DEATH CAME AT TWILIGHT

Friday for James Quitman Carson, age 18 months, son of Mr. and Mrs. D. F. (Buddy) Carson of Matador when he was struck and killed by a car in front of his home here. The baby was killed before the horrified eyes of the mother who was attempting to reach him when he toddled into the car's path.

Charges of negligent homicide were filed Saturday by County Attorney Howard Tra-week against Clinton Carl Story, 18, Matador, following an investigation of the accident. Story was driving the car when the child was struck and killed.

Story was traveling west when the accident occurred at 7:45 p.m. and his speed was estimated by the sheriff's department at between 30 and 35 miles per hour. Speed limit in the residential area where the Carsons live is 25 miles per hour.

Services for the small boy were held Monday at 10 a.m. in the First Baptist Church with Rev. James Hancock, the pastor, officiating. Direction was by Seigler Funeral Home and burial was in Matador East Mound Cemetery.

The child was born Nov. 20, 1963 in Matador and died April 23 at the age of one year, five months and three days.

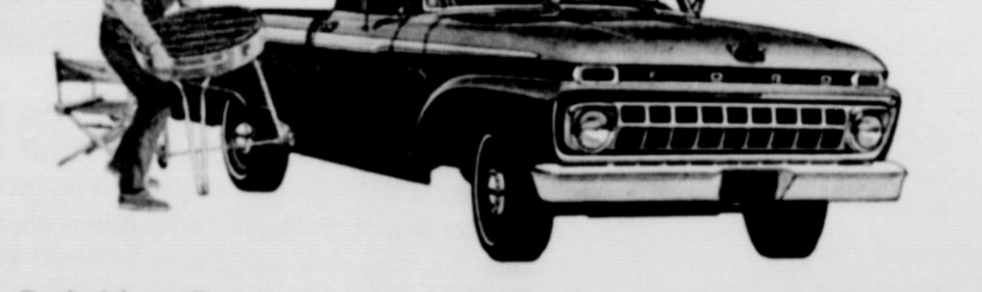

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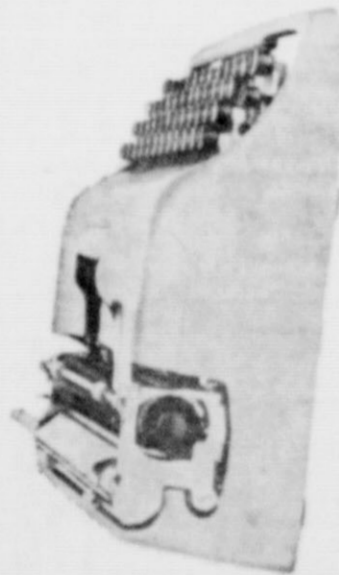
