
Judging for the beard and moustache contest will be at 2 p.m. in the park, followed by judging of women's best pioneer costume. Prizes will be awarded winners in these

Meeting Of Cattlemen Announced

Motley County unit of the Independent Cattlemen's Association will meet Tuesday night, July 6 in the district court room at the courthouse, it was announced this week by L.M. Cox, president. The meeting will start at 8

o'clock. New officers will be elected, and several matters of interest to ranchers and cattlemen will be reviewed. Second annual state convention of the Independent Cattlemen's Association is set for July 15 - 18 in Austin, and all members who can do so are urged to attend.

Among measures supported by ICA are: expanded markets through fair competition and public education; protection of the producer's right to a fair profit on honest investment and hard work; stop passage of federal land use; achieve passage in Congress of a bill to increase the estate tax property exemption from \$60,000 (set in 1942) to \$200,000; demands a new import system which lets in increased foreign beef only when domestic supplies are inadequate and legislation to require health inspection of foreign packing plants shipping to the U.S.




