Tommy Green of Matador, served as master of ceremonies, and Sharlene Berryman of Matador, introduced banquet speaker, John Leroy "Curly" Hays of Abilene, famous athlete and now employed in the public relations department of West Texas Utilities Co.

## Matadors Drive Steers in Corral

The Matadors began their defense of the district title Friday night with a respectable 22-0 victory over the Rochester Steers. An excellent defensive effort by the Matadors, shown by the fact that the deepest Rochester drive was to the Matador 28 yard line, coupled with an adequate offense provided the victory. The Matadors totaled 235 yards rushing and 49 passing, while Rochester had 107 yards rushing and none passing. Matador led in first downs, 16-8.

The first score came in the second quarter to climax an 84 yard drive by the Matadors. Charles Ezell danced down the sidelines on an end sweep for 13 yards and the score. Richard Campbell tallied the extra points. The second score of the game also came in the second period. Ezell unleashed a long pass to Tommie Green for 34 yards to the Rochester one yard line. Ezell sneaked over for the touchdown. The try for points failed and Matador led 14-0 at halftime.

The only touchdown in the second half came as a result of a 61 yard drive. Ezell scored again, this time on a 6 yard run. A pass from Ezell to Tim Green accounted for two additional points to make the score 22-0. On defense, Richard Campbell led in tackles with 15, followed by Larry Keltz and Danny Davis with 9. Tommie Green and John Thomas with 8, and Kenneth Pitts and Tim Green with 6. The leading rushers were Richard Campbell, 22 carries for 109 yards; Kenneth Pitts, 10 carries for 52 yards; and Charles Ezell, 8 carries for 42 yards. Larry Bynum intercepted two passes and Charles Ezell one. Ronnie Cox and Dickie Garrison were effective offensive blockers in the game. Gary Campbell played an excellent game at quarterback, but was injured early in the second quarter and missed much of the action.

## "Voices" from Battlefields Speak In Veterans Day Program Address

"VOICES" of American dead in the battlefields of the world spoke last night in an address by Bill Moss at the joint VFW and Legion Veterans day program held in the Legion building. Mr. Moss, vocational agriculture teacher in Matador High School, was introduced by Leon Smallwood.

"If the dead in American Military Cemeteries around the world could speak tonight, what would they say? Do you think they would be satisfied?" Mr. Moss asked his listeners. "From the crosses in Henri Chappelle Cemetery in Belgium might come these words: 'Give us men who encourage patriotism, love of the flag, respect for law and order and an undying loyalty to constitutional government. Our government, with all its faults, and they are many, is still the greatest government ever formulated by men.'"

He named other cemeteries of the world where American fighting men are sleeping after having paid the supreme sacrifice, and said "... let us remember that great human advances have not been brought

about by mediocre men and women, but by distinctly uncommon people with the vital spark of leadership. He cited the need of men who will keep the moral law. "Nothing in the entire universe has undergone so little change as the great tenets of which moral systems are composed. To do good to others, to forgive enemies, to love neighbors, to restrain passions, to honor parents, to respect authority, to return good for evil, not to cause anger, not to bear false witness, not to lie, not to steal. His subject was, 'America's Ten Most Wanted Men'.

Veterans Day this year was of added significance because it marked the 50th anniversary of the beginning of WWI and the 25th anniversary of the start of WWII.

### Tour Of India Affords Pleasure Of Visit with American Friends

The part of the tour reviewed briefly in this report began May 4 in Delhi, India and ended May 27 in Damascus, Syria.

In New Delhi I had the pleasure of being the dinner guest of Mrs. George Knierrin, Lola Pohl's sister-in-law and her helpful son, Larry in their home. Mr. Knierrin (an astronomist) was away from home on business.

New Delhi is the capital of India, and we also visited nearby Old Delhi, in New Delhi, Rajghat, where Mahatma Gandhi's body was cremated in a hallowed spot. The plain, unadorned black marble monument (he had requested simplicity) in a park is a national shrine. We saw the home of Nehru, who died a short time after we were there.

Most eagerly we had awaited

### land on the Pakistani side into West Pakistan.

We were detained several hours by customs of both countries. All these hours we had to walk across the border because diplomatic relations between India and Pakistan are strained over the right of possession of beautiful Kashmir. For its part, Kashmir would rather be independent of either or both.

After such an afternoon, Lahore, the second largest city and cultural center of West Pakistan was a most welcome haven for our tired and thirsty group.

**A wedding procession with all its pomp and glitter passed our hotel. The customs and ceremonies seemed strange to us, but no doubt have been in usage many centuries.**

One of the largest mosques in the world, the Badshahi Mosque is located in Lahore. This mosque is built of red sandstone with marble interior. The amazing symmetry of the three giant marble domes topping the many arches of the mosque is a marvel of harmony in masonry.

We were given respite from the heat by going north to Peshawar, Pakistan where the United States maintains an Air Base. We were told quite unofficially that Frances Gary Powers began his ill-fated U2 flight to Russia from this base. I talked to several of our boys who had trained in Texas, and of course had the days numbered until their return to the States.

In that little-known but beautiful and interesting Kingdom of Swat in Northern Pakistan, the highways were lined with nomads walking and carrying all their possessions. The wheat harvest which seemed good, was in process. These nomads, who camped by rivers or irrigation ditches at night, were reaping and threshing the wheat by the most primitive method — by hand.

**Interesting Excursion**  
One of the most interesting excursions was to an Afriidi native village. The Afriidi are fierce, stalwart warlike tribals who have never been subdued. Their occupation is making remarkably accurate guns by hand.

**Temperature is 115**  
From Kashmir we went to Amritga, India to bid farewell to India, by walking in 115-degree weather across no-man's land on India's side, across the border and then across no man's

land on the Pakistani side into West Pakistan.

All of us remember Afghanistan from our geography-study days and probably have not heard much about it since. I don't think I had ever known anyone who had been to Afghanistan. It is a legendary land of high mountains, fertile valleys, large herds of sheep and caravans of camels, and lies in the heart of Central Asia. One of the agricultural products is saffron, which is used in medicine.
