Karen House With Carter Entourage

CONTINUING ITS LONGTIME PATTERN OF VOTING DEMOCRATIC, MOTLEY COUNTY TUESDAY BACKED THE CARTER-MONDALE TICKET, ALTHOUGH BY A SMALL MARGIN OF 522 TO 428 FOR PRESIDENT GERALD FORD AND VICE-PRESIDENT DOLE, JOINING THE NATION IN THE ELECTION OF JAMES EARL (JIMMY) CARTER OF PLAINS, GEORGIA AS PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES.

In other major races, Motley County voted to return Congressman Jack Hightower (District 13) to the House of Representatives, 623 to 285 votes cast for Republican Bob Price of Pampa; and 621 for Lloyd Benton as United States Senator. Alan Steelman (R) received 277 votes in this race.

In these races, American Party candidate for President, Thomas J. Anderson received 6 votes; Marjorie P. Gallion received 4 for U.S. Senator and William H. Hathcock received 4 for U.S. Representative of the 13th Dist. Two write-in votes were cast for Reagan for President.

The total votes cast in Motley County was 974, an estimate of 73 per cent of the county's registered voters.

Proposed Constitutional Amendment No. 1 received 275 votes for, and 273 against, authorizing an increase of \$400 million in the amount of Texas Water Development Bonds.

Proposed Constitutional Amendment No. 2, A constitutional amendment to increase from \$100 million to \$200 million the amount of Texas Water Development Bonds that may be issued for water quality enhancement purposes, received 276 votes for, and 253 against.

Medallion For Jail To Be Dedicated Veterans Day

A special ceremony planned for Veterans Day (or Armistice Day) November 11 will climax Motley County's Bicentennial Celebration. A medallion will be placed on the County Jail, oldest building in the county, and a Liberty or Freedom Tree planted by Matador Garden Club in the Pioneer Memorial Park just south of the jail will be dedicated in memory of all war veterans.

Veterans of Foreign Wars and American Legion Fleming Post members will be in charge of the program, which will be held at 11 a.m. at the jail and park.

Speaker for the military service will be Arnold Parker, Principal of Motley County School.

All veterans of every branch of military service are urged to wear their uniforms if possible. If they can't wear the uniforms, they are urged to wear their hats or caps, and take part in the ceremony. A color guard and firing squad will participate and the program will be concluded with taps.

GIFTS TO BE COLLECTED FOR V.A. HOSPITAL

Members of the American Legion Auxiliary are reminded to donate gifts to send to the Veterans Hospital. The gifts are usually brought to the November meeting, but it was not announced in time for Monday's meeting.

Todd McCandless also added a touchdown and a number of Matadors were responsible for the extra point conversions. Micky Hurt, Robert Shannon, and Robert Parker all teamed together to make two conversions each. The Cowboys were held scoreless, and remained winless for the year. But the Matadors closed a good season with an 8 - 1 mark, beaten only by Sudan.

In outlining the specifics of Lionism, the District Governor lauded the Matador organization for its record of activities and service to the community, during its 48 years of existence.

HOMECOMING PROGRAM FILLED WITH MEMORIES

From the opening number, "Try To Remember," sung by Mrs. W. F. Jacobs, (Vivian Estes) to the closing song, "God Bless America," with the audience joining Mrs. Jacobs, the 1976 Homecoming program offered many memories to former students and teachers who returned for the occasion.

Popular events and school history from 1910 until the present were included in the program, which was presented Saturday, October 23, at the Motley County High School auditorium.

As John M. "Sonny" Russell narrated, posters were changed at each decade, starting with 1910 - 1920. Those were the days.

The school east of town was built in 1911. The Matador school had its first annual in 1917 and it was called "The Rattler." Many amusing incidents were told. Miss Verlin Reeves and Mrs. Dora Wason Daffern, 1914 graduates, were presented corsages in recognition of this first decade.

The Roaring Twenties began with action when three members of the 1923 district champion girls' basketball team, in black bloomers and white shirts dribbled a basketball onto the stage with their coach, Mrs. Albert Trawweek (Irene Lawler), blowing her whistle. While "Ain't She Sweet" was being played, Hettie Patton Davis, Loyd Guthrie Dirickson and Bertha Patton Stearns stirred nostalgia among the older exes present. Others on the champion team were Gertrude Groves Smith, Winnie Patton and Themia Thornton Love.

Another entertaining act of that era which was enjoyed was the Charleston dance performed by Judine Watson (Mrs. Bill) McCaghen while other original members of the Girls' Ukulele Club played and sang, "Five Foot Two." These were Lorene Fryar (Mrs. F. F.) Calhoun of Plainview, Correne Russell (Mrs. J. W.) Drace of Lubbock, Opal Patton (Mrs. J. D.) Craven and Vivian Estes (Mrs. W. F.) Jacobs of Matador. Others in the original group were Marian Warren, Mary Higgins Davis, Lottie Carter Stotts and Dorene Russell Bradshaw. A Watson was instructor and Mrs. J. H. Sample sponsor for the group.

The Dirty Thirties were remembered because of the sandstorms and the depression. Nevertheless, M.H.S. students had fun with bridge dances and box car romances at the former railroad depot east of town, with wind-up victrolas. Sybil Scaff Barton and Winifred Estes Darsey, students in school during this time had fun singing their 1933 class song, "A Shanty In Old Shanty Town." They closed the decade singing "Happy Days Are Here Again." The 1936 regional winning football and track team members were recognized as County School in 1974.

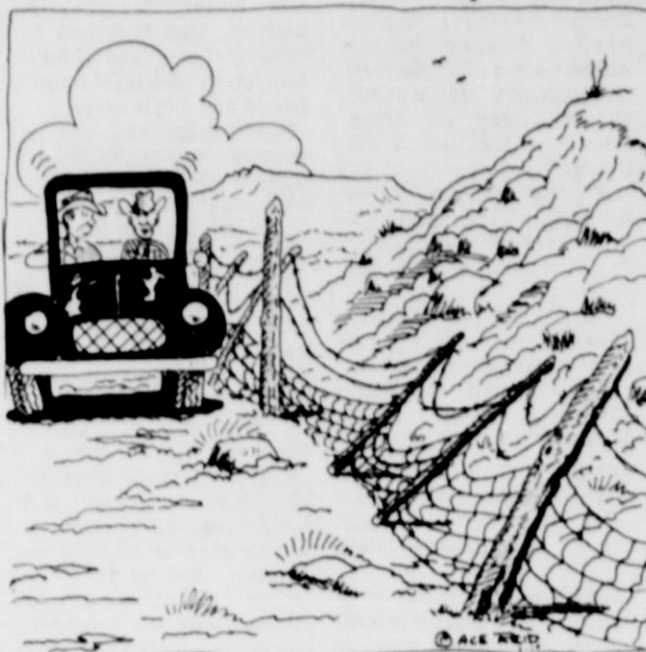

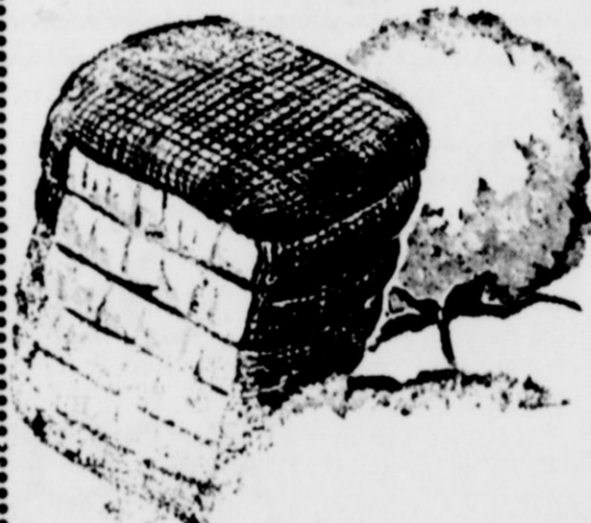
