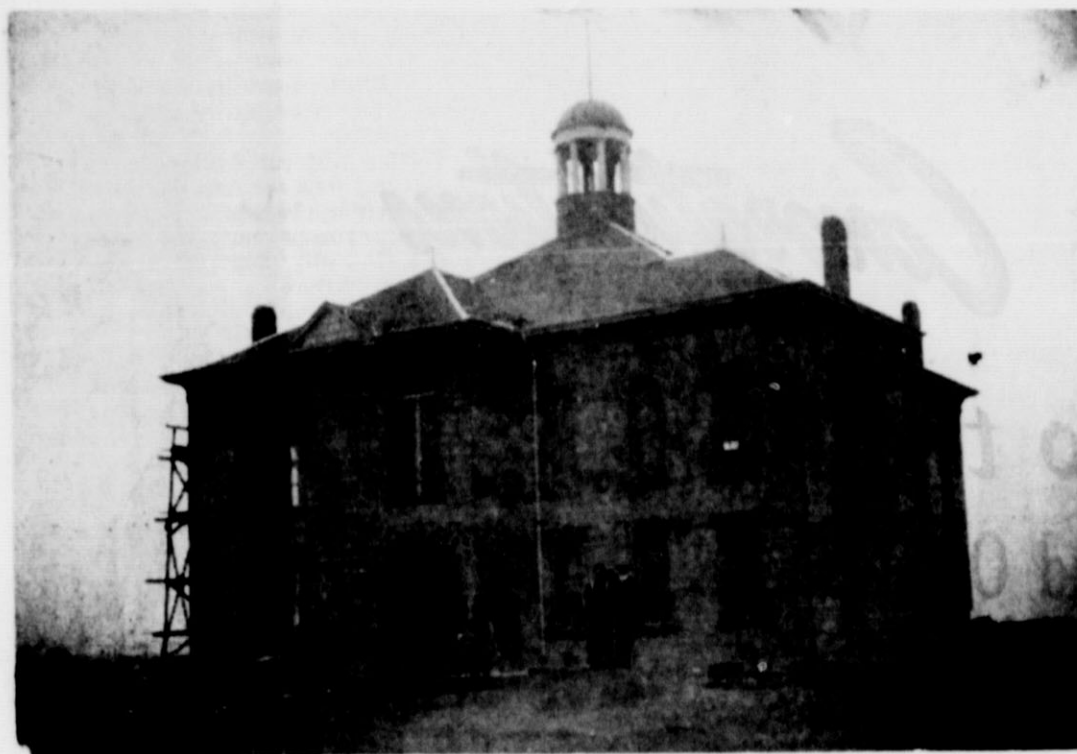

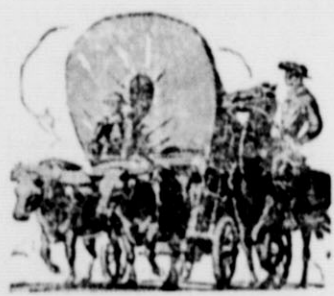

'Dizzy' Dean Once Visited in Matador

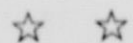

Prominent Texans Have Been Guests Of Old Settlers

Many prominent Texans, among them state officials, have attended Motley-Dickens Counties Old Settlers reunions during the years.

Files of the Matador Tribune disclose that when the Old Settlers met on August 27-28 in 1936, four outstanding West Texans were on the program. They were Congressman George Mahon, Senator George H. Nelson, Representative Bob Alexander and Judge A. J. Fires.

Rev. C. P. Stokes of Dickens County conducted the Memorial Service which has always been held on the first day of the reunion.

COUNTY REACCREDITED AS MODIFIED TB AREA

Motley County has received a six-year reaccréditation as a Modified Accredited Tuberculosis Area.

County Agent W. C. Pallmeyer has received the certificate, according to a news release by Dr. R. G. Garrett, executive director of the Texas Animal Commission.

The commission expresses appreciation to stock-owners of Motley County for "splendid cooperation extended to our representatives while the work was being conducted in Motley County."

Historic Markers Erected In 1936

Two of Motley County's most important historic locations, Roaring Springs and Teepee City, are marked for posterity by granite monuments erected by the Texas Centennial Commission in 1936.

They were set into place in August of that year, in time for the Motley-Dickens Counties Old Settlers Reunion ceremonies on Aug. 27-28. A bronze seal of the State of Texas and appropriate inscriptions are near the top of each marker.

The marker for Teepee City about seventeen miles northeast of Matador, was placed on a lonely mesa on the west side of Teepee creek and a few paces from the grave of Isaac O. Armstrong, pioneer merchant who died during the heyday of the vanished city.

The original city was first located on the east bank of the creek and many of the old busi-

ness places were located there, but later a western addition was made on the opposite side. The Roaring Springs marker is on the hilltop overlooking the historic springs and water fall, and picnic area, about three miles south of town.

COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:

Don't forget to claim the Federal tax on gasoline used on the farm or ranch. These claims must be mailed by Sept. 30th, and cover gasoline purchased between July 1, 1963 and June 30, 1964. Mail to District Director of Internal Revenue, Dallas Texas.

Rogene Swim, 4-H member from Roaring Springs, attended the Texas Range Camp at Junction July 27-31 as the results of being a state winner in the 1963 4-H Range Management Contest. Rogene was awarded a tie clasp for being selected as Trail Boss, and also received a billfold for preparing one of the best notebooks and herbariums. The camp is very helpful to boys interested in ranching and is an annual affair. The Lions Clubs of Matador and Roaring Springs have helped sponsor

boys to this camp in past years, with Harry Campbell, Matador, Bert Green, George Smith and A. J. Dye of Roaring Springs attending. Any boy interested in attending this camp in 1965 is urged to contact me for information.

The boll weevil has started his advance again. Those with infestations are urged to notify me so that I can pass the information on to Insect Survey teams that are working in the area.

4-H members who were 13 or younger as of Jan. 1, 1964 are reminded that record books submitted for District judging are due in my office by Sept. 17th. If you need help, contact me immediately, not waiting until the last minute as corrections that you can make will give you a better chance of becoming a winner.

The annual field day of the Lubbock Experiment Station will be held Tuesday Sept. 15th, starting at 1:00 P.M. Items to be presented include pre-merge and post emergence weed control; cotton disease research; sub-irrigation research; broadcast cotton; and new strains of cotton and castorbeans.

Stored grain insects inflict enormous losses upon grain

producers each year. Insects destroy as much as 2% of the nation's farm-stored grain each month. Protection against these pests is begun by storing grain only in bins that have been thoroughly cleaned. Old grain, trash, feed sacks and other debris that furnish living quarters for insects should be removed. Cracks should be covered to prevent grain from collecting, and grain and other material beneath and near the bins should be destroyed.

After cleaning, spray the inside surface with either methoxychlor or malathion at the rate of two gallons per 1,000 sq. ft. of surface area.

Premium grade malathion may be used as a grain protectant on wheat, oats, corn, rye, barley, grain sorghum or peanuts. It can be applied as a dust or spray at the time grain is being placed in storage. Liquid fumigants that can be used are ethylene dichloride, carbon tetra-

chloride and carbon disulphide (Hi-Life). Before fumigation, spray the outside of the bin with a residual spray such as malathion to kill insects that may be forced out of the building by the fumigant.

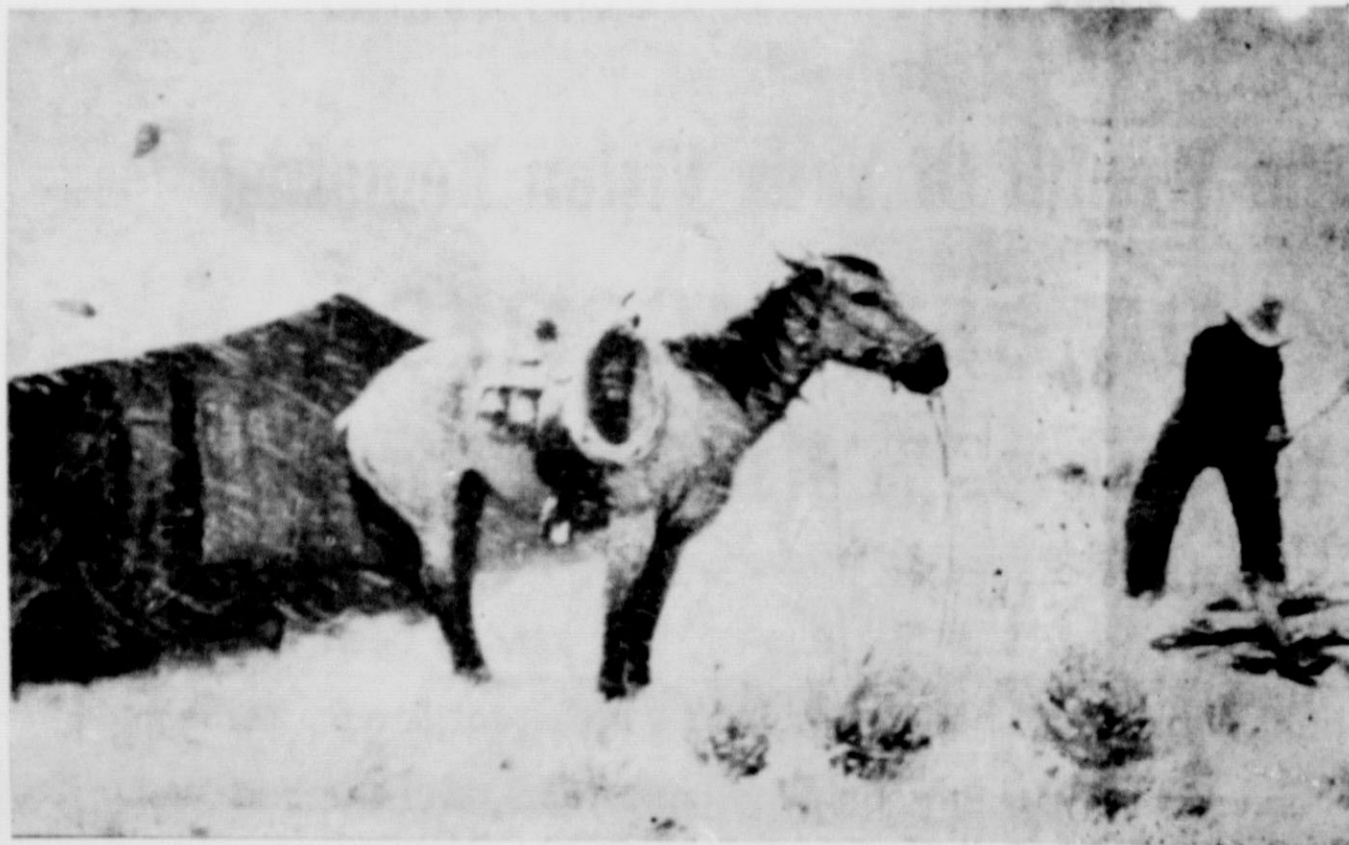

Editor Started Here On Windmill Work

It is part of history that the editor of the Matador Tribune started his career here working on a windmill. Douglas Meador was born here but his parents left when he was 6 months of age.

He returned in July, 1928, from Paducah, where his parents lived. He was fresh from a six-year stint in California at writing game in the movie studios and Hollywood had decided it could manage without his talents.

The late Fred G. Simpson had employed Meador as a "soda sket" in Simpson's Drug (same location as Vaughn Drug). At the time the City of Matador was installing a water system. The present water tower was being built and ditches were being dug for the mains. The soda fountain at Simpson's Drug was being supplied from a windmill at the back of the First State Bank building. There was no pressure and very little water that first morning.

Meador was sent to work on the windmill and the electric motor that aided when there was not sufficient wind. Shortly before noon he had the water system working again and returned to the store to put on his white apron behind the soda fountain. Two years later he accepted a place in the advertising department of the Childress Index, his first newspaper work.

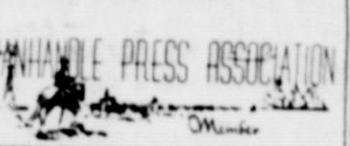

Empty Saddles Paid Tribute During War To Cowboys Wearing Nation's Uniforms

(From Files of the Tribune issue of Sept. 2, 1943)

EMPTY SADDLES IN THE SUN, empty stirrups dangling in the brown, sticky dust, paid symbolic tribute to absent cowboys at the 20th annual reunion of the Motley-Dickens Counties Old Settlers at Roaring Springs Pioneer park, Thursday and Friday.

Cowboys of the counties whose once booted feet are now clad in GI shoes, in the stirrups of destiny, of death and glory, will never know the full depth of reverence paid to them. There was a hush, half way between a whisper and a prayer, as gray-haired old riders, companions, relatives and friends started leading the unmounted horses in the long procession which preceded each of the two rodeos.

Thin, empty clouds drifted in the white Texas sky and brown dust rose above the sun-blistered hills. Tears welled and cut their paths along many a tanned, wrinkled and dust-covered cheek. The heart and spirit of

Texas, tense with the tribulations of war, paid homage to their absent comrades in uniform.

One Cowboy In Uniform
Approximately 35 saddle horses were led around the arena in tribute to men in uniform during the two rodeos.

Only one participant, "Bantle" Brandon, home on furlough and Mervin Green arranged the rodeos and directed activities. Sheriff H. H. Courtney listed the entrées, paid off the winners and kept "Doc" Bull Cross, announcer and master of ceremonies, informed of appearances in the arena.

"I worked half a day on a big mesquite and then didn't get it," Homer Sheats says, "so I went to the farmer and told him I didn't plant those mesquites and I wasn't going to dig them up, I quit."

"He later moved cowboys to Matador to meet the legal requirements for county organization. He was elected the first Motley County judge. His home ranch is located at this site."

The erection of Confederate Memorial Information Markers is part of the Civil War Centennial Commemoration in Texas. The markers are designed to interpret and commemorate the role of prominent Texas Confederates, battles, frontier outposts, coastal fortifications, manufacturing plants, and military supply centers.

This marking program is part of a comprehensive five-year plan of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee to record, appreciate, mark, preserve, and survey Texas history. "RAMPS," as the plan is called, seeks to place 5,000 historical markers over the state in this five-year period. These markers are to be sponsored through joint efforts of the state, counties, cities, civic groups, and individuals.

The Civil War in Texas is a part of the vast program to mark historical sites in Texas from archeological finds to modern industries and statesmen. Since the beginning of the centennial marking program, 509 Texas Confederate Memorial Information Markers have been submitted for erection.

The new rate schedule provide an extension of the residential and commercial electric space heating rate from four to six months. Presently WTU Electric space heating customers buy electric heat at a base rate of 1c per KW/H.

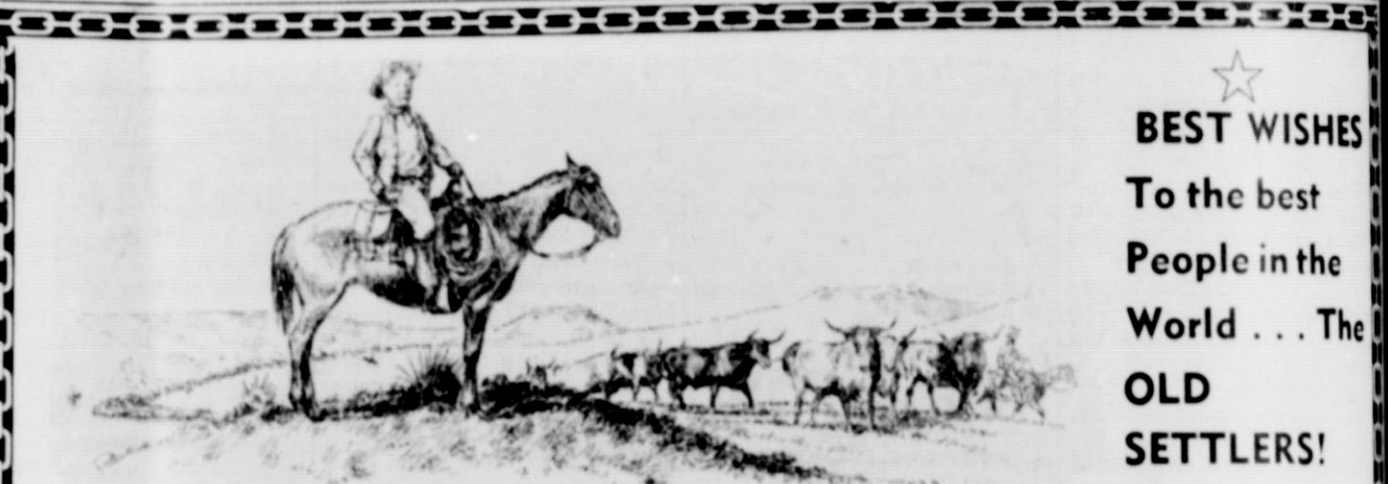
