## Prisoners Indicted

MURDER charges were filed here Tuesday by a Motley County grand jury, against Larry Carnell Fortenberry and Stacy Albert Carter, for the Nov. 12 killing of Sheriff Jinks Wilson, and shooting of John D. Rogers.

The prisoners, held without bail in the Crosby County courthouse in Crosbyton, were indicted on four counts: Capital murder, attempted murder, aggravated robbery and unprohibited use of motor vehicle.

District Attorney John R. Hollums and District Judge

George Miller were present at the hearing, and Judge Miller set December 20 as date for District Court, at which time the prisoners will be arraigned.

Sheriff Wilson was slain and Rogers wounded when they were fired on by two criminals as they were attempting to remove a license plate from Rogers' car, about three miles east of Matador.

Wilson and Rogers were returning from investigating some cattle reported on the highway earlier in the

morning. The shooting occurred when Sheriff Wilson got out of his car and questioned Fortenberry and Carter regarding their actions.

The criminals later abandoned their vehicle on the Pat Sheridan farm, went to the Jim Sturdivant farm where they threatened Mr. and Mrs. Sturdivant and their son, James, then escaped in the Sturdivant car.

They were captured less than two hours later in Crosby County by DPS Patrolman Kenneth Witt.

## Cotton Destroyed In Blaze Tuesday

Four bales of cotton stripped and ready for ginning were destroyed by fire about 2:30 p.m. Tuesday on the J. L. Woodruff farm four miles southeast of Matador. The cotton belonged to James "Butch" Renfro, who farms the land.

Friction created by the stripper basket was believed to be the cause of the blaze which almost totaled the cotton and damaged the trailer on which it was loaded. The sideboards and bed of the trailer were badly charred.

Matador Fire Department was called to the scene, and extinguished the fire. However, a heavy wind Wednesday morning fanned the smoldering cotton and burrs into flames which destroyed the remaining cotton.

## Wind Erosion Is Problem Following Crop Harvest

Wind erosion begins to become a serious problem from November through May each year, points out Mike Isbell, Soil Conservationist with the Upper Pease Soil and Water Conservation District.

As cotton is harvested and crop residues are turned under, the soil is left unprotected and is subject to severe damage. Damages include the loss of valuable top soil, reduced productivity, and decreased fertility. In addition, the lost soil covers up fences, fills in road ditches, damages growing crops, obstructs motorist vision, and creates a health hazard.

Wind erosion can be greatly reduced and even stopped by planning ahead and applying some sound management. The utilization of high residue crops in rotation with cotton or other low residue producing crops, the use of minimum tillage such as small grain in cotton or sorghum stubble, and the maintenance of adequate crop residues on the soil surface all provide protection against wind erosion.

In addition the residues return organic matter to the soil, help control water erosion, improve water intake of the soil, improve moisture retention, and provide better protection of newly seeded crops against damage.
