Some Whiteflat Recollections

NOTE: This article was sent to Earlyne Jameson by Jolene Higginbotham when she and her husband, Vernon, sent their donations for the Whiteflat Historical Marker. It will renew many memories for those attending the Whiteflat Homecoming, Saturday, April 6. The Whiteflat Historical Marker Dedication will be at 2 p.m. Friday, May 24.

I remember --

Whiteflat community "brim-full" of happy, optimistic folks, raising their families, taking care of their businesses and farming and interests during the hard times of the Depression. They had great faith and hope for a far brighter future which sustained them and kept them going during those trying but offentimes happy. during those trying but oftentimes happy

years in spite of many hardships.

The Whiteflat gin's old pump-pumping engine which could be heard for miles, it seemed; and cotton lint stuck to everything like frost during ginning season in the fall and winter months.

Mr. W.E. Humphries with his spark-ling blue eyes behind round wire-rimmed glasses as he worked in his little store. Preston Spray's garage where he and our dad loved to "kid" and "cut-up" while Peg overhauled our old "Chevys" one more time. Arnold Wallace's service one more time. Among wanades sectives station and garage; years later Amold loved to tell about the time Arlene (our mother) and Viva Humphries Wallace (his wife) decided to have ice cream on a Sunday afternoon. But they had to milk the cow beforehand. So Joe Bloodworth the cow beforenand. So Joe Bloodworth and Arnold Wallace went out and found a cow and milked enough milk for ice cream. They later learned that the cow had been "dry" for some time!

Visiting Whiteflat School (where, it seemed to me "all the action was") in

Miss Sallie Rattan's first-grade class, where I was always welcome, the year before I started to school at almost seven years of age. There was no kindergarten, of course, and how I longed to go to school - it still seems the longest year of my life. So I would visit at the school often while my "Old Red" dog waited outside the door of the school.

Attending Sunday School and church every Sunday at the little Methodist Church across from the school yard . Preacher Jameson's (father of Malcolm, Bob and Ed) wonderful, long prayers in his deep, rich, resonant voice. When he rayed, it seemed that time stood still.

Singing conventions on Sunday afternoons at the Baptist Church, across the road and west from the Methodist Church. ater we attended two Sundays at the Methodist church and two at the Baptist. Oftentimes there would be "dinner-on-the ground" after church on Sunday mornings - everyone would bring enough

food for his own family and to share with others. Mrs. Harris (Scott Robbins' mother) was my first Sunday School teacher and Mrs. Tom Tilson my second one. One time Mrs. Tilson's father, elderly Brother Butterfield, a Methodist minister and missionary to the Oklahoma Indians, brought some of his converts and their artifacts to the Whiteflat Methodist Church. They sang hymns for the congre-Church. They sang hymns for the congregation in their native tongue.

When I was a little older I remember what a busy place Mr. Acker's grocery store was. I never saw Mr. Acker sit down even for aminute. Grady, his son, helped his dad in the store. The farmers would gather around the old wood or coal stove at the back of the store and talk about the price of cotton and solve all the governments' problems, or so it seemed.

married Grady Acker) came to our house near Whiteflat Gins during the black dust-bowl days of the 1930's. She was aghast at all the black dirt which she said had covered everything in their house; it was so bad they had to cover their food on the table before eating.

Going home after church with Rose-

mary, my sister, to visit and eat Sunday "dinner" (what we called our mid-day meal) with Dorothy Jean and Mary Frances (Casey Dixon). That was when they lived beyond Four Corners - across the road and north quite a distance and up on a bill 1 ster they moved in a bouse on

they need beyond Four Comers - across the road and north quite a distance and up on a hill. Later they moved in a house on the highway in Whiteflat where my sister and I had many good times. The Casey family loved music and would always ask me to play the piano for them. Mr. F.M. Casey and Mr. L.A. Carlisle's singing duets at the Whiteflat Baptist Church were incomparable - showing a great love of singing and their Lord.

The fall of the year, after all the cotton was ginned, Daddy would invite the community to the gin-yard for roast pig, prepared to perfection by Mr. Tom Hamilton who was bookkeeper (after our mother) at the gins. He would dig a fairly deep hole in the ground just south of the scales at the little gin office, place the whole pig over hot coals for twenty-four hours after covering it over with dirt. The pork was unusually good cooked in this fashion. Everyone seemed to have a wonderful time eating and visiting after crops were "laid by". wonderful time eating and visiting after

One year Daddy's hogs were plagued with lice; Daddy bought some goats from Arthur Lynch to "keep down" the hogs' lice. There were eight or ten head of these

goats which stayed in the pigpen just east of our back door. I loved looking at those goats' big, staring eyes and mocking their sheep-like "baaa". Of course, they would stop and listen intently and look straight at me as I tried to sound exactly like one of them! I learned early to entertain my-self since there were no children next door. Somehow, I don't ever remember being bored or lonely as there was always something interesting to do. And too, I loved the great outdoors.

There was a big dappled gray stallion on our farm; he was the off-spring of the "Old Gray Mare" that had been there ever onto hay Mate infantation been interested ince I can remember. She had given birth and mothered many fine colts. Daddy had thought for some time about "braking" "Major" the stallion. I remember clearly the day Daddy and the Terry men who worked for him harnessing Major (for the first time) with his mother to a vagron and roung across the south field to

wagon and going across the south field to "break" Major.
One of those goats got into trouble with the Old Gray Mare; Dad turned the goats into the pasture with the mare, who had a new colt. I saw something I had newer seen before or since The mare took never seen before or since. The mare took never seen before or since. I he mare took one of the goats by the nap of the neck and shook it "for all it was worth". I was a rather small girl and terrified by what I saw and screamed so loud Mrs. Terry said she heard me all the way to their house in the north section of the south

I remember being a very happy little girl with all the interesting activity around us. The people, to me, were wonderful then and even more wonderful now that I see them through the eyes of my adult years. They endured many hardships but were happy and productive they then the control of th were happy and productive; they thought of their neighbors as-well-as themselves. I consider myself most fortunate and am evr thankful for having come from such people and their community.

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company "Southwestern Bell") submitted an application on January 4, 1991 to the Public Utility Commission of Texas ("Commission") requesting that the central office-based PBX/type service market be declared subject to significant competition pursuant to the Commission's Substantive Rule §23.27. If this proposal is approved, Southwestern Bell intends to provide service to this market segment via its PLEXAR-Custom service, which provides for contractual rates and charges to be based on an individual customer-

PLEXAR-Custom is a central office-based service which provides switched voice and/or data communications similar to a customer-premises PBX. PLEXAR-Custom service is currently being provided on an individual customer-specific basis via Southwestern Bell's Customer Specific Pricing Plan Tariff for central office-based telecommunications systems of 200 stations or more If Southwestern Bell's application is approved, the PLEXAR-Custom service tariff will be revised to also include central office-based telecommunications systems which require between 75 and 200 stations.

Centrex and Plexar-II services are currently priced according to a standard tariff regardless of the customer's geographic location in the state. If this application is approved, customers needing 75 to 200 stations will be able to obtain this service priced on an individual customerspecific basis rather than under a standard tariffed rate.

Southwestern Bell's application proposes that the service market for PBX/type systems of 75 stations up to 200 stations be declared subject to significant competition statewide in all of the exchange areas served by Southwestern Bell and in which the central office capability to provide the service exists and/or can readily be made available.





STAINS THAT CANNOT BE REMOVED

At one time or another, everyone has had a stain that defied removal. No matter what products were used or which methods were tried, the stain remained

stubbornly in the fabric.

Because of today's easy-care fibers and chemically active cleaning products, consumers sometimes forget that there are still some things than cannot be done.

One of the stains that cannot be repoyed is betzen provide an interdient.

moved is benzol peroxide, an ingredient of acne medicine that causes rusty, yel-lowish stains. These are bleached spots in the fabric. Benzol peroxide is difficult to rinse off the body because it is very insol-uble. To prevent visible damage when using products containing benzol peroxide, use white household textiles such as sheets and towels. White collars on gar-ments prevent discoloration to necklines. Cover chair arms with clear plastic or small white towels for everyday use to prevent damage to upholstery. Protect carpets by keeping a small sheet or blanket on hand to lie on.

Brown age spots on fabrics are another stain that cannot be removed. These others that cannot be removed.

other stain that cannot be removed. These are often caused by caramelized sugar from food stains that were left in the fabric when it was stored. Sugar from soft drinks and some other foods are invisible when fresh, but turn brown as they age. The best way to prevent them is to be sure that all fabrics are clean before they are

Often causes of age stains on fabrics are fumes from heating systems, usually found along fold lines, and discolrations caused by hair care products, perspiration or deodorants. These discolorations often do not show up for several weeks or months. Protect earners from sprays or months. Protect garments from sprays or drips of grooming products and launder them frequently to remove any acciden-

tal exposure. Refold textile products every four to six months if they will be stored for a long period of time.

A staining problem unique to carpets, even the new stain resistant ones, is hot food with a sauce. Almost every stain carpet he removed from stain resistant carpet. be removed from stain resistant carpet

The heat of the food melts the sauce into the fibers and the color actually becomes a part of the carpet. Use extra care when carrying such dishes as spaghetti sauce across the carpet to avoid this type of stain.

The most common non-removable stain is bleached spots. Bleached spots can be white, yellow, a lighter shade of any color or even a completely different color from the original fabric. Bleach spots can come from many different products including laundry bleach, tile cleaner, mildew remover, hair preparations and rust remover, to name a few. To prevent these stains, read and follow labels carefully.

If a product contains peroxide, hy-

If a product contains peroxide, hypochlorite or oxalic acid, be careful not to
spill or spray it on fabrics because it will
remove the color if the solution is strong

remove the color if the solution is strong enough. Always dilute liquid bleaches when adding them to laundry unless the machine has a bleach dispenser.

With some care and a little knowledge of today's chemicals, spots that cannot be removed can be avoided. Remember that for these stains, prevention is the best remedy.
