FFA Delegates At State Meet

Four members of the Matador Future Farmers of America Chapter are in Houston this week attending the State FFA Convention which opened Wednesday and will continue through Friday. The three day meeting of representatives of over 900 FFA chapters throughout the state will include the awarding of advanced degrees, scholarships and awards to outstanding members of the organization.

Members of the Matador Chapter attending are Larry Bynum, Charles Meador, Joey Meador and Dick Moss. They were accompanied by Bill Moss, Vocational Agriculture teacher. Also attending the convention from Motley County is B. L. Peacock, Voc-ag teacher at Roaring Springs.

Principal speakers for the meeting will include the Hon. Preston Smith, Lt. Governor of Texas and Kenneth Kennedy of Cadiz, Kentucky, President of the National Organization of the FFA.

Among the important business to be transacted at the convention will be the election of a state president from the ten state officer nominees, election of voting delegates to the National FFA Convention in Kansas City in October, election of the sweetheart and selection of the top talent team in the state.

The highest award of the Texas Association of Future Farmers of America, the Lone Star Farmer Degree, will be presented to 785 members of the 41,156 member organization. In addition, the membership will confer Honorary Degrees on adults who have contributed in an outstanding way to the accomplishments of the organization.

Ground Broken For New ME Parsonage

A CEREMONY shortly before noon here Sunday across Dundee Street immediately north of the First Methodist Church, culminated a cherished dream of the Methodist congregation.

It was the ground-breaking ceremonies for a new parsonage at which Dr. J. E. Shewbert, district Superintendent of Plainview, lifted the first spade of dirt. Others lifting a spade of dirt were Rev. W. F. Gaede, pastor, and members of the building committee, including C. T. Jenkins, Homer T. Jenkins, W. D. Lipscomb and Mesdames Melvin, Meason, W. N. Pipkin and Furman Vinson.

Also lifting a spade of soil with the golden (painted) spade was Mrs. C. D. Pipkin, the former Ida Edmondson, only surviving charter member of the First Methodist Church of Matador.

She was in the group that organized the church under some cottonwood trees on Ballard Creek in 1892. At the time she was a girl of 13.

Youngest christened member of the church present was Nancy Jane Cooper, 5-months old baby daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. B. Cooper, christened two months ago.

Following the ground-breaking ceremonies, a basket lunch was served in the church basement.

Rev. Shewbert held quarterly conference at the church during the afternoon.

The parsonage, which has been subscribed almost entirely in cash in advance, will be constructed in Lubbock and moved to the site.

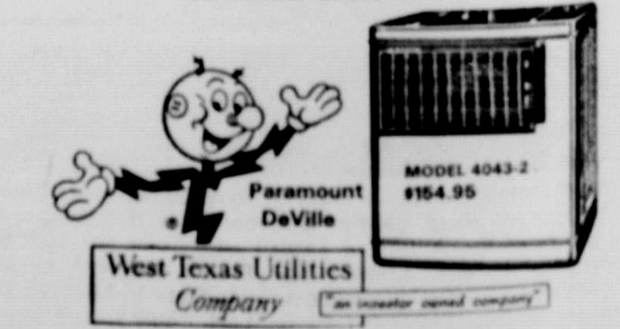

THE STATE OF TEXAS

ON THIS, the 1st day of July, 1965, the County Commissioners' Court of MOTLEY COUNTY, Texas, convened in special session at the regular meeting place thereof at the Courthouse in Matador, Texas, the following

being present, and with none absent; and among other proceedings had by said Court were the following:

WHEREAS, under the provisions of Section 2 of H. B. 227, Acts of the 59th Legislature, Regular Session, this Commissioners' Court is empowered to initiate the election for the creation of the MOTLEY COUNTY HOSPITAL DISTRICT, and it is the opinion and judgment of this Court that said election should be ordered, therefore,

BE IT ORDERED BY THE COMMISSIONERS' COURT OF MOTLEY COUNTY, TEXAS:

THAT an election be held in said County on the 7th day of August, 1965, which date is not less than thirty (30) nor more than sixty (60) days from the date of the adoption of this order, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted, to the resident qualified property tax-paying electors for their action thereupon:

"SHALL a Hospital District, with boundaries identical with those of Motley County, Texas, be created and established with the authority to levy annual taxes at a rate not to exceed SEVENTY FIVE CENTS (75c) on the one hundred dollars valuation of taxable property within such District for the purpose of meeting the requirements of the District's bonds and its maintenance and operating expenses?"

THE SAID election shall be held under the provisions of the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, particularly Section 9 of Article IX of the Constitution, and H. B. 227, Acts of the 59th Legislature, Regular Session 1965, and all persons who are resident qualified property tax-paying electors of said County (the area of the proposed District) shall be entitled to vote at said election.

IT IS further ordered that the ballots for said election shall be prepared in sufficient number and in conformity with Chapter 6, V.A.T.C.S., Election Code, as amended, and that printed upon such ballots shall appear the following:

"FOR THE CREATION OF THE MOTLEY COUNTY HOSPITAL DISTRICT, PROVIDING FOR THE LEVY OF A TAX NOT TO EXCEED

SEVENTY-FIVE CENTS (75c) ON THE ONE HUNDRED DOLLARS VALUATION USING MOTLEY COUNTY, TEXAS VALUES AND THE MOTLEY COUNTY, TEXAS TAX ROLL." "AGAINST THE CREATION OF THE MOTLEY COUNTY HOSPITAL DISTRICT, PROVIDING FOR THE LEVY OF A TAX NOT TO EXCEED SEVENTY FIVE CENTS (75c) ON THE ONE HUNDRED DOLLARS VALUATION USING MOTLEY COUNTY, TEXAS VALUES AND THE MOTLEY COUNTY, TEXAS TAX ROLL."

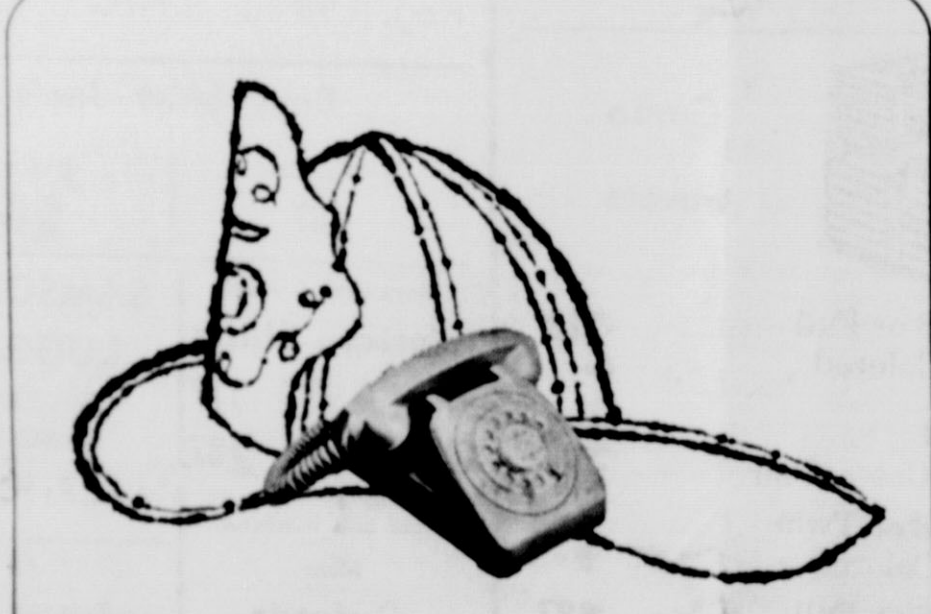

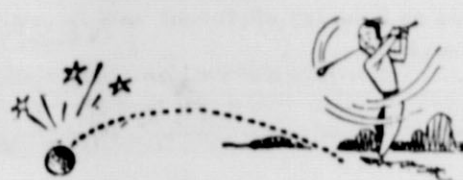
