### Local Minister Preaches In Area Of Thirty Miles For Thirty Years

A minister who has spent almost thirty years preaching in a radius of thirty miles, is presently serving the Matador Church of Christ in a capacity for which he is well qualified.

He is H. L. (Leonard) Dennis, former minister here who returned about two and a half years ago to serve as resident minister. During the years between, he returned to act as interim minister, when the church was without a spiritual leader.

Mr. Dennis began preaching at the Church of Christ here sometime in 1936.

He and his wife moved here in 1931 from McAdoo, where they were married in January, 1928. Mrs. Dennis, the former Ouida McLaughlin, was born at McAdoo.

Mr. Dennis was employed at the Turner Grocery and later opened his own business and finally bought the former Bob's Foodway, which he operated until 1941, when he and his family moved back to McAdoo.

He preached there for nine years and later at Crosbyton for three years. He also supplied as minister at Roaring Springs for approximately three years. He supplied for the Matador church one year at one time and for two years at another time.

Born between Lawton and Marlow, Okla., (at that time still Indian Territory), Leonard Dennis moved with his parents, to Lamesa, Texas in 1907. The family moved to Seymour, and then to McAdoo.

Mr. and Mrs. Dennis have two sons, both of whom were born in Matador, and a daughter who was born after they returned to McAdoo. Jackie Wayne lives in Houston, and Ralph, a technician at White Sands, lives in Las Cruces, N. M. The daughter Mrs. Bill Phillips (Lyndell) lives in Midland. There are four Dennis grandchildren.

Mr. and Mrs. Dennis are home in the new, modern parsonage which the church constructed last fall. They are actively interested in the civic welfare of the community which is so much home to them. In addition to helping her husband in his ministerial duties, Mrs. Dennis is a member of the Matador Garden Club and the El Progreso Study Club.

### Recruiters Talk To Senior Class

Three servicemen from this area talked to the senior class March 10 about the relative merits of their respective branches of the service. One Army recruiter and two Navy representatives were present.

Sergeant Womack from Plainview spoke about the Army's advantages. He first emphasized the fact that each boy should register within five days of his eighteenth birthday and then he discussed the difference in the period of time spent in service when drafted and when a volunteer. He said a draftee serves two years of active duty then four years of reserve,

whereas the volunteer gets his choice of work and place as well as serving a three year stint. Sgt. Womack specifically discussed the Paratroopers, Air Defense, Mechanics, and the Air Craft divisions of the Army.

Chief Ruckhart and a Texas Tech senior, Jim Dixon, spoke on behalf of the Navy. They emphasized especially the free education furnished and the unlimited opportunities of Naval life. Ruckhart stated that the Navy had 66 basic schools of training which provide enough education so that only 30 hours of college work is necessary for a degree.

Ruckhart, as well as Womack, also told of the woman's possibilities in the armed services. They cited the dietetics field as one of unlimited possibilities.

Both men emphasized that all the seniors finish college as it is vitally important to a person's financial future.

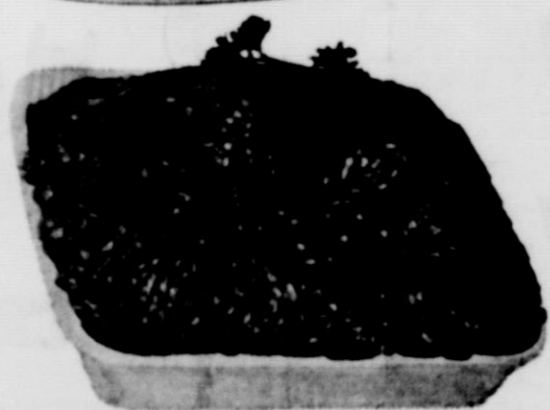

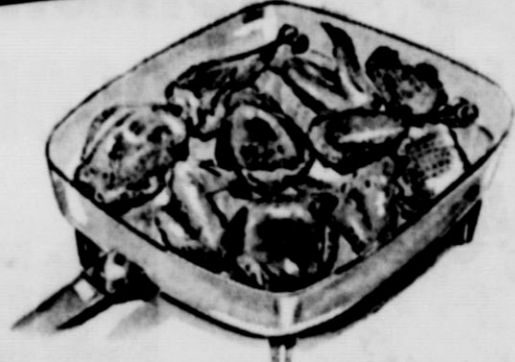
