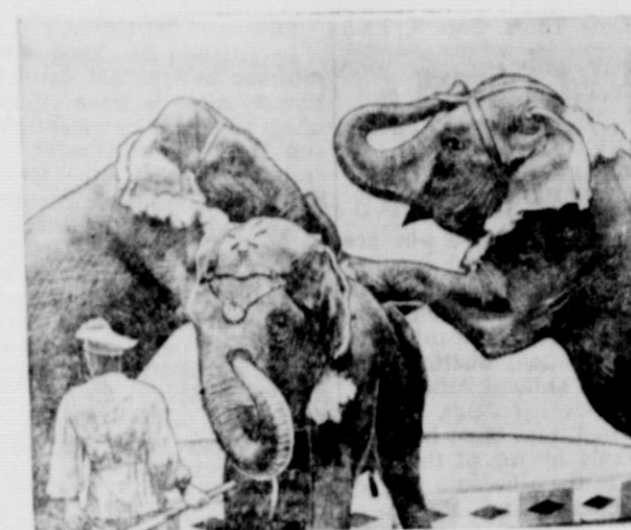
