ATTEND NORTHWEST TEXAS CONFERENCE

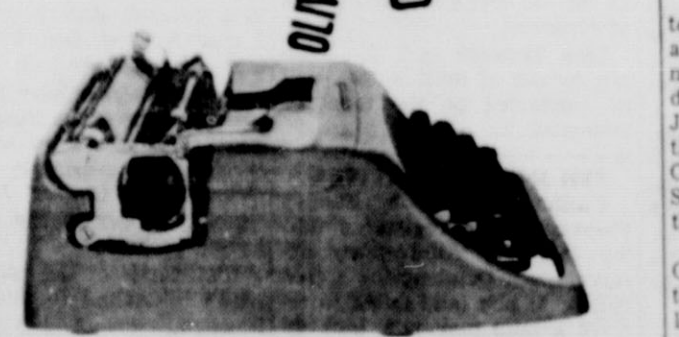

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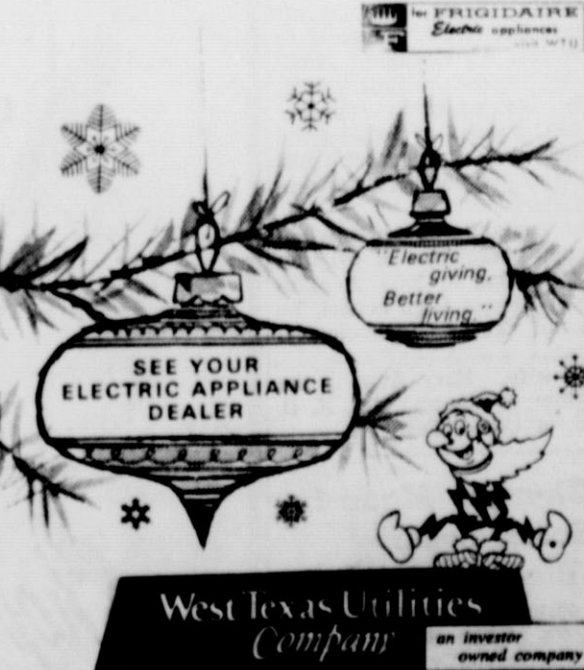
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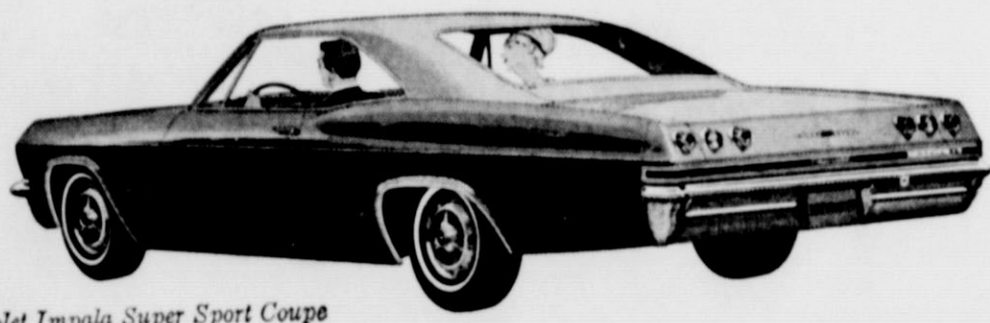

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COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:

Copies of the 1965 Farmers Guide have arrived. Many changes have been made in the Income Tax Law, and these are explained in the publication. It includes claims for Federal Gas Tax Refund, and Social Security information. This publication is available for the asking.

What Causes Color in Cotton? is a question often asked. The answer is composed of three factors - color, leaf and preparation. Weather is the chief factor affecting color, with adverse weather conditions producing color variations.

Freezing weather produces damage to immature cotton. With the stage of maturity that the bolls are in at the time the freeze usually determines the degree of discoloration of the lint. Open cotton that is in the fields exposed to the weather loses its "bloom" and may become dark and dull in color, therefore lower in grade. As the color becomes duller and darker, the cotton may then fall into the light gray and gray categories.

Besides the weather, insects and diseases contribute largely to discoloration. Each year enormous losses are experienced by farmers because of these problems. With the increase of stripper harvest, grades are also reduced in grade because of grass and bark. Proper operation of the stripper will help reduce this problem, as it is very difficult to remove these stems at the gin even with the best equipment.

Other factors that reduce grade are gathering cotton that is too wet, and trying to tramp too much cotton onto a trailer. These factors are easy to correct. After spending money and time to produce a crop, why not gather in a manner to allow for top returns.

The diapause boll weevil control program for 1964 is complete with the last spraying

on Nov. 23. Final evaluation can't be made until 1965, but intensive field checks have revealed up to 90% reduction of the weevil population in sprayed areas. Movement to the west was also stopped when the spray program started. A total of 1,136,676 acres were sprayed, with some areas receiving five to six treatments. The entire zone, 300,000 acres received four applications, as for the 2nd straight year, the area just below the caprock had the heaviest infestations in the Cotton Belt.

Livestock owners should be on the alert for the annual invasion of lice on their animals. These pests will reduce profits unless effective control measures are taken. MP-691, Tex. Guide for Controlling External Parasites of Livestock & Poultry is available for the asking, and the publication deals with controls of flies, lice, mites, ticks, fleas and cattle grubs on beef animals, sheep, swine, horses and poultry.

Save With Suspension Fencing is the title of a new leaflet now available. The leaflet tells how suspension fencing can cut fence costs in half and describes construction.

Suspension fences are similar to other types of fences except distance between posts is about 100 ft. Such fences work well for boundary, interior and crossfences. Another advantage of suspension fencing is its swaying action. This keeps cattle from becoming mixed between pastures and discourages fighting bulls. Also the fence is easy to repair should a section be torn down.

Ask for L-637, which are now available.

Operation of the "back-tag" method for testing market cattle for brucellosis has been aided by the cooperation of sale rings over the country. If 15% of the cattle in the county are tagged and tested, on the ranch testing is not required each three years for the county

to maintain its brucellosis free certification. As Motley County was tested this year, another test won't be required until 1967, but if enough animals are tested through the "back-tag" method, this test will be eliminated. Four of the seven Auction Sales operating in this area are currently cooperating, so for those interested in finding out how the program works, stop by, and I will give you all the information, along with tags and other equipment you will need.

If you want to use the sprayer or duster next year, how about following the following steps which will reduce troubles you may encounter. All pesticide materials should be removed from equipment by washing or by other means, and moving parts should be lubricated. Some parts will need to be disassembled for proper cleaning. Soak nozzles and strainers in kerosene, running a wire through the spray rods and rinse the hoses, putting away where they will not crack or freeze.

Put some oil in the tank, filling with water and start the pump. This will apply a thin coating of oil on the inside of the pump, valves and circulating system, and when all of this mixture is removed, the rust problem should be solved.

Give dusters a thorough cleaning also, as material left in the duster will cause clogging, caking and eventual corrosion. Give all slip joints a protective covering. Operators manuals will give instructions on the proper care of the piece of equipment, and as in all other instances, "when all else fails, try following the instructions."

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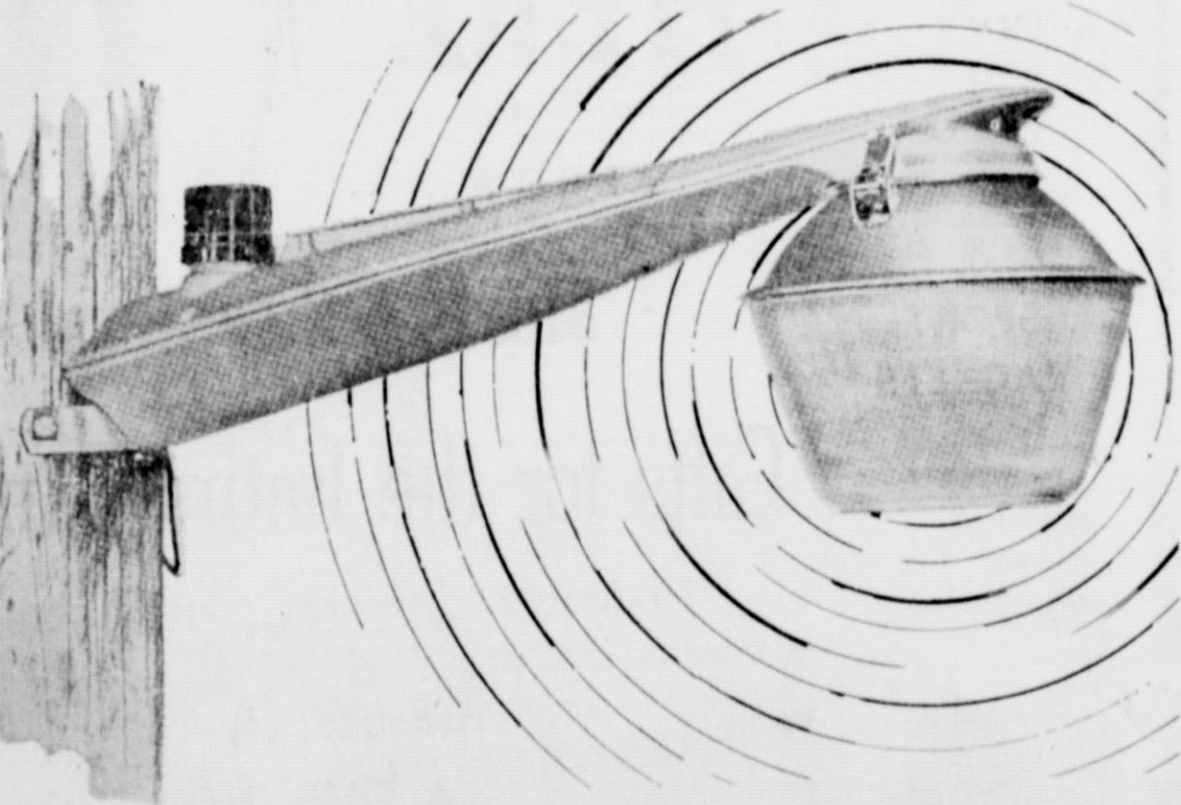

Modern Cities, Beaches Of Beirut Are Popular Tourist Attractions

Editors Note: This is the third in a series of articles by Mrs. Willett describing a world tour which she made early this year. Because it offers vacationers and tourists a program of varied entertainment, the beautiful Mediterranean with its wonderful beaches, snow skiing on the nearby high mountains, the accommodations of modern cities, an abundance of wild and cultivated flowers and blooming trees, crystal clear rivers and the Cedars of Lebanon, Beirut has become a popular resort.

The large American University of Beirut has an Agriculture Department which, through its experiment farms, has helped the progress of agriculture.

About 2000 B.C. or, who can say—maybe centuries earlier—the Phoenicians who invented the alphabet lived on the coast of the Mediterranean in the country now called Lebanon. The excavated ruins of ancient Byblos, a cultural and religious center since the dawn of time, show the remains of the buildings where there have been eight layers of cities in one spot, each, we are told, having been destroyed by earthquakes. Fabulously interesting is the small area where unearthed monuments of four civilizations—Phoenician, Roman, Crusader and Twentieth Century stood side by side. I have a good picture of this important site.

Another major attraction in Lebanon is the group of ancient Roman ruins at Baalbek, 35 miles from Beirut.

Upon entering the sacred enclosures we were struck by the immensity of the temples, combined with the beauty of their proportions and grandeur, and the impressions of a by-gone age these convey.

Still standing are six original 54 imposing columns which surrounded the Temple of Jupiter. These columns are ninety feet high and seven feet in diameter.

This memorable spot is of such magnitude that every summer an International Festival of Music, Folk Dancing, Drama and Folklore is held on the many magnificent steps and under the archways, with the fawn-colored remnants of by-gone glory as backdrops.

Viewing the splendors of long-ago and far-away Byblos and Baalbek filled me with an indescribable feeling of awe, admiration and respect for the skill, knowledge and industry of the architects and builders of antiquity. Did they have techniques beyond our awareness?

We traveled through the beautiful valley of Be'ca over a winding road between rocky, dry mountains, past snow-capped Mt. Hermon, and caught a long distance look at the tomb of Abel, son of Adam and Eve, to Syria, the fantastically old land of Biblical fame.

Damascus, the oldest continuously occupied city in the world, which dates back 6000 years was our headquarters while in Syria.

Since 1946—a vast change in progress has taken place in Damascus, as in all Arabian countries. An onrush of the building of homes, government buildings, fine apartment houses, etc., has surged up the cactus covered sandy hills. There is, what our guide called, a "Snob Hill."

Throughout our journey visiting museums, which exhibited the cultural and historical advances of the countries, was an eagerly anticipated pleasure. The museum at Damascus was indeed interesting in that it contained relics of early Bible times, including a book written by the Psalmist, David and taken from his tomb.

In this very large museum, the Syrian Room with its mosaic walls, oriental rugs, art from all over the world and fountain in the center was outstandingly gorgeous and elegant.

We visited the spot where Saul had his vision. We went to the home (now underground)
