Demonstration Is Arts-Crafts Club To Meet On Fire Prevention

Anything will burn and nothing is fireproof. This fact was brought out by Ben Bullard, Assistant Safety Director for the Texas Farm Bureau, Waco, in a graphic animated fire prevention demonstration held Thursday, Sept. 22 at Motley County High School.

The three things needed to start a fire - air - fuel and heat, brightly illuminated as Bullard plugged in the parts of his fire triangle board, causing the flashing "F-I-R-E" sign. He defined fire control as he removed, (one at a time), the three

Voters Urged To Register

AUSTIN - Workers in a statewide voter registration drive are making a concerted effort to reach young Texans, according to Sec. of State Mark White, who is directing

the registration project. White says statistics indicate Texans between the ages of 18 and 20 participate in elections less than any other population segment, with the 21-24 year bracket following close behind.

'We have contacted officials in virtually every high school in Texas, and we are now trying to organize registration drives in most White said. colleges," "Young Texans represent a

large pool of the electorate that remains untapped, and we hope to register a large percentage by the Oct. 1 deadline for registering to vote in the Presidential election.

White contends that most people, regardless of age, tend to vote once they complete the process of registering.

Studies indicate that between 80 and 90 per cent of registered voters do vote," White said. "All it takes to registrer in Texas is filling out a postcard, so if we can get our message to the people, we should see an upswing in Texas voting performance, which has been falling steadily for more than a decade.

Registration applications are available through county tax assessors or by calling White's office in Austin toll-free at 1-800-292-9602.





DICKENS - In an all-out effort to arrest movement of the cotton boll weevil. officials of the USDA Plant Protection and Quarantine Service and the producerowned Plains Cotton Growers of Lubbock have completed first and second insecticidal spraying of 275,000 acres of cotton. Acreage treated extends from Briscoe County on the north to Borden and Dawson counties on the south, along the Caprock's eastern edge Roy Moritz, district super-

services for Plains Cotton Growers, who are coordinating the Diapause Boll Weevil Control Program, say the first boll weevil spraying operations of the fall were carried out from Sept. 6 to 16. Second insecticidal applications of the 275,000 base acreage area was to have ended Friday, Sept. 24 following a record treatment of over 100,000 acres the day before. freeze occurs. 'All fields are being block sprayed from Matador southward to Jayton, plus acreages below the Caprock in Garza and Crosby counties, Moritz says. "Fields are being sprayed on a selected basis in all other areas within the control zone unless boll weevil infestations warrant

block spraying. He says boll weevils are more widespread on top of the Caprock this year than in the last several years due to in-migration of weevils from the east and successful overwintering below the Caprock as a result of an abnormally mild winter

"We believe we have the necessary expertise and resources to adequately cope with this widespread infestation," says Moritz.

He emphasizes that the heavier than usual boll weevil populations found along the eastern and southeastern portions of the Caprock were forseen back in May whenever boll weevil trap catches showed an increase in weevil populations over previous years for that time of the year. At that time PCG and PPQ officials recommended that producers consider early season spraying for weevil control in

The Diapause Boll Weevil Control Program was begun in 1964 along a 15-county area stretching from the upper South Plains southward and southwestward to the New Mexico line, along the Caprock. Its purpose is to use pest management concepts including spraying and field scouting, to prevent the boll weevil from migrating westward from its overwintering areas below the Caprock



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
