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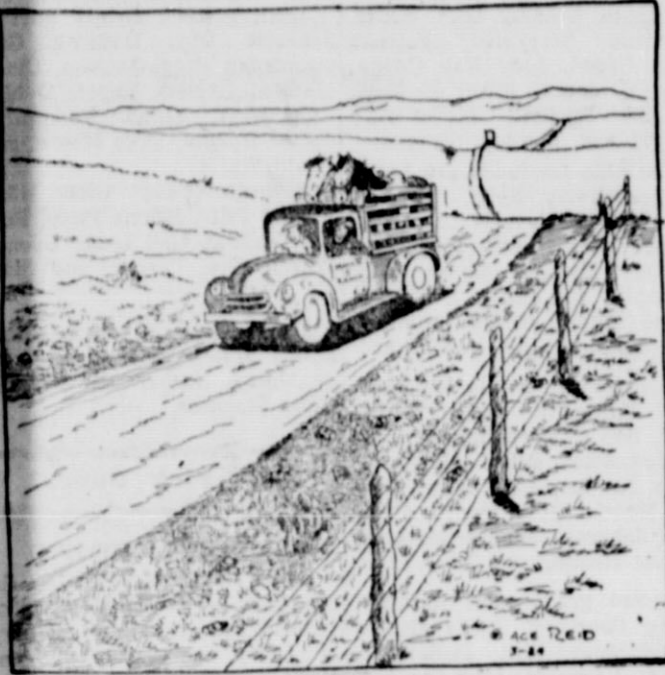

Do you ever wonder how you score as manager? Why not give yourself the following test and see how you rate.

3. Did you make any change in protein level of your feed mixture during the past year?

4. If yes, why did you make these changes?

5. What information do you use in deciding when to market your livestock?

6. What was the last big piece of harvesting equipment you bought?

7. What made you decide that you needed a machine of this kind?

8. About how many acres do you think justifies owning the machine you bought?

9. For what reasons do you think this is the acreage that will make it pay to own this machine?

10. If you had to hire a custom operator for this work, what would it cost per acre?

11. If you were going to figure out what it costs you per year to own and operate the machine you bought, what costs would you consider?

12. Did you figure out on paper the annual cost of owning and operating the machine you bought?

13. Have you ever figured out your total machinery investment per acre?

14. Farm families have many things they want to accomplish. What are some of the things you want to get done, for the family and the business in the next 4 or 5 years?

Results obtained from the cotton variety test that was carried out by Frank Montgomery probably can't be used as a guide, as the hail on Aug. 30th damaged the varieties on the north part of the plot more than those in the middle and south part. Only 4.60" of moisture was received prior to the hail. The 4 acre tracts were fertilized with 70 lbs. of anhydrous ammonia per acre, planted on June 18, and mechanically harvested on Nov. 25th. Seed were furnished by the breeders, and complete information on the test can be obtained from ginners, seed dealers, or myself. In order of net return per acre, the results were as follows: Paymaster III, Lockett 88A, Rilcot 90, DeKalb 302, Lankart 57, Parrott, Western Stormproof, Antone 99 and Qualla 10.

Results in previous tests were as follows: 1961, Western Stormproof, Parrott, Lankart 57, Lockett 88A, Lockett Blightmaster, Rex, Gregg, Paymaster 8890 and Northern Star 5, 1962, Western Stormproof, Qualla 10, Perfection Stormproof, Lockett Blightmaster, Lockett 4789, Lankart 57, Northern Star 5, Parrott and Lankart 611, 1963, Parrott, Lankart 57, Western Stormproof, DeKalb 302, Antone 99, Paymaster 101A, Qualla 10, Rilcot 90 and Lockett 88A.

To complete the 5 year test, the final variety plots will be planted in 1965.

Farmers who store their cottonseed for planting should check bins for insects. Corn weevils, lesser grain borers,

granary weevils and Angoumois grain moths occasionally infest stored cottonseed, especially if seed are cracked or stored in infested bins.

Cottonseed should be stored only in bins that have been thoroughly cleaned of waste trash or feed sacks. It is a good practice to sweep the ceiling and walls and clean the floor to remove hidden waste. Cracks should be covered to prevent seed from collecting, and waste grain, seed and other materials beneath or near the bins should be destroyed. After the bins have been cleaned, spray the inside surfaces with a 2½% solution of either methoxychlor or premium grade malathion. Toxaphene, DDT or malathion dusts can be mixed with the seed at a rate of two ounces per bushel.

Treated seed should never be crushed or used for feed.

★  
The 1965 outlook for beef production shows a likely increase of two or three percent over the past year. The number of cattle and calves on Jan. 1 will be up slightly from last January's report of 106.3 million head", reports John McFaney,

Extension Economist. "This growth was slowed by an increase in slaughter and a decrease in live animal imports. A large part of the overall gain will be in calves from last year's calf crop."

Marketing of fed cattle in the first half of '65 will depend largely on the number placed on feed this winter. Large numbers of calves are available for feeding and if profitable feeding margins persist, placements in the first quarter of the coming year may be large again. "Fed cattle prices should hold near current levels into early 1965." However, large increases in fed cattle marketings later in the winter may push these prices down. Stocker and feeder shipments into the Corn Belt States were up 17% in July and August and 21% in Sept. from a year earlier. Many of these cattle did not go directly into feedlots but to stalk fields. Some will be put on feed as soon as cleanup operations are completed.

★  
Since feeder cattle are plentiful, their prices will continue under pressure in early '65. The demand for stockers has

also been less, since wheat pastures in some areas of the US have been developing slowly.
