Mr. Gunn is Oldham County ASC office manager and has been in the service approximately 25 years, moving from Spar to Channing.

He is a member of the First Baptist Church of Channing and serves as a deacon, Sunday School teacher, and treasurer of that church.

Mr. Gunn was instrumental in organizing the Matador Cow-boys Reunion Assn. in Channing and has been active in its organization. He led in the movement for a community building in Channing, securing a donation of \$5000 from the Kilgore Foundation of Amarillo, for the starter.

Born in Manchester, Tenn., Gunn was orphaned at an early age and was adopted from a

## Man Crushed Under Falling Automobile

A LONG-TIME resident of Roaring Springs, J. M. Carpenter was fatally injured about 1:45 p.m. when a car upon which he was working, slipped and crashed down upon his chest. He was dead upon arrival at Stanley Hospital here.

Deputy Bobby Williams said Mr. Carpenter, owner and operator of a blacksmith and welding shop in Roaring Springs, was working on his own car. The front end had been raised by a chain hoist and a pair of jacks supported the rear end, according to Deputy Williams.

Mr. Carpenter was working under the right rear when the jack apparently slipped, pinning him beneath a wheel. The mishap was discovered by a friend, G. W. (Pumper) Green, about an hour later. Mr. Green said the car motor was still running.

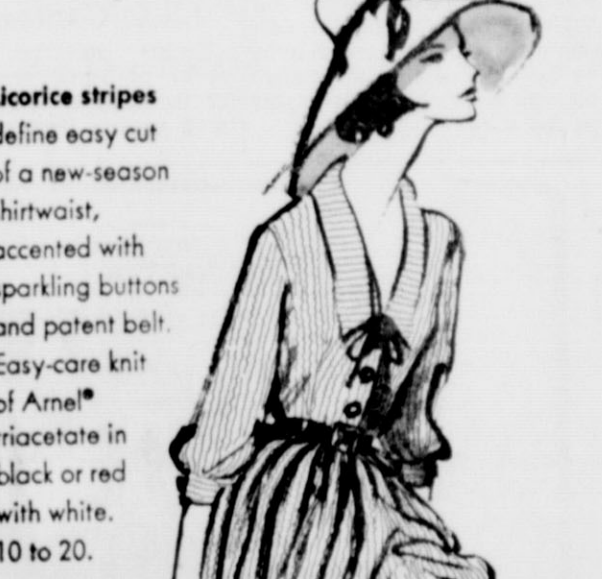

### Integration

#### No Problem In Flomot School

The last non-integrated school in the area no longer has that status.

Integration has been no problem in the Flomot Independent School District, since no Negroes live within the district, according to Supt. A. J. Barron. However, at a meeting of the Flomot School board held Feb. 16, it was voted to integrate to comply with the Civil Rights law.

Barron said that Dr. J. W. Edgar, Commissioner of Education, had informed all school boards that they must sign a letter of intention to integrate and comply with provisions of the Civil Rights legislation of 1964, or the schools would lose federal funds for lunchrooms, vocational homemaking, surplus property, library and equipment aid and all other federal money.

Barron declared that Flomot was the last non-integrated school in the area.

### Retail Sales

#### Show Increase From 1958-1963

This local news item was prepared by a census bureau electronic computer and typed at 10 lines per second especially for the Matador Tribune.

Motley County's 47 retail establishments had \$4.0 million in sales in 1963, an increase of 17 percent from 1958, the U. S. Bureau of the Census has just reported after tabulating data gathered from all firms in the 1963 census of business. The last previous business census conducted by the census bureau, an agency of the U. S. Department of Commerce, was in 1958.

Retail trade in the county meant jobs (exclusive of proprietors) for 130 men and women and a yearly payroll of \$350 thousand.

For the state as a whole, the census bureau reported 96,406 retail establishments with sales of \$127,154 million, up 18 percent from 1958. Census reports to be issued during the next few months will give state and county figures on wholesale and service trades, manufacturing and mineral industries.

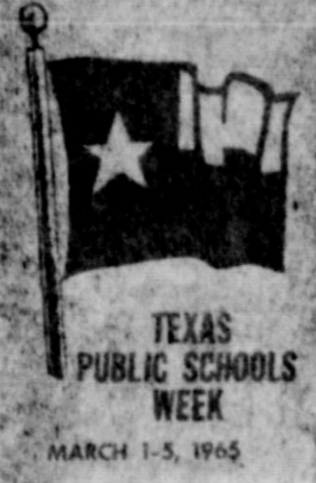
### ROLLING PLAINS PCA BOARD MEETING HELD
