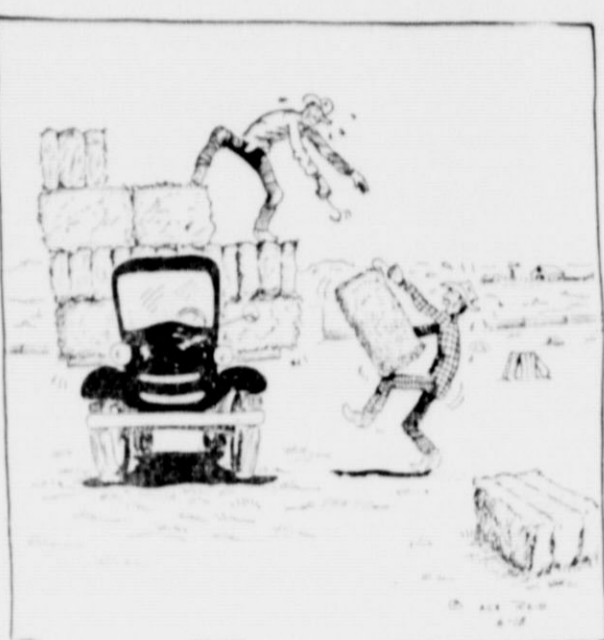
MIKE PEACOCK TAKES HONORS AT TWO FAIRS
