Ezzell Resigns; Johnson Elected

MAN AT THE HELM of Matador schools for 19 years, Supt. Bert Ezzell, resigned at the regular board of trustees meeting, Tuesday evening, April 13. Charles Johnson, High School Principal and coach was elected to fill the vacancy at a special meeting of the board Friday night, April 16. Mr. Ezzell will remain in the capacity of superintendent until August.

The resignation of Mr. Ezzell was the second change in the superintendency here in 36 years. He followed Supt. B. F. Tunnell in July 1946, after he had held the place 17 years.

Mr. Ezzell has been associated with Matador schools since 1937 when he came here as High School Principal following the resignation of that place by B. F. Harbour, with the exception of three and one half years spent in the Army during World War II.

Charlie Johnson came to the Matador faculty in 1956 as High School Principal and assistant coach. He became head coach in July 1959 following the resignation of Coach Clifford Bradshaw.

Mr. Johnson, who was reared at Hedley, is a graduate of Texas Tech and received his master's degree at West Texas College. While coaching the Matadors, the teams won six consecutive district championships in

Class B football and three regional championships during the period.

Mr. Ezzell did not make an announcement of his future plans, except that he will move his residence to Abilene, where he has a home and where Mrs. Ezzell has been residing with their son Johnny, a polio victim, who is attending Abilene Christian College. Their son Charles plans to enter the college this fall.

Rites Held For Frank A. Jameson

A lifetime resident of Motley County, Frank Arbie Jameson, 66, died at 9 a.m. Monday in Stanley Hospital, where he had been a patient since March 24, after suffering a heart attack at his ranch home in the Northfield community.

Funeral services were held at 4 p.m. Tuesday at the Church of Christ, with Minister Claude Woods of Turkey, officiating. Burial was in the Northfield Cemetery under direction of Seigler Funeral Home, Matador.

A veteran of World War II, Mr. Jameson was born at Matador, May 29, 1908 and died April 19 at the age of 56 years, 10 months and 20 days. With the exception of the years he spent in the Army, he had resided in this area his entire life. He was a son of pioneer residents, the late Rev. and Mrs. R. L. Jameson.

He was married at Childress, Texas, September 18, 1946 to the former Dorothy McDonald, and after making their home here for several years, they moved to a ranch at Northfield in 1959.

Besides his wife, he is survived by two sons, Franklin and Travis, both of the home; one step-daughter, Mrs. Gene Head, Fort Worth; two grandchildren; five brothers, Malcolm Jameson, Whiteflat, Bob and Ed Jameson, both of Matador, Leslie Jameson, Goree, and Olin Jameson, Carlsbad, N. M.; and five sisters: Mrs. Preston Spray, Matador, Mrs. Guy Thacker, Roaring Springs, Mrs. Bill Merriam, Brownwood, Mrs. Clyde Smith, Big Spring, and Miss Ruth Jameson, Wadsworth, Kansas.

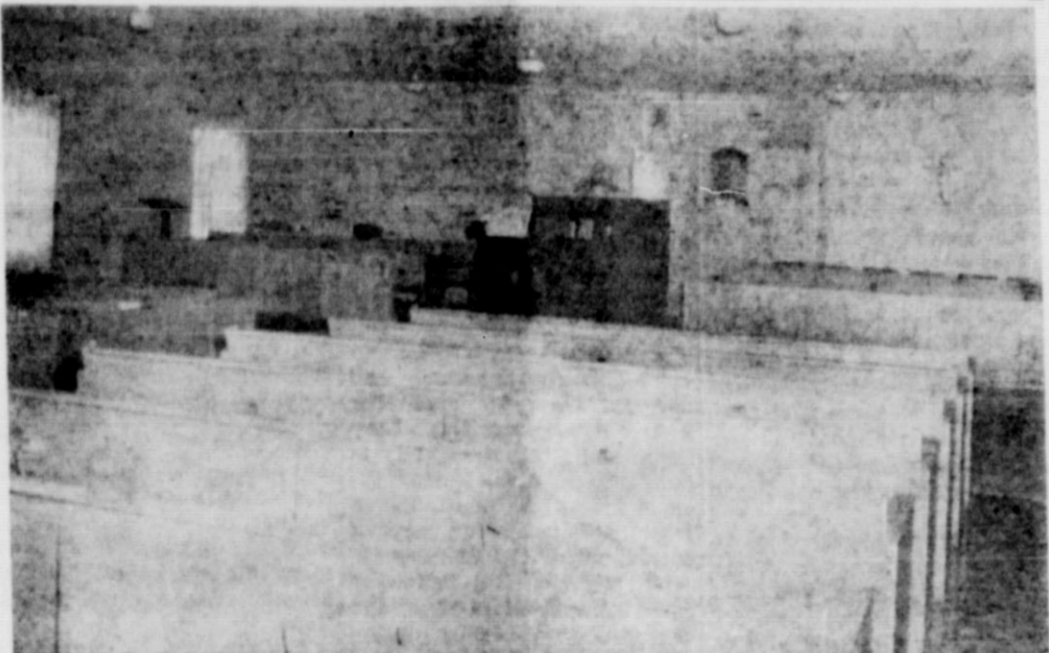
