#### PIGS HELP TO SAVE LIVES Mrs. Jacobs and her Heart Valves Used In Surgery On Humans

(By Clark Bolt, Waco Tribune Escald)

People are like pigs in many ways. Pigs and people squeal lot. They have similar digestive systems. In some cases their organs are nearly

Because of that, countless human heart patients are alive and well today, thanks to the lowly feeder pigs. That animal's heart valve is almost identical to that of a human. The demand for the pig's heart valve is growing. Helping to meet that need is a Waco feeder pig buyer, the MFA Livestock Association in Marshall, Mo., a packing plant in Dallas and Louisiana, and hundreds of hog producers in Texas. Arkansas. Louisiana and Missouri. That supply system provides thousands of feeder pig heart valves to the Hancock Laboratory in Anaheim,

Former Resident Is Dealer Since July of this year, John Irwin of Robinson, who is a bonded and registered dealer in feeder pigs and has been buying about 1,500 pigs a week for the California

laboratory. A native of Matador, Irwin is the son of Mr. and Mrs. John Irwin who still live here.

The Columbia Packing Co. in Dallas and the Southern Meat Co. in Oak Grove, La., slaughter the pigs and send the hearts of those pigs to the laboratory via air shipment.

The MFA Livestock Association is in the picture because this is where Irwin buys many of the pigs. "Since I couldn't find enough feeder pigs in this area, I had to look elsewhere in Louisiana and Arkansas as well as Missouri," Irwin explained. The feeder pigs which are

sought weigh between 80 and 90 pounds. "I had to go to special sales where nothing but feeder pigs are sold. The MFA in Marshall has been involved in feeder pig sales for several years, and we have to admit it: that organization is several years ahead of Texas," Irwin said. Jim Halsey is general manager of the MFA Livestock Association and Pete Moles is manager of the

feeder pig division. The pigs are shipped to either the Columbia Packing Co. at Dallas or to Louisiana The pig's heart is the first thing that is removed.

Bob Ondrusek of the Columbia Packing Co., at Dallas explains what happens next

The heart is placed in a plastic bag, which is then chilled in ice water. Then the bag and the heart are put into styrofoam boxes, iced down and air-shipped to California Ondrusek said his plant ships 200 to 300 hearts almost every night.

Irwin said personnel at the lab run all sorts of tests on the hearts to make sure there is no disease. The valves are taken out of the heart and put into a pig heart valve bank In talking with some of the personnel of the laboratory, Ondrusek said he understands that there are many people waiting in hospitals throughout the nation for a feeder pig heart valve. Perhaps as many as 90,000 pig valves will be ordered by the laboratory next year, according to Irwin and Ondrusek.

The rest of that feeder pig is also valuable. It is sold as a "roaster" throughout the world.

The carcass goes into a scalding vat and is dehaired

An 80 to 90 pound liveweight pig dresses out at 50 to 60 pounds. "When they get through with it, the pig really looks nice. They stick a red apple in its mouth and cherries in its eyes. The head and the feet are left on, of

course," Irwin said. Ondrusek said roasters sell around \$1.45 to \$1.65 per pound at retail. "That is what they were selling for before the hog market broke, however," he explained.

He said there is a good demand for the roasters in Miami, Italy, Japan and in Hawaii. Hog prices have dropped 40

per cent in a year's time at many markets. "Buying up those feeder pigs has helped to pull some pork off the market, but even more important is the fact it is helping to save human lives." Irwin said.
