## Homemaker Service Offered

The senior citizens of the Matador area have a new service available to them — Homemaker Service! The services of a specially

trained Homemaker include light housekeeping, menu planning and meal preparation, and other work necessary to enable an older

person who is unable to perform these tasks to remain at home.

Cost for the service to the elderly client is \$2.30 per hour. However, persons who are unable to pay this amount may make application for service and pay according to the ability to pay based upon a recommended sliding scale.

Mature persons interested in becoming a Homemaker Service Aide, or if you are in need of the services of a Homemaker, please contact Wynona Gilbreath, Senior Advocate in Matador, phone number 2881. This program is sponsored cooperatively by the South Plains Regional Office on Aging (SPAG), the Administration on Aging of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, and the College of Home Economics at Texas Tech University.

## Public Appreciates Doctors

Motley County residents, and others from surrounding areas are well pleased with the medical services they are receiving, and are telling others about Motley General Clinic and the doctors on duty.

The clinic, in the former Traweek Hospital building, opened on July 6, with Dr. Thuy Danh Do and Dr. Y Hoang Do on duty, as well as veteran Motley County physician, Dr. Albert Traweek, who still has his office there.

Almost from the start, they were swamped with patients, and have been kept busy daily and into the evening. The two Vietnamese physicians alternate for duty on the week ends, and are on call on alternate nights.

In cases where the doctors have found it advisable to send a patient to a specialist elsewhere, the diagnosis of the local physician has in each case, been identical to that of the specialist.

Almost without exception, local residents have expressed a personal feeling of gratification that the clinic is open, and invariably add, "I hope people who need medical services will use either of the doctors, and that they will stay with us."

As for Dr. Do and Dr. Y (they are not related although they have the same surname), they have repeatedly expressed appreciation for the courtesies they have received since coming here last November. Each is highly educated, experienced and qualified for the work.

The Tribune this week received the following acknowledgement for publication:

"The coaching staff of Motley County High School would like to thank Dr. Y, Dr. Do and the local clinic personnel for giving their time and facilities for football physicals. The doctors gave the physicals without charge as a community service. This was an aid both to our program and the students.

"We are glad to have Dr. Do and Dr. Y in our town and thank them not only for this service, but for the very presence of their practice in the community."

Which just about sums up the sentiment of this community and neighboring communities.

## Foster Care Needed For Area Children

An urgent need now exists for foster parents to care for children on a temporary basis in Hale, Floyd and Motley counties, according to Bill Gardner of Plainview, child welfare supervisor for the State Department of Public Welfare.

The number of children requiring foster care has grown extensively during the past year because of the increased emphasis on reporting child abuse and neglect, Gardner said. Most of these children are forced to live away from their own parents for reasons quite beyond their control. Some of them are victims of abuse and neglect. In other cases, parents may be temporarily unable to care for them due to illness or other family problems. Some children may have emotional or physical disabilities.

In most instances these children are not available for adoption, since most of them will return to their own homes as problems there are resolved. In some instances, temporary foster care is required while a permanent adoptive home is found.

Foster care is needed for children of all ages from infancy to age 18, and of all

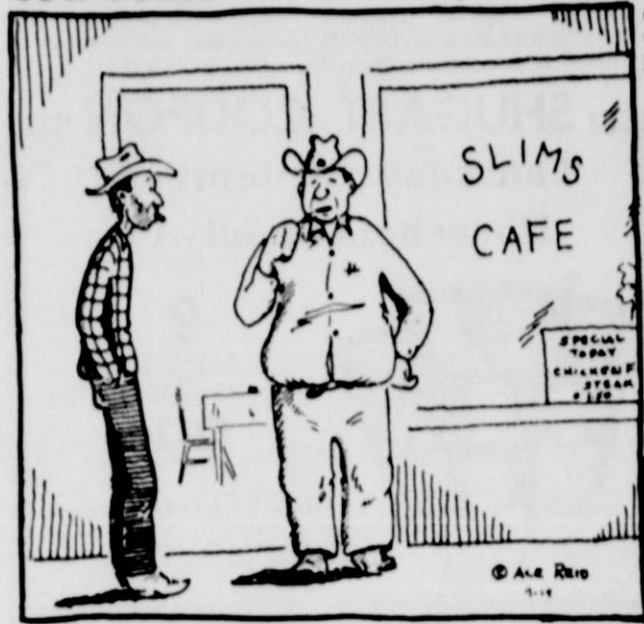

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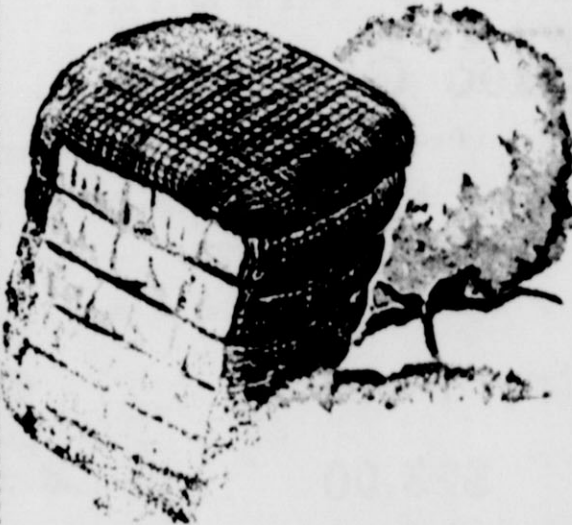
