It was a bright July morning in 1910 when Homer Sheats first came to Matador. He had arrived to open the city's first lumber yard for the Quinn Lumber Company. The stock of material was hauled from Lazare (west of Quanah) where the Quanah, Acme & Pacific Railway was building west. The first location was the present site of the First Methodist Church and the lumber was stacked on the ground, out in the open. Later the firm built a yard on the present site of the old Burton-Lingo Co. yard. Homer Sheats has seen many changes in Matador since that rain-washed morning he landed here and got off the chain-drive, open top mail hack from Paducah. 
