Murder Trial Moved To Area Counties

The capital murder trials of two men accused of the shotgun slaying of former Motley County Sheriff Jinks Wilson, Monday were moved to area counties in action by Dist. Judge George Miller. Stacy Albert Carter, 25, of Olivia, N.C., will go on trial for his life in Lubbock 72nd District Court sometime shortly after May 1.

Larry Carnell Fortenberry, 28, of Mount Hermon, La., will be tried later in Plainview. According to Pat Patrick, Avalanche Journal Staff writer, Judge Miller also imposed a semi "gag order" on press coverage of Carter's trial, including banning publication of a statement the man allegedly gave

authorities about the 1976 shooting until it is entered in evidence at his trial. The 119th District Court judge also: -- Prohibited all principal parties involved in the case -- attorneys, court personnel, witnesses, law enforcement officers -- from discussing the case with any news reporters -- Ruled no photographs can be taken of the defendant or any other persons connected with the trial. -- Extended that to include prohibiting photographs being taken of Carter and his lawyers not only in the courtroom and adjoining halls, but also while the defendant is being transported from jail to the courtroom. -- Prohibited televising or broadcasting anything in or near the courtroom, either while court is in recess or in session. Miller, however, did not go as far as Carter's court-appointed lawyers, John Montford and Mark Hall of Lubbock, asked in publicity suppression. During his client's pre-trial hearing Monday afternoon, Montford lashed out at the Avalanche-Journal for recent stories on how expenses of the trial will be paid. Both Carter and Fortenberry claimed they are too poor to pay for their own defenses, putting the burden for the tab on Motley County. The county has asked for a \$51,000 state grant to help it meet the men's defense costs, and also in looking to the state legislature in hopes it will pass a bill limiting the amount of indigent defense costs a county can be charged to \$3,000 a person. Total costs may run to \$100,000, some experts estimate. In addition, the A-J reported Sunday that friends of the slain Wilson set up a private fund to help pay a special prosecutor Tom Hamilton of Plainview who is assisting Dist. Attorney Randy Hollums with the cases.

Annual Livestock Show Scheduled For Monday

PLANS are complete and everything is in readiness for the 37th annual Motley County Junior Livestock Show, Monday. As announced, the show will be held at the old FFA building in Matador.

One hundred and six animals are scheduled to be exhibited. Steers, lambs and

market hogs for sale must be weighed and tagged between 7:30 and 9:30 a.m. and all other animals (breeding hogs, rabbits and heifers) must be entered by 9:30 a.m. Market hogs (either gilts or barrows) must weigh 190 to 250 pounds, and steers must weigh 750 pounds or more, and must not have any

permanent teeth showing at time of weighing. All animals must have been owned by the exhibitor prior to Dec. 1, 1976.

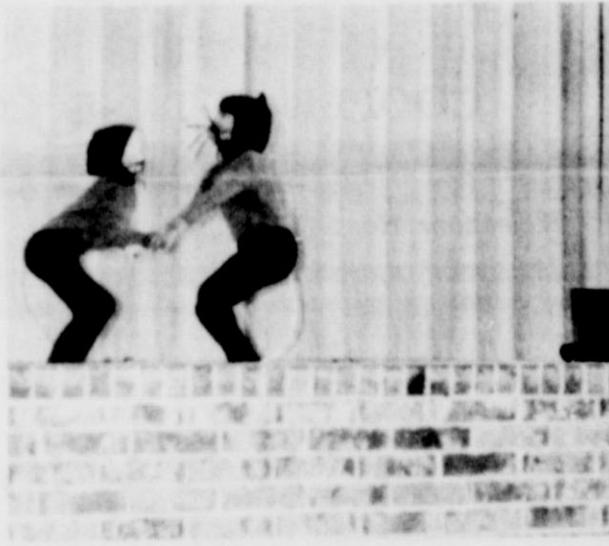
The show starts at 10:00 a.m. and proceeds as follows: Open gilts, minimum weight of 150 pounds; Bred gilts, minimum weight of 150 pounds; Sows, Grand Champion Breeding Hog; Light market hogs, Medium Market hogs, Heavy market hogs; Grand Champion Market Hog. (All market hogs will be weighed and divided into three classes of the same size. No animals of the same class will be placed in different classes, but placed in the lighter class, even though the final result may be a slight difference in the number of classes.) Market lambs; Champion lamb; Rabbit does; Rabbit bucks; Champion rabbit, Crossbred heifers, Purebred heifers, Grand Champion Heifer. (Anyone living in Motley County, owning land in Motley County, or eligible to show in the Jr. Livestock Show may show one or two heifers that are 12 to 18 months of age at show time. These heifers will not be weighed or shown at halter, but identified by number and placed in a pen to be judged.) The steer show starts at 1:30 p.m. with the following order: Light steers, Medium

steers; Heavy steers, Grand Champion Steer. (All steers will be weighed and divided into three equal classes. Animals of the same weight will not be placed in separate classes to equalize classes, but will be placed in the lighter class.)

Showmanship prizes will be provided by Lee's Feed and Seed, Roaring Springs. Trophies are provided by the VFW, American Legion, Eternas Junior Study Club, Ronnies, Matador Auto Co., Stanley Pharmacy, Motley County Abstract Company, Peck & Donna Thompson, Matador, Wylie Petroleum and Floydada Seed & Delinting Co., Floydada and the rate of gain trophy for steers will be provided by Lubbock Stockyards. The best steer bred in Motley County trophy will be given by Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Cross, Matador Nursery, and J. C. will also serve as announcer. Ribbons, rosettes and extra prize money for 1st, 2nd and 3rd place animals will be provided by the Motley County Farm Bureau. Vann Francis is president of the Motley County Livestock Association, sponsors of the show for the 4-H and FFA members under the supervision of local advisors. Other officers and directors are J. Don Finch, Roaring Springs, Vice President, Ray Cruse, Flomot, Secretary; Bill Hand, Roaring Springs, and Joe Ike Clay, Flomot, Records; and Peck Thompson, Matador, Director. Show advisors are Bill Moss and Bill Palmeyer, Directors whose term expire are J. Don Finch, Ray Cruse and Peck Thompson.

Vegetarian Diets Popular But Lack Protein Quality

Vegetarian diets — no meats, poultry or fish — have risen in popularity recently. But the major concern in planning a vegetarian diet is to insure that the protein quality is adequate, according to Miss Tina E. Willmann County Extension agent.

"Getting enough protein is usually not a problem since the average adult requires only about 46-56 grams of protein each day," the agent said this week.

"Although foods of vegetable origin contain some protein, they do not have the variety of the important amino acids that animal proteins do."

"To obtain a good balance of amino acids and to improve the quality of vegetable proteins, animal and vegetable proteins should be combined," Miss Willmann explained.

She suggested making corn tortillas with cheese, cereal

with milk and macaroni with cheese. Also, vegetable protein combinations of beans with corn or rice and peanuts with wheat, improve the quality of the proteins.

These do not have to be made in one dish, but should be consumed at the same meal, she continued.

Those interested in planning a vegetarian diet have three kinds to consider, according to this nutritionist.

Pure, or strict, vegetarian, excludes all foods of animal origin, such as meat, eggs and dairy products.

"This diet severely limits the nutrients found in meat and milk groups. Vitamin B12 is found only in meat, fish, eggs and dairy products, and the strict vegetarian will miss this important nutrient unless supplements are made," she warned.

She also pointed out that the strict vegetarian diet may be deficient in calcium, riboflavin and iodine.

Ova-lacto vegetarian, excludes meat, fish and poultry, but includes eggs and dairy products.

Lacto-vegetarian, excludes meat, poultry, fish and eggs, but includes dairy products.

"The ova-lacto and lacto-vegetarian diets can be nutritionally acceptable. But the strict vegetarian diet is dangerous and not recommended for long periods of time," she said.

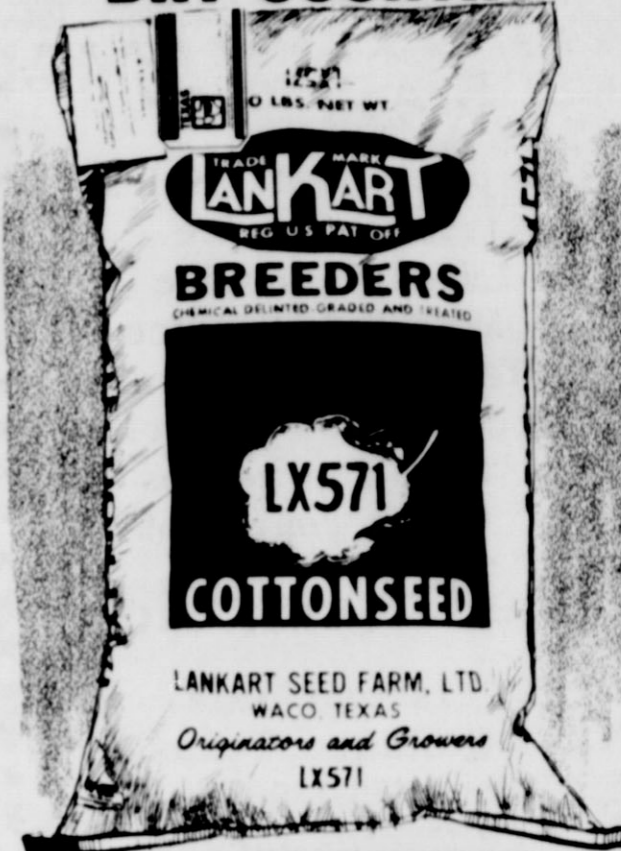

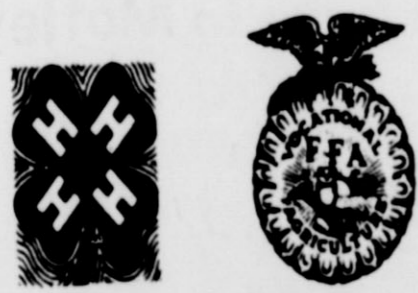

County Agent Pallmeyer Says

Plans for the Texas Animal Health Commission have been outlined for an expanded program for control of bovine brucellosis in Texas. Although not in effect at the present, the program could assist livestock owners in reducing the disease incidence more rapidly. The expanded program would be dependent on additional funding requested of the legislature by the Texas Animal Health Commission, along with an expected \$1.80 in federal money for each state dollar designated for this purpose.

The proposed program is responsive to recommendations resulting from the International Symposium on Brucellosis held at Texas A&M University in 1976. Key livestock industry groups have indicated an endorsement of the proposed program.

Areas of emphasis included in the proposed program are:

- (1) An active program of incentive based on calfhood vaccinations.
- (2) Use of Strain 19 adult vaccination in problem herds.
- (3) Increased surveillance and improved traceback from the market identification program.
- (4) Use of supplemental diagnostic tests.

The expanded program would provide emphasis on the use of Strain 19 brucella abortus vaccine for producers wishing to follow a calfhood vaccination program, as well as the selective use of adult vaccination with Strain 19 in so-called problem herds, improvement in the present system of finding and tracing infected cattle, and the increased use of supplemental testing on those cattle reacting to the card test.

The bovine brucellosis problem is still present in many areas, and the expanded program to reduce the incidence and reinforce the overall program goals is the objective of this thrust by the Texas Animal Health Commission.

Texas DPS Seeks Recruits

The Texas Department of Public Safety is now recruiting young men and women for the position of uniformed troopers. These persons who qualify in the age bracket from 20 through 35 years of age, who are of good moral character, excellent physical condition and now have 60 hours of college credit will be placed in the next troopers class June 7, 1977.

The Department of Public Safety is actively seeking applicants from minority groups to fill positions during the next recruit school. Excellent opportunities exist for females, Blacks and Mexican-American applicants.

The recruit school is held in Austin at the Homer Garrison Law Enforcement Academy and will last 4 1/2 months. The training is designed to equip cadets to handle any of the various situations they may encounter as a state trooper for the Texas Department of Public Safety. The starting salary for the recruit while in training will be \$820.00 a month.

After graduation as a commissioned law enforcement officer, the monthly salary increases to \$936.00 and at the end of six months,

the salary increases to \$1,000. State troopers receive additional longevity pay for each year of service up to 25 years of service. Other benefits include uniforms, vehicles, weapons and ammunition furnished by the State of Texas. Life insurance and hospitalization are paid for the employee and dependent coverage is available at reasonable rates. Paid vacations, holidays and sick leave are provided to all state employees.

Duty assignments will be made to Highway Patrol, License and Weight Service, Motor Vehicle Inspection Service or Drivers License Service upon graduation from recruit school. Experienced uniformed troopers may apply for appointment positions in Narcotics, Intelligence and Texas Ranger services when openings occur.

Pesticide Applicators Training Program Slated

The Federal Insecticide, Fungicide and Rodenticide Act (FIFRA) as amended, enforced by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), includes among other requirements (1) the classification of all uses of pesticides as either restricted or general use and (2) certification of applicators (private and commercial) as a requisite to the legal use of supervision of use of restricted-use pesticides.

The Texas Pesticide Control Act, although not requiring certification of private applicators, authorizes the Commissioner of Agriculture to establish a program to certify private applicators on a voluntary basis, who wish to use or supervise the

use of restricted-use pesticides; in compliance with federal law.

The term "private applicator" means a certified applicator who uses or supervises the use of any pesticide which is classified for restricted use for purposes of producing any agricultural commodity on property owned or rented by him or his employer, or if applied without compensation other than trading of personal services between producers of agricultural commodities, on the property of another person.

The program established by the Texas Department of Agriculture provides three options for certification of private applicators to include: (1) Completion of an approved training program conducted by a qualified institution or training group.

(2) Submission of a completed questionnaire to the Texas Department of Agriculture following review of self-study material and (3) For emergency situations, a single-product, single-purchase, single-use certificate available through the

Texas Department of Agriculture.

Private applicator certification training programs will be scheduled as a means by which Motley County producers may qualify for certification as private applicators. The first program will be held in the Motley County School Cafeteria, starting at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday April 5th.

As an alternative to participate in the training program, self-study materials are available at Extension Agent Bill Pallmeyer's office in Matador. To complete the self study option the person seeking

certification must submit a completed questionnaire to the Texas Department of Agriculture.

The single-product, single-purchase, single-use certificate for emergency situations will be available as restricted-use pesticides are marketed.

The full implementation of the amended FIFRA is scheduled for October 1977. On this date, barring any changes in the law, producers of agricultural commodities must be certified applicators as a requisite to the use of restricted-use pesticides.

GAMBLING INCOME MUST BE REPORTED

Taxpayers must report all winnings from gambling as income tax on their tax returns, the Internal Revenue said.

For tax purposes, gambling activities cover raffles, lotteries, horse racing and bingo games. The IRS considers cash won as prizes in contests and as awards from employers to be taxable income.

Non-cash prizes such as household appliances, all-expense paid vacations, and cars won as prizes or donated by employers must be included in income at fair market value. Taxpayers should report all winnings on

Form 1040 under the category of "Other Income."

If a taxpayer loses money while gambling, the taxpayer may deduct his or her gambling losses on Schedule A of Form 1040 to the extent of the winnings. For example, a taxpayer who loses \$200 and wins \$150 during the tax year may deduct \$150 as his or her itemized deduction schedule in addition to reporting the \$150 income. A taxpayer must have records to substantiate gambling losses, such as racing stubs or lottery tickets, the IRS said.

If a prize or award is payable at some future time at the option of whomsoever is giving the prize, the amount is not taxable as income until the taxpayer either receives it or the prize is made available to him or her.

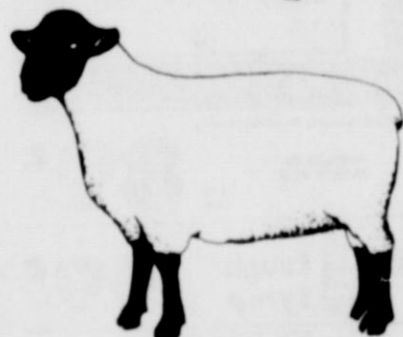
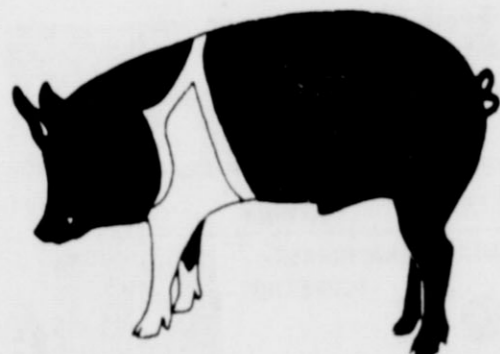
