A devastating storm system which covered the Texas Panhandle and South Plains Monday evening and night, hit areas of Motley County, leaving extensive crop and property damage.

While sections of the county escaped the high winds, hail and flooding rains, it was estimated that approximately 7,000 acres of crops were damaged or destroyed. "It is hard to make an accurate estimate," said Extension Agent Bill Pallmeyer, "since some of the cotton will survive, while other fields will have to be completely re-planted."

During the height of the storm, pea-sized hail fell in Matador, while in the Whiteflat area, hail was described as being the size of apricots. Baseball size hail was reported at Pampa and Tulia, in the Panhandle area.

Windows were broken out in many homes in the Flomot community. Several barns were reported unroofed, fields and roads were "washed out," and creek-beds were overflowing in several areas.

The storm did not cover the Northfield area, and a good "cotton shower" was received in fields there. Roaring Springs also escaped the brunt of the storm.

In Matador, the windows in the old Gulf Station at the intersection of U.S. Highway 70 and State Highway 70, were knocked or blown out. The property is owned by Clay Jameson and used for a car wash business. Electricity was off for over an hour Monday night and phones were out of order all over town, Tuesday and Wednesday.

While reports of rainfall varied from six inches in the Whiteflat-Flomot section, to three inches in other parts of the county, Matador had 2.55 as registered by Bob Stanley's government rain gauge, and he reported that 2.25 inches fell within one hour.

This brings the total for the year, through June 13, to 10.73, as compared to 7.28 for the same period in 1976. The temperature as registered for the day Monday, also reached a high of 102 degrees.

Recent Fire Destroys Combine On Keith Farm

A fire Tuesday afternoon, June 7 completely destroyed a John Deere combine on the D. P. Keith farm southeast of Matador. The combine, which was owned by L. L. Lynn of Matador, was reported in flames around 3:45 p.m.

Keith farm alarm and after a few minutes had the blaze under control. Mr. Keith said that they had just finished emptying a load of cut wheat from the combine when the fire started, and that none of the valuable crop was lost. He also said that a leak in the butane line to the engine carburetor started the blaze. Quick actions at the scene prevented the remaining wheat still in the field, from going in flames before firemen arrived.

He had suffered a heart attack around noon, at his home, 4719 Bonny Drive. He was pastor of the Hatton Road Baptist Church in Wichita Falls. Funeral services were held at 4 p.m. Wednesday in Calvary Baptist Church in Mineral Wells, with the pastor, Rev. Val Nance, and Rev. Clyde Campbell of Abilene, officiating. Rev. Sims was born Feb. 1, 1916, in Texas. He had served as pastor of a church in Mineral Wells, and came here in 1973 from the Pansy Baptist Church in Crosby County.
